Big Don Newcombe, once the best pitcher in baseball, finally is on his way back.

It was Newk who won the first Cy Young Award and the National League's Most Valuable Player Award with 27 victories in 1956 for Brooklyn's last pennant-winning club. But the last two years, and the start of this season, were nightmares for the proud right-hander.

He had only an 11-12 record in 1957. Last year it was worse, (7-13) at the end of a season in which he had been traded by the Los Angeles Dodgers to Cincinnati.

This spring, after he finally admitted he had been bothered by arm and shoulder trouble, it looked like more of the same after he lost his first three decisions.

Four In Row
 Now Newk's won four straight, putting away a 5-4 record Friday night by checking San Francisco's slugger Giants 7-2 on three hits.

The defeat left the second-place Giants 2½ games behind Milwaukee, beaten 5-1 by Dodgers. The Chicago Cubs beat Pittsburgh's third-place Pirates, who had won three straight, 10-5. The St. Louis at Philadelphia game was rained out.

Newcombe, a few days shy of his 33rd birthday, had a one-hit shutout for five innings in a duel

with left-hander Johnny Antonelli, a long-time foe. Willie Kirkland's home run gave the Giants a 1-1 tie in the sixth, but the Reds, held to one run—on Roy McMillan's homer—and two hits for five innings, then chased Antonelli with five runs in the sixth.

Stocky Johnny Podres won his fourth straight for the Dodgers with a seven-hitter at Milwaukee.

Dale Long homered in a three-run first inning for the Cubs, and more at 300, and Ernie Banks hit a two-run homer, his 13th, as Chicago put it away against Vern Law (5-3) in a four-run second.

Red China In Squaw Controversy

Red China probably won't compete in the winter Olympics at Squaw Valley, Calif.—but the reason is a technicality and not as a result of action by the United States.

An official spokesman made this point Friday in attempting to clear up some of the confusion and controversy surrounding the recognition of Red China by the International Olympic Committee.

The IOC action last week in Munich drew protests in non-Communist countries, particularly in the United States where there was agitation for barring the Communist Chinese from the winter games.

The winter Olympics are scheduled Feb. 18-28.

The U. S. State Department called the IOC action "a clear act of political discrimination." Congressmen called for U. S. action in the matter. And Robert L. King, executive director of the Squaw Valley Games, said the Red Chinese "cannot and will not participate."

Kind added that the Nationalist Chinese, on the other hand, had applied before the IOC action and claimed they would be allowed to take part.

Red China, which quit the IOC in a huff in 1953 because Nationalist China was recognized, must be approved by various sports organizations and then ask for re-entry into the IOC.

The IOC has no meeting scheduled until just before the winter games. So there will be no opportunity for re-admitting Red China in time. Rules are that countries must enter the various sports at least eight weeks before the games.

Nationalist China, on the other hand, can only compete if it accepts the IOC directive that it enter under the name of Formosa or Taiwan.

In turning out Nationalist China, the IOC said Formosa did not represent the continental Chinese.

Avery Brundage, American president of the IOC, rejected criticism of the IOC action, saying the Olympics followed a policy of non discrimination — "Religious, racial or political."

Stuart Powers Record Homer

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Give him an opportunity and Dick Stuart of the Pittsburgh Pirates says he'll continue hitting 457-foot home runs or reasonable facsimiles anyway.

Stuart was referring to his classic blast over the center field wall Friday night against the Chicago Cubs.

Pittsburgh lost the game 10-5, but Stuart made history. It was the first time in the 30-year history of Forbes Field that anyone had hit a ball over this point of the wall, the farthest distance from home plate.

Stuart's blast came in the first inning off Cub starter Glen Hobbie. It drove in two runs and was his seventh round-tripper of the season.

"All the balls I have been hitting of late have been solid drives," he said. "But I'm still a little behind my home run capabilities. I have been sitting out quite a few games and naturally I'm losing some of my timing."

Stuart has been making on-again, off-again appearances as Pirate Manager Danny Mortagha's platoon hit, Ted Kluszewski and Rocky Nelson at first base.

"I sure wish I could play more often, then I could hit more home runs like that one last night," said Stuart.

Smith River Ramp OK'd

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission Friday revoked its fly-fishing-only regulations for Davis Lake and opened the shallows to all kinds of fishing effective Aug. 5.

In other action the commission authorized chemical treatment of Thompson Reservoir southwest of Silver Lake and McKay Reservoir near Pendleton to remove trash fish.

The Thompson poisoning project will cost \$14,808 and the McKay job \$34,000.

Three boat ramp projects were approved, two of them on the Coquille River, at Riverton and Arago. The third will be on the Smith River upstream from Gardiner.

