SEATTLE (AP) — In the first football battle between the two schools, Navy will meet Washington here Oct. 1, 1960, the Post-Intelligencer said Wednesday.

Neither institution has officially announced the scheduling of the game, but the paper said it had learned that both schools had agreed to the meeting.

Washington's 1946 team met Navy in a "game scrimmage" when the Middles came to Whidbey Island Naval Air Station for training.

Phil Moyer Wins By TKO

PORTLAND (AP)—Phil Moyer scored a technical knockout in the scheduled 10-round main bout Tuesday night here when Chico Cirino failed to answer the bell for the sixth round.

Cirino, a San Francisco fighter, explained later his hand was injured. He weighed in at 155 and Moyer, Portland, was 152.

Moyer, whose younger brother, Denny, will meet Don Jordan for the welterweight title next month, connected with solid rights and lefts consistently. There were no knockdowns.

Under Portland Boxing Commission rules, Cirino's failure to answer the bell in the sixth made it a fifth round technical knockout.

A crowd of 328 paid \$1.19 to see the bouts.

Second All-Star Game Planned For August 3

The major league club owners have approved the players' request for a second All-Star game this season.

The game, which must receive the blessing of Commissioner Ford Frick to become official, will be played on Monday, August 3, at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

The players will receive 60 per cent of the gate and radio-TV receipts, with the remainder going to the club owners, who would use

the additional cash to aid youth baseball programs such as the Little League and Babe Ruth loop.

The players may possibly use their share of the cash to set up a pension plan for umpires and help former players not currently benefited by the pension plan.

The players share of the first game, to be played in Pittsburgh July 7, goes into their pension fund.

Frick is expected to announce his decision next week after conferring with Presidents Warren and Eisenhower of the National League and Joe Cronin of the American League.

It was Cronin who disclosed the owners' endorsement of the second All-Star game after two National League executives — President Bob Carpenter of the Philadelphia Phillies and Vice President Birdie Tebbetts of the Milwaukee Braves — said the owners had voted for it at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, two weeks ago.

"The owners have authorized the second game at the players' request," said Cronin, "but as far as we have been informed no details have been worked out."

Giles said he expected to meet with Frick and Cronin in New York some time next week to iron out details.

Frick was not available for comment.

Carpenter appeared surprised at the secrecy shrouding the second All-Star game.

"Why sure it's so," he said. "The whole thing was approved by all the owners in both major leagues a couple of weeks ago at the baseball meetings in Columbus to work out a radio and television deal."

It was not an unanimous vote. At least six clubs — Boston, Washington, Cleveland, Chicago and Kansas City in the American League and San Francisco in the National — are believed to be opposed to it. Three of the clubs have said, however, they would go along with the majority.

One of the more vociferous objectors was Frank Lane, general manager of the Indians.

"Two All-Star games make as much sense as two Kentucky Derbies or two World Series," he said.

The rampaging Portland Beavers won their fourth game in a row—their 12th in the last 16 games—and climbed within two games of second place by downing San Diego 5-3 Tuesday night.

With Sacramento going down to a 3-1 defeat at the hands of Seattle, Portland also climbed within 4 1/2 games of first place in the Pacific Coast League.

Howie Reed pitched the entire game for third-place Portland, scattering seven hits and extending his record to 5-2.

Outfielder Russ Snyder singled home the run that put Portland ahead 4-3 in the seventh inning, and Jim Greengrass added an insurance run by belting a homer in the eighth.

San Diego's Bill Werle had the upper hand 1-0 until the sixth inning, when Dave Melton doubled for Portland, Snyder singled and George Freese drew a walk, leading the bases. Jack Little singled, driving home two runs. Greengrass followed with another single for another run.

Steve Jankowski evened matters at 3-3 by walloping a two-run homer in San Diego's half of the sixth inning.

Relief pitcher Pete Wojey took over for San Diego in the seventh, but at once ran into trouble. A walk and singles by Melton and Snyder brought in the tiebreaking run.

Sacramento went down to defeat as relief pitcher Bill Kennedy saved the game for Seattle, 3-1.

It's not the weather. That warm breeze felt by the Salem Senators is the hot breath of the Lewiston Bronces and Eugene Emeralds.

Lewiston closed to within a single game of Salem in the Northwest League baseball race Tuesday night by shutting out the Senators 3-0. Eugene closed to 1 1/2 games of the leaders with a 9-5 triumph over Yakima.

Tri-City broke open a pitchers' battle for a 1-0 victory over Wenatchee.

Lewiston combined the three-hit pitching of Bob Wadsworth with home runs by Roger Herrscher and Karl Herron for its win. Wadsworth struck out eight and walked only one, while Herrscher and Herron lofted balls over the left field fence.

Yakima scored five runs in the first inning, three of them on Roger Morgan's homer. But Eugene more than equalled this with six runs in the fifth, two of them coming in on the home run of Gene Calder.

Sparks and Mel Krause each got three for five in the victory effort while Yakima's Archie White got two singles in three at bats.

Tri-City got only two hits, but one of them was enough to drive in the only run against Wenatchee.

Cal Bauer was hit by a pitched ball, stole second and then raced home on Bob Ruck's single. Bauer got the other hit with a double off stingy Steve Watson.

Roger Roy allowed four hits in the winning effort. His only anxious moments were in the eighth when the Chiefs loaded the bases with two out. But it all ended with cleanup hitter Dick Wilson bouncing out.

Lewis — who had knocked out 16 opponents in 17 undefeated fights — took three solid left hooks to his jaw from Pennsylvania heavyweight Earl Aley. The blows left him flat on his back at 1:07 of the first round of a scheduled 10-rounder. It was scored as a TKO.

The Aley fight was supposed to be a final tune up for the 237-pound Lewis before hitting the fistful palaces in New York, Chicago and Miami Beach.

His manager, Tommy O'Loughlin, was also thinking terms of the television circuit. After the fight O'Loughlin was pouncing his hand on the dressing room table, pondering the sharp turn of events.

"I told Terry before the fight that this guy's (Aley) a converted southpaw, that he signed the hotel register with his left hand. I told my boy to keep his left hand up. You saw what happened."

Lewis just mumbled: "What a silly mistake."

Somebody asked Lewis if the Aley fight would discourage him and Terry replied, "I guess I'm just going to have to work harder."

O'Loughlin said he'd like to get a few more fights for Terry and bring Aley back here again for a rematch. "We'll fill this place," he said.

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
