

Nation's Auto Toll Exceeds Forecast

More Than 300 Persons Die In Traffic During Two Days

More than 300 persons lost their lives in traffic accidents across the nation during the two-day Memorial weekend. The traffic toll of dead was a record for the holiday and far exceeded the estimate of 260.

The National Safety Council attributed the record number of traffic deaths largely to extremely heavy travel and to a rash of multiple accidents that swelled the toll rapidly.

"It offers a grim challenge to every one concerned with highway safety to step up the unending efforts to hold down accidents despite mounting travel," a NSC spokesman said. "We can only hope the shock of this awful death toll will be reflected in fewer accidents during the rest of the year."

Other violent deaths — drownings and in miscellaneous types of accidents — also took a heavy toll.

when the traffic death toll was 241, the previous high.
Belated reports were expected to boost the totals.
The highway death total also was far ahead of the 262 counted by The Associated Press in a test period survey for a non-holiday weekend of 54 hours. The survey, covering the period from 6 p.m. Friday May 15, to midnight Sunday, May 17, also showed 32 drownings and 74 persons killed in miscellaneous types of accidents, for an over-all total of 368.

Holiday Counts 6 Oregon Dead

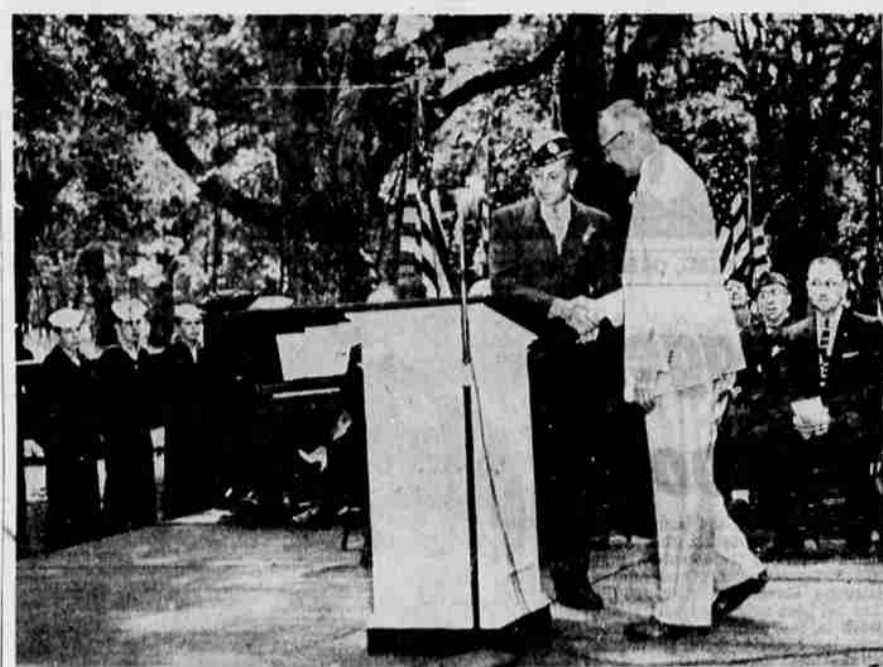

Oregon passed over the weekend to honor its dead. By the time the Memorial Day holiday ended, the weekend death toll stood at six.
There was an additional grim note to the holiday as the bodies of two persons were recovered who perished in earlier accidents.
At Depoe Bay, the Coast Guard Sunday recovered the body of Julian Sloan, 10, Beaverton, who drowned with Margaret Gray, 37, Portland, after they set out for a beach stroll May 8.
The Coast Guard also recovered the body of Norman Lewis Baker, 17, Waldport, Sunday from a little lake just north of Waldport.
The high school student vanished after going for a walk May 22. As fair weather swelled the rush of traffic Sunday, the first auto fatalities of the weekend were reported.
Robert Stewart, 3, was struck and killed by a car near his Salem home.
Gary Edward Streeter, 16, Hood River, also perished in a traffic accident. He died when a car in which he was riding hit a utility pole and overturned near Hood River.
Earlier, on Saturday, the Coast Guard found a boat washed up on the shore near Waldport.
Authorities said the occupants of the boat, John Clark, 47, and his brother, Kenneth Clark, 50, both of Seio, apparently drowned.
Two other men also lost their lives in Saturday mishaps.
Elmer Wickman, 65, died in an apartment fire in Portland and William Farmer, 57, Springfield, suffered a fatal heart attack on a holiday hike in the Willamette Pass area.
The May highway traffic toll in Oregon in the Associated Press tabulation stood at 39 after the Memorial Day weekend. The total for the year was at 178.

Four Sessions Set At Tenmile Camp
