Twice the Sutherlin Bulldogs came back from two-run deficits in the A-2 championship fray at Multnomah Stadium Saturday night. But the battling Bulldogs saw their efforts go for naught, as the Sherwood Bowmen came up with a two-run outburst of their own in the top of the seventh. This gave the Bowmen a 6-5 win and the state title.

The Bulldogs picked up only five hits off right-hander Jim Regan in scoring their five runs. One of these was a triple to deep right center in the second by Don Ralls. Dave Mansfield was greeted by trouble in the fourth inning and retired to center field as Swede Sikstrom sent Jerry Tucker to the mound. This marked the first time in playoff games that Mansfield failed to go the distance.

Tucker went two and two-thirds innings before he was relieved in the seventh.

Yanked On Rule

Actually, Tucker possibly would have finished the game except the Bulldog mentor made two trips to the mound in that fateful seventh. Prop rules state a coach must replace his chucker on the second trip, thus Mansfield came back to the mound with one away. This oversight was the reason Tucker was removed.

Leftfielder Terry Hite and second baseman Red Kirkpatrick were the Bowmen doing the damage to Sutherlin's championship hopes.

Hite, batting fifth in the Sherwood order, fattened his .294 average with a 3-3 night and one RBI. He also scored three of the six Sherwood runs.

Kirkpatrick, the No. 8 hitter, went into the game with a .255 average and also connected for 3-3 and he picked up two RBIs.

The Bowmen had men on base every inning but the first and left a total of 10 stranded. The Bulldogs contributed four boots to help the Sherwood cause.

Singles by Jerry Richwine and Kirkpatrick in the second scored Ron Stark and Hite with the first two runs of the game.

'Dogs Come Back

The Bulldogs made their first comeback in the bottom of the second. Ralls led off with his triple and Laddie Crippen drew a walk. Ralls scored on the first of two passed balls in the inning and McCord belted a single to left to score Crippen and it was a 2-2 ball game.

In the top of the fourth, the Bowmen added another tally with the Bulldogs preventing further damage with a doubleplay. The one run was walked in by Mansfield as he experienced his first real control trouble and walked four consecutive hitters.

In the fifth, another run was scored by the Bowmen, this time on three singles off Tucker.

The Bulldogs came back in the bottom of the sixth with three runs to take a 5-4 advantage. Gordy Atterbury was issued a walk and Tucker beat out an infield single, but was later thrown out on an attempted squeeze bunt.

Crippen gained life on a fielder's choice and McCord walked. After Atterbury had scored on an error, Mansfield connected on a single to right to score Crippen and McCord and the Bulldogs had a slim one-run lead.

The seventh was started with Hite working Tucker for a walk and Roger McFall sacrificed him along. He went to third on an error and scored on Richwine's double down the third-base line.

Mansfield Returns
At this point, Mansfield returned to the mound and, on the 2-2 pitch, Kirkpatrick sliced a single to right to score the go-ahead run as Richwine crossed the plate.

Mansfield retired the next hitter on a ground-out and whiffed the final batter to end the top of the seventh.

Regan recorded 11 strikeouts and issued walks to three. Mansfield struck out four and walked four. Tucker whiffed five and gave up walks to two.

Fromm Pitches Javelin 243 Feet In AAU Meet

ET. LEWIS (AP)—John Fromm hadled off and pitched the javelin 243 feet 10 1/2 inches Saturday and he was right in style—16 other records were broken in the 8th annual Washington State AAU Invitational track and field meet.

The former Pacific Lutheran College star, performing for the Seattle Olympic Club, beat the meet standard by more than 31 feet.

Cliff LaBounty broke the pole vault record in the men's division by clearing the bar at 13 feet 8. John Gramer of Mt. Vernon went the same height and—naturally—broke the record in the high school division by more than a foot.

The University of Washington took the open (men's) division with 51 1/2 points; Vancouver, B.C., won the women's division with 55 and North Vancouver, B.C., the high school division with 22 points.

Bourne Awarded Purse After Royal Bows Out

Tony Bourne, after dropping the first two falls to Nelson Royal, came back to win a return grudge match Saturday night in wrestling at the fairgrounds.

Bourne put in two jarring body slams to put Royal away. Royal was unable to continue the match and Bourne was awarded the purse.

Big John Witte won the opening match, beating Roughhouse Coleman in two falls out of three.

Witte nearly tangled with Bourne at the end of the Bourne-Royal match and challenged Bourne for a match in Roseburg June 27.

The vaccine produces temperature, spots and protective antibodies against the disease without making the youngsters sick, it was reported.

The Portland Beavers tightened their hold on third place in the Pacific Coast League baseball race by overpowering Phoenix, 13-7, at Phoenix Sunday.

The Beavers moved to Salt Lake City for a three-game series starting Monday. Then they will go to Sacramento for a five-game set with the league-leading Solons before returning home to open a stand June 16 against Phoenix.

Eddie Fisher, Phoenix's nine-game pitching winner, was the chief victim of a 19-hit batting assault Sunday.

The Beavers, after scoring seven runs in the seventh inning, had an 11-2 lead before pitcher Howie Reed let up a bit. He yielded five runs to Phoenix in the last three innings, but coasted to his sixth victory in eight decisions.

Jim Greengrass, who has been on a hot batting streak for Portland, clubbed a homer, a double and a single, driving in three runs. Russ Snyder also hit a homer, one of his three hits, for

Portland. Jack Littrell was the only Beaver to go hitless.