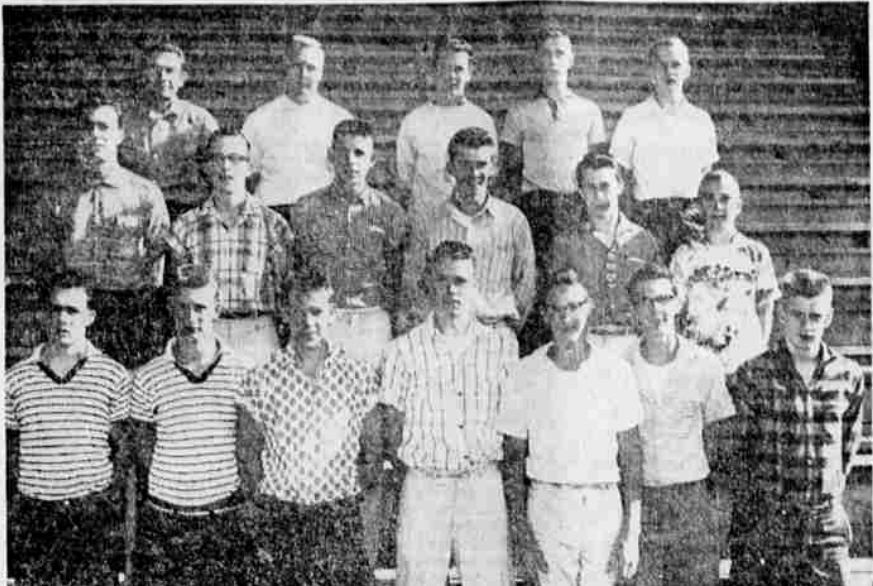
Javelin Mark Bested

Spahn Can't Stop Dodgers

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Dodgers' shift from Brooklyn to Los Angeles hasn't changed things with Warren Spahn. The Milwaukee outpaw still has no luck against them.

The Dodgers, beaten four straight times by the Braves after defeating Spahn in the initial 1959 engagement, took on new life Friday night when they saw the 35-year-old veteran warming up.

Los Angeles wasted no time. Junior Gilliam rapped the first pitch for a double to launch the 5-1 Dodger victory before 39,825, largest crowd since opening day at County Stadium.

Before retiring for a pinch-hitter in the seventh, Spahn was tagged for four runs and nine hits. Instead of picking up his eighth victory and No. 254 in the National League, he suffered his sixth setback of the campaign.

The Dodgers are the only National League team with an edge on Spahn since he won his first game after returning in 1948 from Army combat service. They have defeated him 27 times while losing only 14.

"I can't figure it," Spahn said. "I think I pitch just as well against them as I do other clubs, but it's a lot tougher to win. Even when they don't do much, it seems we can't get any runs."

The elk season will close in the north and south coastal areas Nov. 11 and in the Cascades, the Northeastern and the Southeastern sections Nov. 22.

The antelope season will run from Aug. 15-19 and the archers' season will run from Sept. 5-27.

Tiger, Calhoun Fight To Draw

NEW YORK (AP) — On the theory that one good fight deserves another, Dick Tiger and Rory Calhoun probably will do it again, July 16 at Syracuse, N.Y.

Calhoun closed tonight to get a draw with the British Empire midweight champion Friday night at Madison Square Garden. By winning the tenth round on all three official scorecards, Calhoun escaped defeat.

Referee Mark Conn had it 5-5 in both rounds and points. Judge Bill Reht and Tiger a 6-3-1 winner and Judge Bill Forst thought Calhoun deserved an edge 5-4-1. The AP cards was 5-5 with Tiger the winner 6-5 on points because of a decisive edge in the fourth.

"I thought I won," said Tiger, a Nigerian whose British title, of course, was not at stake. "I will be better next time. I came here expecting tough fights. I welcome them."

Calhoun, 163½, likewise thought he won. His manager, Frank Baehman, said Tiger hit on the break which the newcomer claimed is legal in England. Tiger complained about Calhoun's low blows which drew a warning from Conn in the ninth.

Tiger, 163½, has been in America only 12 days. The Tiger's real name, incidentally, is Thea (pronounced H-thee-yo).

Teddy Brenner, Garden Matchmaker, said Tiger and the White Plains, N.Y. scrapper might fight into a July 16 date at Syracuse. However, it isn't definite yet.

22 Persons Hurt In Auto Crash During \$10 Race

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. (AP)—A race car smashed into the bleachers, injuring 22 persons among a crowd of 500 at a small dirt track Friday night. The accident occurred during the first race on the program, for a purse of \$10.

One of those injured seriously was Ronnie Lee Neidel, 8, son of the wrecked car's driver, Albert M. (Bud) Neidel, 30, St. Joseph. The father suffered a bruised shoulder and shock. Of the 22 injured, 21 were hospitalized. Many were children.

Neidel's modified stock car and one driven by Jerry Hayes, Topeka, Kan., sideswiped on a turn of the quarter-mile Beverly Speedway while doing about 70 miles an hour.

They were the only two cars left in the race.

Neidel's car shot off the banked turn, over an eight-foot embankment and fence. It did a half-flip in the air and smashed into the bleachers upside down.

The car slid along the bottom row of seats, sweeping spectators before it. It hurtled across a space between bleacher sections and crashed to a halt against the next section.

Screams of the injured added to the panic. Frantic parents sought their children, many of whom were sitting on the bottom rows of the bleachers.

Ambulances shuttled the injured to hospitals. The track is about half a mile outside the city along U.S. 169 and police had to struggle to keep the road open as motorists swarmed to the scene.

Extra doctors and nurses were called in to help at Sisters Hospital and Missouri Methodist Hospital.

The track owner, Ardale Chambers, was out of town. His wife said the track carried insurance only on race drivers, none on spectators.
