

College Credit Courses Listed At Schools Here

Four courses will be offered for full college credit in Roseburg's fall quarter of adult extension classes.

Harry Jacoby, assistant superintendent of Roseburg schools, announced this fall's courses will be general biology, preparation of audio-visual aids, health-education workshop and painting.

The first three courses are three-hour projects and the art course is a two-hour setup. All will be conducted at Roseburg High School.

The biology course will begin Sept. 29 at 7 p.m. in Room 108. It will concern animal and plant life in relation to environment, including the study of heredity, the nervous system, organic evolution and other aspects of the subject.

The audio-visual course will be offered Mondays and Tuesdays beginning at 7 p.m. Sept. 28 in Room 6 of the Social Arts Building. Concerned with aids for more efficient teaching of large and diversified classes, its prerequisites are senior standing or consent of instructor.

Oct. 8 is the opening date of the health-education course, with Thursday class sessions scheduled for 7 p.m. in the gymnasium.

Both beginning and advanced

students may undertake the art course, which includes instruction in the use of oil color, water color and other media. The first class will be Wednesday, Sept. 30 at 7 p.m. in the art room.

Registration fee for the first three courses is \$31.50 and the art course fee is \$21.

U. S. Military Budget May Persist Around \$40 Billion Mark For Next 3 or 4 Years

WASHINGTON (AP)—The military budget may hover around the present 41-billion-dollar mark for the next three or four years, says Wilfred J. McNeil, veteran Pentagon fiscal chief.

McNeil, who is leaving his job soon, suggested Saturday in talking with newsmen that perhaps a group of a half dozen "elder statesmen" might be set up to advise the secretary of defense when the Joint Chiefs of Staff can't agree or when military budget makers fall into dispute.

In response to questions, McNeil advanced these ideas:

1. Although the military budget may remain at about its present total up to about 1963, the trend toward fewer men and more advanced weapons will continue.

However, further manpower cuts probably won't be drastic — maybe about 100,000 over the next several years. Present total military manpower is about 2 1/2 million. A hundred thousand fewer men on the rolls would mean about 500 million dollars more available for procurement of new weapons and other equipment.

2. In military buying, the trend will be toward fewer airplanes, more missiles. Missiles will require less money than manned aircraft for maintenance and operation. For one thing, a missile doesn't need 50 hours of training flight a month, using up fuel and wearing out parts. A B52 bomber costs about \$1,500 an hour to fly, exclusive of the pay of the crew.

3. Whatever economies come from smaller payrolls, cuts in aircraft maintenance costs, and other items probably will be balanced out by slowly rising prices, requirements for research and development and other factors.

4. The final drive to whip the budget for fiscal 1961 into shape will begin about Nov. 1. McNeil will leave on that date, to become president of the Grace Steamship Lines. He said he would like to have left earlier but was asked to remain to complete preliminary preparation of the next budget.

Defendant Wins In Suit For Traffic Damages

After four days of evidence, a circuit court jury took just two hours Friday afternoon to find in favor of the defendant in the civil case of Helen A. Davich against Halton Tractor Co.

The case grew out of a collision Sept. 19, 1958 on Highway 99 four miles south of Roseburg. In her complaint, Mrs. Davich alleged she received personal injuries when her automobile was struck by a pickup truck driven by Chester C. Vohs, an employee of Halton Tractor Co.

She sought \$75,000 general damages and \$2,939.20 special damages.

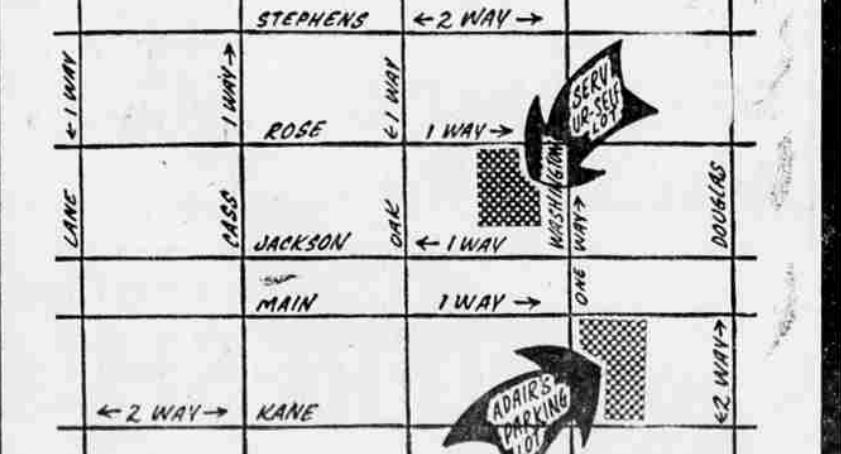
