

Black Sox Sweep Seattle Team In Opening Series

The national champion Drain Black Sox were away and winging toward another outstanding season today after sweeping a pair from B & B Hardwood of Seattle in a season lid-lifting series at Drain.

The home-standers triumphed Saturday night by scoring a pair of runs to break a 3-3 deadlock in the eighth inning, bringing the final tally to 5-3. Sunday afternoon, things were easier. Drain crossed the plate seven times in a wild first inning to salt away an eventual 15-3 victory.

Seattle hurler Phil Godfrey was as tough as his mound opponent, Elwood Hahn, until the eighth inning of the Saturday scrap. The ex-Seattle University chucker was relieved by Stuart Hanson in that inning, during which the Black Sox put together a single, two

walks, an error by Godfrey, a sacrifice fly and a squeeze play to score the decisive counters.

Sox Score Quickly

Drain led off the scoring in the first as two runs came across on an infield error. The other run was produced by a sacrifice fly. A pair of walks and a single were garnered by the Black Sox during the stanza.

Three singles and two walks accounted for the Seattle runs in the seventh.

Hahn, a lefty from Washington State College, was in constant trouble — chiefly as a result of 11 walks. But he used 14 strikeouts to hurl himself out of one jam after another. He fanned 14 over the route.

Godfrey struck out two and walked seven. He allowed six hits to Hahn's five.

The hitting honors were fairly well divided, with wiry WSC infielder Joe August collecting a pair of singles in four trips for Drain. Jerry Bartow had a triple and player-manager Ray Stratton a double for the Sox. Ellis Olson, who just finished a catching career at the University of Oregon, drove in two runs — both on sacrifice flies. Ed Madsen gathered two hits in three tries for Seattle.

Visitors In Nightmare

Sunday, the visitors went through two pitchers before a third finally put out the fire in Drain's big first inning. A two-run double by Stratton, four singles, two walks, two errors and a hit batsman were on the scorecards before reliever Hanson doused the rally. Seattle pitchers Ron Sloy and Larry Polson succeeded in retiring only one Drain batter apiece before Hanson's entry.

Stan Dmochowsky twirled shut-out ball for six innings as his mates picked up two tallies in the second and three more in the sixth for good measure. Then the Sox matched Seattle's three-run output over the rest of the route in what was, by then, a routine effort.

Dmochowsky whiffed four, and gave up eight hits walked four while his mates were combining Seattle hurling for 15 hits. Nine free passes also aided the home cause.

They took advantage of an error to score the winning run in the opener. Jerry Mason had led off with a single, he scored and tied up the game when Mike Yaremchuk doubled and then Yaremchuk came home on the error. Carlos Heron's double was the big blow for the Brones.

A walk started Salem's similar sweep Sunday. Bill Augustoni issued the pass to Hank Bivens after Yakima had tied it up on doubles by Chuck Dillard and Herman Lewis. The Senators took the nightcap behind the four-hit throwing of Don Oosterveen. Bivens drove in two runs with a double and also scored on an attempted pickoff.

Herb Herbel shut out Tri-City 3-0 on one hit Sunday night after Eugene had dropped the opener 4-0. The young right-hander from Colorado State struck out four and walked the same number in making his record 1-1. Cal Bauer's punch single got past the mound in the fourth for the only Brave safety.

Demos, Adrian State Champs

PORTLAND (AP)—Home runs by Dave Freeland and Jerry Walker and tight pitching by Terry Baker powered Jefferson of Portland to the Oregon Class A-1 high school baseball championship 7-1 over The Dalles Saturday.

The victory capped for Jefferson what probably is the greatest sports year ever for any Oregon high school.

Jefferson's Democrats added the baseball crown to the state football title won this year and Portland Interscholastic titles won in football, basketball, baseball and track.

Sherwood came from behind in the seventh inning to win the Class A-2 crown 6-5 over Sutherlin and Adrian won 5-4 to gain the Class B title in an encounter with Gaston in other games of the tripleheader.

Jefferson glided into a four-run lead as many starts Sunday. Freeland laced his big blow with three aboard deep into right center field at Multnomah Stadium, the home of the Pacific Coast League Portland Beavers.

