

Chrysler May Drop Plymouth

DETROIT (AP)—Industry sources reported today that auto dealers who sell both Dodge and Plymouth cars will drop the Plymouth after this model year. Instead they will offer a new small Dodge to be called the Dart.

Chrysler Corp. had no immediate comment.

Plymouth will continue to be offered by Chrysler-Plymouth and DeSoto-Plymouth dealers and by the less than 200 exclusive Plymouth dealers.

Details of the Dart have not been disclosed. However, it is known that it will have an 118-inch wheelbase, the same as the present Plymouth, and some four inches shorter than the 1959 Dodge models.

The Dart will offer a new six cylinder engine developed for Chrysler's new economy car, the Valiant, but the Dart version will be slightly larger. This engine is an overhead valve design, similar in style to the present Ford and Chevrolet six cylinder engines.

Speculation is that the Dart prices will be in the range of the Chevrolet - Ford - Plymouth lines. Dodge will continue to offer at least two of its larger models in the so-called medium price field.

The Dart and the Valiant will be built in Chrysler's Dodge main plant in Hamtramck.

The Dart will be the fourth new, smaller car to be offered this fall. Besides Chrysler's Valiant the others are the Corvair from the Chevrolet division of General Motors and the Falcon from Ford.

PORTLAND (AP)—Mayor Terry Schunk asked Portland residents Thursday to tidy up spare rooms and rent them to visitors expected for the Oregon Centennial celebration.

Schunk said there may not be sufficient room in hotels and motels to house all the visitors for the Centennial Exposition, which opens its 100-day run Wednesday.

Mel Gordon, chairman of a special committee to register private rooms, said: "We desperately need support right now as this will mean millions of dollars poured into our economy."

Gordon said householders with spare rooms can expect to get from \$5 to \$10 daily, depending on the facilities.

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Sentences Passed On Felony Charges

Two persons were meted prison sentences Thursday when they appeared before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

Sentenced to 90 days in the Douglas County jail and fined \$250 was Charles Dean Steinkuehler, 36, Cimarron, Kan., who was charged in a district attorney's information of passing a worthless \$10 check April 27 at a Roseburg grocery store.

Steinkuehler pleaded guilty to the charge May 27 and sentencing was deferred until a Federal Bureau of Investigation report could be received concerning him.

Robert Lee Kienbaum, 20, Coos Bay, was meted 18 months in the state penitentiary after he pleaded guilty to a charge of conspiracy to obtain money by false pretenses. He is accused in a grand jury indictment of unlawfully conspiring with another person to obtain money by a check which was drawn in the amount of \$20 and made payable to him.

The worthless check, made by the other person, was presented to James Edward Welch, manager of Gimre's Shoe Store at 625 SE Jackson St., in return for shoes and \$4.50, the indictment charges.

Sanity Hearing Set For Long

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP)—Probate Judge Hugh Gibson today set a sanity hearing for Louisiana's Gov. Earl K. Long for June 16.

Judge Gibson's formal order said the hearing is "for the best interests and protection of Earl K. Long as a mentally ill person."

The governor's wife earlier signed documents asking that Gibson hold a hearing aimed at committing Long for mental treatment.

Her action came after the governor showed signs of wanting to leave John Sealy Hospital here, where he started mental treatment Sunday following a hush trip from Louisiana.

The hearing is set for 10 a.m. (CST) in the Galveston County Courthouse annex.

Mrs. Long's petition asked that the governor be committed for 90 days or less. Gibson earlier committed the 63-year-old governor to the protective custody of the hospital.

The hearing June 16 will follow Texas law in that Long can be present and be represented by attorneys.

Judge Gibson appointed three Galveston attorneys to represent the Louisiana governor, but he said Long still may name his own attorneys to represent him at the hearing.

