Yankee haters arise! The battle has not been won. The enemy is not dead. He has escaped from the American League cellar.

The Washington chapter is to blame. They forgot to lock the basement door over the long weekend. Casey Stengel's men swept three in a row and charged into sixth place, blinking in daylight after 31 days in the dungeon.

This is blue Monday for the club members. New York shows definite signs of snapping out of it. They clobbered Washington twice on Saturday, scoring 22 runs, and won Sunday's single game 3-0 on Bill Skowron's three-run homer in the ninth and Bob Turley's two-hit pitching.

The Yanks still are four games under .500 but the league is beginning to come back to them. Cleveland, still in first place, is only six games away. The Yanks still have 112 games to play.

Charlie Does It Again

Charlie Maxwell did the Indians in with a three-run homer on Jim Perry's first pitch in the ninth for Detroit's 7-4 victory. Jerry Davis came through with his first complete game in the majors, a four-hitter after a wobbly start.

Cleveland held its one-game lead over Chicago because the White Sox were thumped early and late by Kansas City. The A's knocked out Early Wynn while scoring five runs in the second and added four more in the sixth on Preston Ward's grand slam homer for a 9-1 decision.

Baltimore dropped Boston into last place, five percentage points behind Washington, when Hal (Skinny) Brown beat the Red Sox 2-1. Brown staggered through the first two innings and settled down to pitch a four-hitter. He felled Ted Williams' bid for his 2,500th big league hit. Williams went hitless in three official trips.

Braves' Lead Cut

San Francisco cut Milwaukee's National League lead to 2 1/2 games by topping Chicago 6-3 while the Braves were dividing two with Philadelphia. After Robin Roberts pitched his first complete game since April 22 by throwing a four-hit shutout in the 6-0 opener, Warren Spahn won his 252nd major league game, 2-1 with a four-hitter in the second game.

Los Angeles got 14 strikeouts by Sandy Koufax and Danny McDevitt in downing St. Louis 5-3. The Card pitchers fanned nine, making a two-team total of 23, tying the National League record. Pittsburgh took two from Cincinnati 6-2 and 14-1 as Don Hoak and Smokey Burgess each hit three homers.

Camilo Pascual did his very best to keep the Yanks in last place, matching Turley's two-hit shutout for the first eight innings. There were two out in the ninth when Mickey Mantle, doubled to right center. After Yogi Berra was walked intentionally, Skowron lined Pascual's second pitch into the left center bleachers for his eighth home run.

Turley, still far behind his 1958 pace, recovered from his recent wildness and walked only one. It was his fourth victory (he's lost six) and Pascual's fifth defeat.

Maxwell's homer in Detroit broke a 4-4 tie. Davis had opened the ninth with a single off Mike Garagi and was sacrificed to second. Perry walked Harvey Kuenn intentionally before Maxwell hit his ninth homer.

KC Hits
Whitey Herzog's single with the bases loaded and Dick Williams' double each drove in two runs for the A's in the big second inning. Ward's grand slammer came off Barry Latman who replaced Wynn in the second. Ned Garver, who hasn't lost to Chicago since July 4, 1957, won his fourth with a four-hitter.

Baltimore left 15 on base in beating Boston. Al Pilarcik's double followed by Willie Tasby's single broke a 1-1 tie in the sixth. Ike Delock was the loser.

It has been a year and two days since Roy Face's last ball game. The Pittsburgh relief ace picked up his seventh victory of 1959 Sunday while the Pirates were closing in on the National League leaders with a double victory over Cincinnati.

Face lost to Milwaukee, May 30, 1958. He won five last year and seven this year for a 12-0 record. During that period he has appeared in 61 ball games. No wonder Manager Danny Murtagh insists he has the best bullpen man in baseball.

It was Face's three innings of shutout pitching that helped the Pirates pull out a wild 14-11 second game with Cincinnati after the Pirates had won the opener 6-2. Tigard.

Jefferson's hard-hitting team had to come from behind to beat W'East, 15-12, a week ago. It has a 14-3 season win-loss record.

Tigard, which is 15-5, turned back Central Catholic of Portland, 4-1, in the opening round behind the tight pitching of Larry Barrigover.

The other class A-1 finalist will be decided when The Dalles plays host to Medford Tuesday night.

In the opening round Medford eliminated North Bend, 4-1, and The Dalles downed Lebanon, 13-9.