Walker's powerful swat in the fifth inning with two aboard went over the fence. It cleared the fence at the 325-foot mark.

His blow was only the second by a prep player to clear the wall of the park. The first was last year by Bill Lukens of Monmouth-Independence.

Adrian's victory over Gaston, the game that opened the championship triple-header, was a repeat performance. Last year Adrian won over Gaston for the Class B crown 12-2.

Phil Hatch hurled four-hit ball to gain credit for the victory. The defeat was the first in 12 starts for Land Gooding, who also yielded only four hits. But Gooding was plagued by six errors, walks, passed balls and a wild pitch.

Hit Barrage, Tight Hurling Stop 1st Foes

It was like a Wild West shoot-'em-up Saturday and a tense Alfred Hitchcock production Sunday. And the "villains" — at least to most of the spectators — were the victors both times.

The charlatans were the Roseburg Junior Legion baseballers, who dumped Crater by a frightful 19-9 count Saturday and disappointed another home town crowd Sunday by squeaking out a 1-0 decision over strong Medford. Both games were non-counters.

Another non-loop fray is on tap tentatively for 5 p.m. Tuesday at Riddle, where Roseburg will take on Myrtle Creek. Roseburg mentor Bill Harper said he probably will start rookie hurler Ron Lake against the Southern Douglas club.

A 14-hit barrage and tight, though sometimes wild, pitching by Bob Whipple combined to off-

set a rash of eight Roseburg errors in the Saturday tilt.

Five of the Lockwood Motors nine's misuses came in the sixth frame, when the hosts used the errors, a scratch bingle and two walks to tally six times without getting the ball out of the infield.

But, by that time, it was a lost cause for Crater.

Roseburg started the scoring while the "play ball" call still echoed, bringing across five counters in the first. Gene Wagner led off with a walk. Then a string of five consecutive singles by Jim Booth, John Livingston, Les Bogner, Chuck Hiney and Ted Kolberg did the damage. Bogner's blow was good for two RBIs.

Wagner led off the second, again, with a walk. Booth stroked another single and Livingston got a free pass, loading the bags. Then Wagner tallied on an ensuing error — one of eight by Crater — and Booth came across on a sacrifice fly by Hiney. Livingston scored on another error.

Five More Added
Roseburg added to its 8-0 lead in the fourth when Kolberg poled out a double. The rally continued as Marvin French singled, moving Kolberg to third. Kolberg scored on a ground ball to second by Whipple, who was safe at first on the late throw to the plate. After Marlin Burgess walked, Wagner belted a two-bagger which brought the score to 13-0.

Crater came right back to score a pair in their half of the fourth and added their big six in the sixth, plus one more in the seventh.

A six-run Roseburg seventh, however, already had put the game well out of reach of the hosts before Crater's last-gasp effort in the bottom of the inning.

The outburst was highlighted by Livingston's bases-loaded triple. Three walks, a pair of errors and singles by Bob Scott and Dave Cellers helped matters along.

Booth Hits
Booth, the ex-Yoncalita pitcher who is being tried in right field, wielded his bat for three hits in four trips. Livingston gathered a single and his big triple. Bogner and Kolberg each singled twice in four trips.

Whipple walked 10, struck out five and allowed six scattered hits. Jerry Halladay and Livingston combined to shackle the strong Medfordites Sunday, giving up only three hits and walking none. Halladay struck out five and allowed two of the three hits before he was relieved at the beginning of the fifth by the Glide standout. Livingston proceeded to fan four more.

Medford twirler Bill Anhorn also was stingy with the hits, however, and the fray was 0-0 going into the final frame.

Game Decided
Hiney rapped a single in the decisive seventh, but was cut down at second on French's grounder. French then stole second to set up the tally, which came across on a clean line-drive single to center by Bogner.

Bogner accounted for two of Roseburg's seven hits, as did Booth.

Medford was able to put men in scoring positions only twice in the course of the game. A single and an error put a man on second in the first stanza and Anhorn's double — the only extra base blow of the scrap — did likewise in the fifth.
