Centennial Commission Chairman Anthony Brandenhall interpreted the showing to mean "that Portlanders are fired up behind our show."

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## WCA Line OK'd Into California

WASHINGTON (AP)—More air links between Oregon and California were authorized by the Civil Aeronautics Board Thursday in a decision expanding the systems of Pacific Air Lines and West Coast Airlines.

West Coast was authorized to extend its Portland-Klamath Falls route south to Sacramento and to the San Francisco-Oakland area.

Pacific's route north of San Francisco was extended from Crescent City, Calif., to Portland.

The board eliminated the authority of United Air Lines to serve Bend-Redmond and Klamath Falls Ore. The service of Northwest Airlines at Wenatchee, Wash., also was deleted.

The board extended the service of West Coast eastward from Klamath Falls, to Boise, Idaho by way of Lakeview and Burns, Ore. Omak, Wash., received its first air service by inclusion in West Coast's route system under a temporary three-year certificate.

The decisions were made in the Pacific Northwest local service case.

## Green, Holmes To Spurn Race

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Thursday he regrets "Sen. Morse thinks so poorly of my record as a member of the Senate" that he intends to make it a campaign issue.

"I have done my best in the Senate to make an honest, fair record," Neuberger said, adding, "I certainly do not intend to get into any name-calling contest with Sen. Morse."

Neuberger said he did not know who might oppose him in the 1960 primary.

Two Democrats who have been mentioned as possibilities said today they do not intend to oppose Neuberger.

"I am very happy where I am. I have no plans to oppose Sen. Neuberger," said Rep. Edith Green.

Former Gov. Robert D. Holmes said, "I will not be a candidate against Dick Neuberger. Not in any election at any time."

A contractor working in front of the Centennial Exposition Building struck the cable.

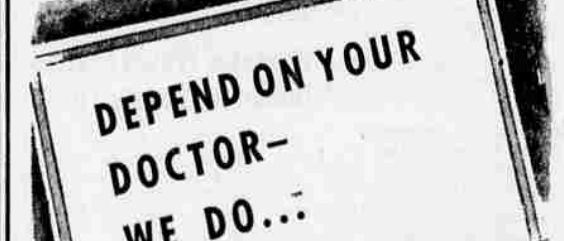
Radio station KWWJ was among those cut off temporarily.

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## Morse Blasts Lewis Strauss

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new storm broke Thursday over the nomination of Lewis L. Strauss to be secretary of commerce. It was stirred by reports he has picked a railroad financier to direct a study of national transportation policy.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) assailed in a Senate speech Strauss' reported selection of Armand G. Erpf, a partner in the Wall Street firm of Carl M. Loeb, Rhoades & Co. to head the study.

Morse contended "a conflict of interest may well arise" because, he said, Erpf and his company have substantial investments in railroads.

Morse quoted from a story published by the Washington Post which said Strauss has picked Erpf to direct the study and that his brokerage firm and its customers own over 20 million dollars worth of various railroad stocks.

The Post story quoted Strauss as having told a recent congressional hearing that there had been some conversation about bringing the independent rate-making agencies in the transport field—Interstate Commerce Commission, Civil Aeronautics Board, Maritime Board—under Commerce Department control.

"Some trucking, shipping and airlines companies fear that this will give the competing railroads a big advantage in any commerce agency shaped by railroad men," the story said.

The Post story came into a Senate Commerce Committee hearing on the nomination of John J. Allen Jr. to be undersecretary of commerce for transportation, under Strauss.

## Discount Rate Raised

## Woman Meted Term In Jail

Mildred E. Price of Long Beach, Calif., pleaded guilty in district court Thursday to a charge of larceny by fraud of property valued less than \$75 and was sentenced by Judge Warren A. Woodruff to six months in the Douglas County Jail.

She was given credit for time spent in the county jail since April 9. Mrs. Price was accused in a complaint signed by Deputy Dist. Atty George F. Weigum of passing a worthless \$30.06 check July 31, 1958, to Glen Shirliff, an employee of Red Jordan's Egg and Poultry at Coos Bay. The check was drawn on the Reedsport branch of the Umpqua National Bank. She procured produce and dairy supplies, according to the complaint.

Mrs. Price's attorney, William Jones, told Judge Woodruff that this is not the typical case of a person writing a check to get the money. At the time the check was written, Mrs. Price was trying to establish a restaurant business and was operating it on a day-to-day basis and hoping proceeds would cover costs, Jones said.

Weigum said that Mrs. Price has a background of bogus checks. Weigum submitted a Federal Bureau of Investigation report which told of bad check incidents in California, Arizona and Texas. Weigum said Mrs. Price was scheduled for arraignment on the charge once before, jumped bail and went to California. She had to be extradited.

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