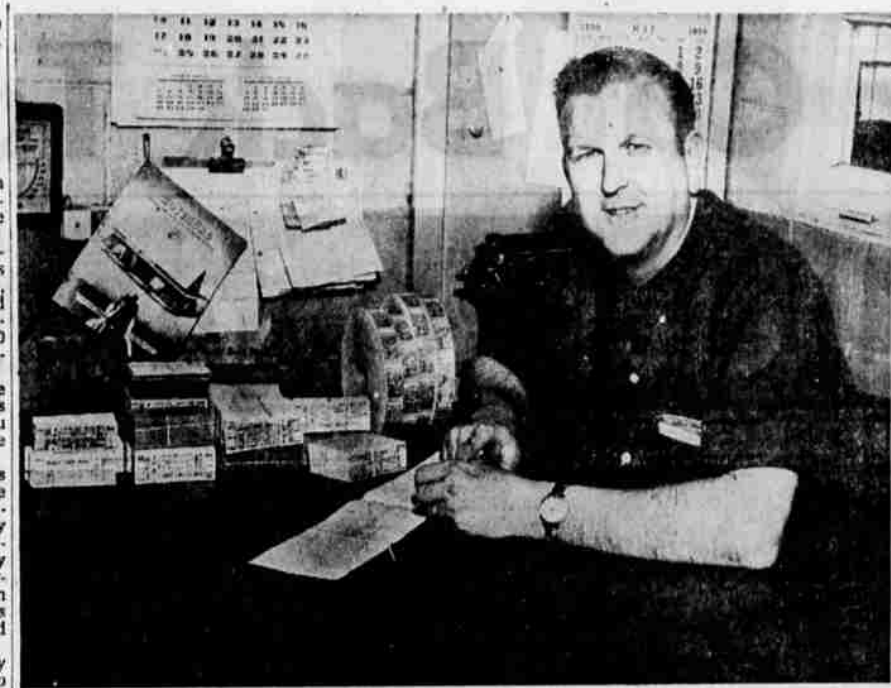

PORTLAND (AP)—Chlorine gas seeped out of a portable metal tank at a foundry today and enveloped seven men. None suffered serious damage, hospital attendants reported.

Five of the men were back at work within two hours after the gas escaped in the light metal foundry of the Pacific Chain and Manufacturing Plant at 4200 NW Yeon. The other two were held at Good Samaritan Hospital for observation.

Especially timely in this centennial year of tourist influx is a course on waitress training.

The class will be conducted from Monday through Thursday for two weeks, beginning next Monday. It will be held from 9 a.m. to 1:30 a.m. at the Umpqua Hotel. Twenty hours of instruction is involved and the fee is \$6 per student per course. A minimum enrollment of 12 is required.

The instructor is Lorraine Gaines, who has had college work in catering at the University of Minnesota. She has worked in several large hotels, managed coffee shops, and has thus had considerable experience in the field. Her husband is Dell Gaines, who is the head chef at the Umpqua Hotel.

The waitress will be informed during the instructional period of her place in the restaurant industry, meeting the customer, personal appearance, table setting and service, relations with other employees, health and sanitation, economics, suggestive selling, efficient planning, types of restaurant service, and testing on these subjects.

Kennedy says taking the course doesn't assure job placement. But, he adds, this is the centennial tourist year, and restaurants are going to need help, and the more well-qualified the better — both for the establishment and the good will of the visitors.

Huge Pit Plan At Lakeview

A great trench is replacing the underground workings of Lakeview Mining Co.'s White King uranium mine near Lakeview, Ore.

Six and a half million cubic yards of earth and ore will be scooped out in the next three years under a contract on which Isbell Construction Co. of Reno has been working since May 8.

By the time digging is completed, there will be a pit 1,500 feet long, 1,000 feet wide and 300 feet deep.

Then the Lakeview Mining Co. will start all over again with tunnels, boring down from the bottom of the pit and tunneling out for the ore that is known to extend at least 700 feet under the surface of the ground.

The open pit mining was decided on, said Hollis Dole, director of the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, because of problems connected with tunnel operations. Expanding on a report in the department's publication, the Ore-Bin, he said very heavy ground hampered sinking shaft No. 2 through which further development was planned, and cave-ins also became frequent.

