

Whitman To Get Eighth President

WALLA WALLA (AP) — Whitman College's centenary celebration will be climaxed next Sunday with the inauguration of Dr. Louis B. Perry, the school's eighth president.

Representatives of more than 100 colleges and universities have accepted invitations to the inaugural ceremonies for the former economics professor from Pomona College, California.

Dr. Perry succeeds Dr. Chester C. Macey, long-time president of the state's oldest college. Although Dr. Perry assumed his duties in July, the ceremonies were held off to coincide with the end of the centennial celebration.