Adrian will be host to Maupin Tuesday in a game to decide who will meet Gaston for the class B title. Gaston qualified for the final Saturday by blanking Yoncalla, 11-0.

The class A-1, class A-2 and B championship games are scheduled for next Saturday night at Multnomah Stadium in Portland.

Portland came from behind, with the help of home runs, in defeating Spokane 8-5 in a Pacific Coast League baseball game Sunday.

Spokane opened the game with three runs in the first off Vic Lombardi, but this margin vanished in the third. Two were on for Portland then, and Spokane pitcher Roger Craig purposely walked hard-hitting George Freese, loading the bases. Up came Jack Littrell and banged the ball into left center for a homer.

In the seventh Jim Greengrass drove a ball out of the park with none on.

Marty Kutyna, who relieved Lombardi, was credited with the win, but he got wild in the seventh and was relieved by Ken Johnson. Spokane used a pair of pitchers to make a total of five for the game.

It was hardly a pitcher's paradise in the Pacific Coast League Sunday. Thirty-one hurlers took the mound in the five scheduled games and nearly half of these—15—saw duty in the Vancouver-Seattle doubleheader.

The scores, too, reflected the lack of control that marked the circuit. Phoenix blasted Salt Lake City 14-8, Portland downed Spokane 8-5 and Vancouver beat Seattle, 6-4 and 13-1. Only three pitchers hit the hill at Sacramento where the Solons took a 5-2 victory from San Diego.

Phoenix Pounds Bees
Five Salt Lake City pitchers gave up 17 hits to the Phoenix Giants in a game that saw eight doubles slice through the Bee infield. Sal Taormina led the Giant attack with a single, double and a home run while Willie McCovey had a perfect three for three day at the plate.

Phoenix used three pitchers when the Bees began to rally. Ace Eddie Fisher was credited with the win, his ninth of the season.

Vans Score Early
Seattle and Vancouver each used four pitchers in the opener of their doubleheader which saw the Mounties hang out four quick doubles in the first inning. Seattle picked up a pair of doubles and a home run by Hal Bevan, but couldn't catch up.

In the second game George Bamberger went the route for Vancouver while his teammates picked up 13 hits off six Seattle pitchers. Extra-base hits again spelled the difference as Vancouver got five doubles, a triple and a home run by Joe Taylor.

Sacramento's Joe Stanka was the only other pitcher to last a full game. He gave up seven hits in second place San Diego, but led off the seventh inning with a homer.

San Diego hurler Dick Stigman walked the first two men to face him, threw away a bunt, and walked three more before going to the showers.

'500' Winner Ward
Tells Plans: He'll Race

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Rodger Ward, loaded down with loot from the richest auto race ever run, will go right on competing in the world's most dangerous sport.

Ward and his car owner, Leader Cards, Inc., of Milwaukee, won \$128,850 in the 43rd 500-mile race Saturday. The World War II fighter pilot's take under the customary contract would be 40 per cent, \$51,540.

That means Ward will be risking his neck largely for the U.S. Treasury the rest of this season—but his pretty brunette wife, Jo, says he probably would race for nothing.

"I'm going to make the rest of the USAC championship races and possibly some sports car events if I can get a good car," Ward said.

His next race will be the 100-miler at Milwaukee next Sunday. The last two Indianapolis winners, Sam Hanks and Jimmy Bryan, passed up the rest of the circuit after their big winnings at the Speedway.

It took Ward nine attempts before he won the big pot. Only a dedicated race driver would have continued after his experience in the 1955 Memorial Day classic. His front axle broke, triggering the four-car crash that killed two-time winner Bill Vukovich. He entered the 500 again the next year and finished eighth — his best until last Saturday.

Ward set a new Speedway record of 135.857 miles an hour, beating Jim Rathmann by 23.27 seconds or about a mile. Rathmann's 135.619 also topped Hanks' 1957 record of 135.601.

It turned out to be a four-car race and Ward got a big assist from his smooth pit crew and air jacks which were installed in his A. J. Watson-built car. He made three stops for fuel and tires in a grand total of one minute and 13 seconds.

Johnny Thomson of Boyertown, Pa., the fastest qualified, had to make four pit stops, broke a torsion bar spring and finished third.

Baker Aims For OSC

PORTLAND (AP) — Three-sport ace Terry Baker of Portland's Jefferson High will enter Oregon State College next fall.

Tom DeSylvia, Jeff football coach, said he was told of the decision Saturday by Baker, quarterback on the 1958 Jefferson team, the Oregon A-1 champion.
