

12,000 Visit Diamond Lake; Angling's Fine Hunter Wins Roseburg Am Golf Championship

Ideal weather, a better camping situation and, most important, a lakeful of hungry fish spelled "holiday" for an estimated 12,000 persons over the weekend at Diamond Lake.

Fishermen who had waited the winter through for the high lakes to open this spring weren't disappointed at Saturday's luck. State police and Game Commission men tallied a satisfying number of limits caught by anglers during the

day. Nearly everybody had some sort of luck — a few bad, but they were rare.

Some of the four-year-old Kamloops trout, which are spring spawners, were dark from spawning, but bright, plump fish were numerous. Virtually all were taken on troll, although fly and bait casters were successful at spots around the shoreline.

The late May opening date was perfect for the camper. Bright sun

shone put temperatures in the seventies both days.

The Forest Service opened the south picnic grounds to camping for the Memorial Day weekend opening only, and hundreds of eager campers and anglers jammed the area.

The camp along the east side of the lake has been restricted by the Forest Service, with about 300 camp sites made available along the 1½-mile section of lake front.

All sites were claimed by about 5:30 p.m. Friday, according to Larry Neely, partner in the camping concession. Saturday, however, a few more carloads of campers were allowed into the area.

On at least three occasions last year, the camp was crowded far beyond capacity — there were more than 1,000 camping parties one weekend last summer. The Forest Service set the limit for the area after the 1958 season.

Late-comers took advantage of the picnic area, and hundreds of persons jammed the grounds. None, however, seemed uncomfortable.

The comeback of the lake, which was poisoned to rid it of trash fish in 1955, was apparent in the number and size of Kamloops taken. Many of the fish taken were in the 20-inch range, and a state police officer on duty said one fish weighing 4½ pounds was checked in at the dock near the lodge.

Hunter Wins Roseburg Am Golf Championship

Chuck Hunter, the University of Oregon golfer who led the qualifiers with a two under par 70, continued his blistering pace Sunday to win the 12th Annual Roseburg Amateur.

Hunter defeated Tom Shaw of Oregon, 3 and 2, to become the 1959 champ.

Hunter replaces Keith Gubrud, another Oregon golfer, who won the 1958 title. Gubrud was downed by Joe Perrault of Roseburg in the first round, but came back to win first flight honors with a 1 up win over Larry Copple of Oregon State.

Chuck Sever won second flight honors with a 4 and 3 win over Bob Hope and Mike Perrault defeated Mickey Shaw, 4 and 2, for the third flight. Jay Gorman won the fourth flight with a 3 and 2 decision over Roger Gee.

In the senior play, Ward Cummings took low net honors with a 71-71-69-211. Last year, Cummings won low gross honors with a 231. Otis Skinner, the 1958 low net winner, shot a 68-74-76-218.

In championship play, Hunter gained his berth in the final match with wins over Copple, 1 up; Ralph Helton, 6 and 5; and the 1958 runner up, Bob Johnson, 3 and 2.

Shaw defeated Woody Ball, 4 and 3; Joe Perrault, 4 and 3; and Pete Geertsen, 2 and 1.

Hunter gained an early lead in the title match when he parred the 365-yard first hole while Shaw was one over.

After the front nine, Hunter had a two-stroke lead and on the 15th, all but wrapped up the crown. The 388-yard, par-4 hole, saw the new champ down in three.

Hunter's drive was straight away and his second shot put him six feet from the pin. His putt was

deadly. Shaw was also on in two, but was faced with a long putt and parred the hole.

Copple, who played Gubrud in a foursome with the title contestants, came up with the most thrilling shot of the afternoon round.

This was also on the 15th, when his long, long, chip shot curled in beautifully to the pin.

UO's Cook Whips Stars, Ties World '100' Record

A new sprint sensation, uncovered Saturday night, brightened University of Oregon prospects for the NCAA track meet to be held June 12-13 at Lincoln, Neb.

Roscoe Cook, sophomore, astonished himself as well as fans at the California Relays at Modesto Saturday evening, by tying the world record of .09.3 in the 100-yard dash. He beat such nationally known speedsters as Texans Bobby Morrow and Bill Woodhouse and San Jose State's Ray Norton.

Otis Davis, Pacific Coast Conference 440-yard champion, added more luster to his first season at that distance by winning in .46.2, a half second off the world's record.

Burleson Sets Mark
And Dyrrol Burleson, university freshman, tied his national freshman collegiate mile record of 4:06.7 in running to an easy victory.

Oregon Staters captured two seconds and a third at the Modesto meet. Cliff Cordy ran the 880 in 1:59.9, a time that placed him second. Gary Stenlund, OSC freshman, uncorked a javelin toss of 240 feet 10½ inches for a second. And Darrell Horn leaped 24 feet 11 inches for third in the broad jump.

University of Oregon coach Bill Bowerman, who was in Portland for another meet over the weekend, said he was highly pleased with the showing of his squad members at Modesto.

"All three of the boys are great athletes, and I'm particularly

pleased for Roscoe," said Bowerman.

"Cook had a slow start after missing the first two meets and then was held up again by a sore leg. But he's a great competitor and I was sure he was one of the great ones I have ever seen."

Future Seen
"Remember, he is just a sophomore and there is reason to believe that his career as a great sprinter is just beginning."

Of Davis, Bowerman said: "He's an outstanding example of what work and courage will do. Not many young men can start a new athletic career at the age of 25 and have the fortitude Davis has shown to make a success of it."

Davis came to the university as a basketball player. Bowerman, impressed with his speed and spring, convinced him that track was his sport. He did not run his first race until last year.

Roseburg Gets 9 AAU Places

Roseburg trackmen placed in nine events in the Junior Division track meet at Wilson High School in Portland sponsored by the AAU and the chamber of commerce.

Over 150 youngsters competed in the junior and 13-and-under divisions of the meet.

Ray Palm was first in the 75-yard high hurdles with a time of 8.6. Palm also won the high jump with a height of 5-4.

The Roseburg 440-yard relay team ran second to Medford. The Roseburg foursome of Palm, Al Neal, Ron Pinard and Paul Brothers was a close second with the winning time 47.7.

Other places garnered by the Roseburg cindermen was second in the broad jump by Pinard; and fifth in the same event by Gary Gum; fourth in the high jump by Paul Brothers and a sixth place in this event by Dick Yost; a fourth place finish in the pole vault by Paul Brothers and fifth place by Bill Brothers.

In the 13-and-under division, Gary Payne was second in the 100-yard dash and Dick Gwaltney third.

Bill Petry won the 70-yard low hurdles, with Mickey Wright second and Tom Dodge third.

Gary Oederkirk was third in the 330-yard dash and Jim Wasson fourth in the high jump.