Preliminary open pit mining began in March and all underground work was discontinued in April.

Hearing Tests Slated By State

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Board of Health will launch next month a pilot program to test the hearing of pre-school age children.

The board said tests will be made in eight counties—Clatsop, Wasco, Jefferson, Deschutes, Crook, Sherman, Umatilla and Baker.

The purpose of the program is to discover hearing defects so they can be treated before children enter school.

"The first five years of life are considered to be the most important years in the development of speech and language," the board said. "Children with serious hearing losses of who lose their hearing very early in infancy are often retarded in their ability to communicate with others."

Viet Namees See Astoria Fishing

ASTORIA, Ore. (AP)—Three Viet Namees officials Thursday inspected fishing installations in this area.

The guests of the Oregon Fish Commission were Dr. Ngo Ba Thanh, former chief of marine fisheries for his nation and a member of the Indo-Pacific Fisheries Council's technical committee; Tran Van Tri, chief of the water resources exploitation service of the directorate of fisheries of the Ministry of Economics; and Nguyen Van Tich, chief of the Bureau of socio-economics of the directorate of fisheries.

Albert M. Day of the Oregon Fish Commission said the men seek information to aid in developing the potential of their nation's fishing industry, which lacks modern facilities.

Portland Nixes Labor Demand

PORTLAND (AP)—City officials Thursday rebuffed the Multnomah County Labor Council on its request for a Labor Temple conference about pay increases for city-employed laborers.

Mayor Terry Schunk declared: "It's silly to think they can cite the city. My office and the council chamber are open if they wish to talk."

The council, in a letter to the Mayor and the four city commissioners, had proposed a Monday meeting in the Labor Temple.

The labor group has under consideration a proposal to put the council on its unfair list and pickets around the City Hall because the council granted no wage increases to the city's 490 laborers in its new budget.

Union leaders contend that city laborers get an average of \$70 monthly less than those on private jobs.

Commissioner William Bowes, who like the mayor is a former labor leader, said: "If they want to put us on their unfair list, let them go ahead and do it."

Schunk once represented the Firefighters Union in the Labor Council. Bowes was a Typographical Union delegate.

The council, that takes effect July 1 provides pay increases for about 2,800 city employees. But there will be no boosts for 1,034 others, including the 490 laborers.

The mayor and commissioners voted themselves a boost from \$12,880 to \$15,300 a year for the mayor and from \$11,080 to \$12,500 for each commissioner in the new budget.

Simpson Logging Cuts Mill Output

SHELTON (AP)—Fir plywood production at the Simpson Logging Co.'s seven Pacific Coast mills was cut back Thursday to 80 per cent of five-day capacity.

Reduced orders make reduced output necessary at the firm's seven plants in Washington, Oregon and California, H. W. McClary, general manager, said. Normal production will be resumed "as the market improves," he added.

It had been expanded above the normal five-day rate early this year in anticipation of a construction boom, McClary said.

"The curtailment is in keeping with Simpson's policy of operating its plywood plants according to demands of the market," he commented.

"While sales in the field have been lively, builders have been unable to firmly program their 1959 building due to lack of an appropriate housing bill being agreed on by Congress and the costly financing as the result of the more recent hiking of interest rates."

The Simpson plants are at Shelton, Olympia and McClary in Washington; Portland, Albany and Lyons in Oregon and Eureka, Calif.

Traffic Victim Dies Of Injuries

PORTLAND (AP)—One of two Salem men injured in an automobile accident May 9 near Dayton, Ore., died Thursday night at Providence Hospital here. He was Jeffrey Dennis Elliott, 22.

Craig Fear, 21, of Salem, also hurt, was released from a McMinville hospital about a week ago.

The two, state police said, were thrown from their car when it went out of control on an "S" curve. Fear was found some 60 feet from the vehicle.

The car skidded on gravel, hit a mail box post, veered onto the pavement, went into a ditch, rolled over, returned to the highway and came to rest upside down, police records showed.