Sacs Lose

The Sacramento Solons, who make a habit of scattering losses, dropped their first doubleheader of the season Sunday but only one game from their Pacific Coast League baseball lead.

The Vancouver Mounties came up with effective pitching to defeat Sacramento 5-1 and 6-1 while second-place San Diego split with Spokane, winning the first 4-2 and losing the second 5-4.

The day's action cut the Solons' PCL advantage to 2 1/2 games.

Salt Lake City scored six runs in the wild eighth inning of its nightcap to beat Seattle 10-5 after the cellar-dwelling Rainiers had won the opener 13-7.

Eddie Basinski's first home run of the season was a grand-slammer that ruined the league-leaders in the second game. It also handed Carl Greene his first loss after a half dozen victories on the mound. The Solons were blanked until the seventh and final inning when two singles, a walk and Ed Kazak's pinch-hit sacrifice brought in their only run.

Al Jones and Rudy Regalado both slammed homers in the Padres' opening victory. Jones' drive broke open a 1-1 tie in the sixth. Regalado, who had singled in a run in the first, added another with his sixth homer of the season in the seventh. Jake Striker made his record 5-2 with the win.

A four-run outburst evened things up for the Indians in the second game. Tony Rolig singled

off Russ Heman. A walk, error, walk and single by "red Hatfield brought in two runs and sent Heman to the showers. A sacrifice fly and Steve Bliko's single off Bill Werle sent in the others.

Two of the Padre runs came in the fifth on back-to-back homers by Steve Jankowski and Werle.

The Salt Lake-Seattle second game almost turned into a battle royal when Bee Carlos Bernier advanced on the mound, bat in hand, after a ball thrown by Darrell Martin had bounced off his helmet. The benches emptied but players held each other back and the umpires kept control by banishing Bernier.

OSC Tracksters Due At NCAA

CORVALLIS (AP)—Two members of Oregon State's track and field squad had a warning up meet over the weekend and will enter the NCAA championships this weekend with marks that make them likely point winners.

Wayne Moss jumped 6 feet 6 1/2 inches at the Compton Relays Saturday, placing second to Charlie Dumas of USC. Darrell Horn was third in the broad jump with only two jumps. Because of an injured leg, which showed signs of tightening, he did not make his third try.

With these two in the NCAA meet at Lincoln, Neb., this weekend will be Cliff Cordy in the 800 and John Simpson in the mile.

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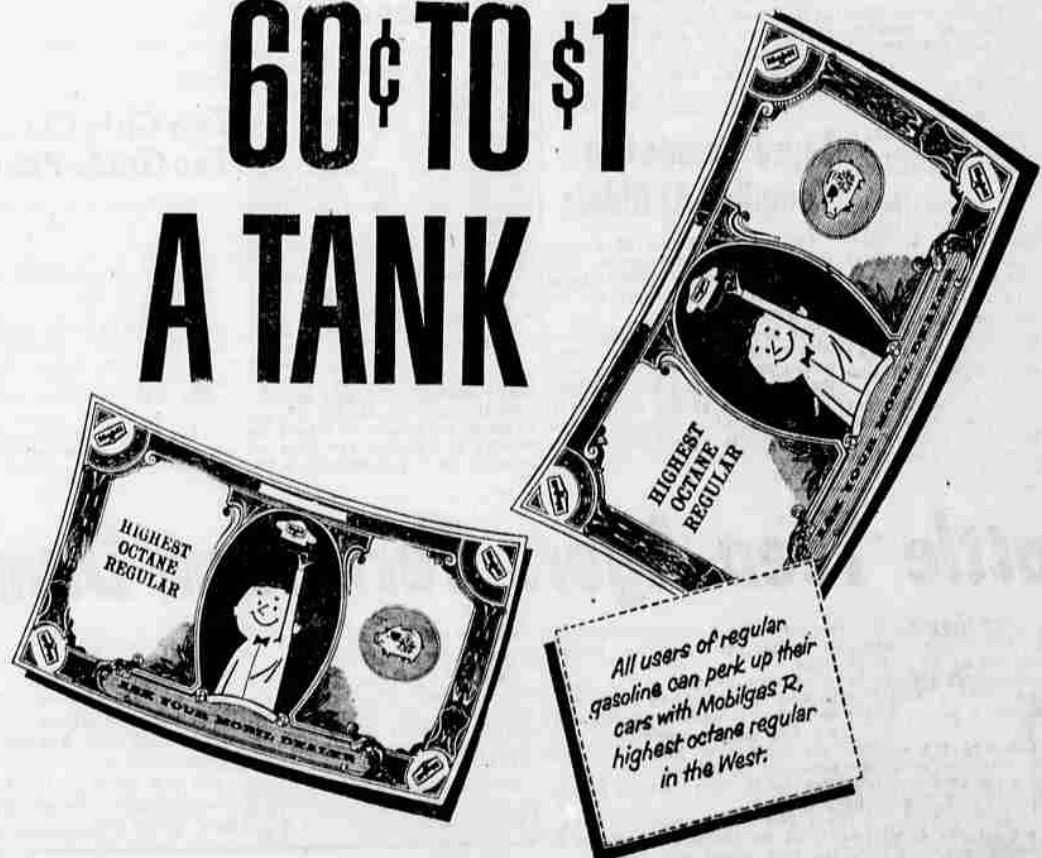
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
