



Medford Ups Lead In Prep Grid Ballot

Medford, which has dominated upstate football the past two years, strengthened its first-place position in the Oregon Associated Press high school football poll this week.

Its prestige boomed with a 54-6 win over Crater of Central Point, fifth straight of the season.

That came at the same time as second-ranked Jefferson was getting a scare before winning its 28th straight game, 20-13, from lightly regarded Wilson in the Portland city league.

Jefferson is the defending state champion of the past two years. It won the title last year by beating Medford, 21-7.

Tornado Gains Votes

Twelve of the 16 sports writers and broadcasters who cast ballots made Medford No. 1 choice. The other four picked the Black Tornado for second. Medford had 156 points to 144 for Jefferson, No. 2 in the balloting.

There was a general reshuffling of the other teams in the top ten. Marshfield, badly outclassed by Medford in suffering its only setback early in the season, moved from No. 4 last week to third after a 26-7 defeat of North Eugene. The losers, ninth last week, fell out of the top ten.

Pendleton, despite a 27-7 win over La Grande, dropped from third to No. 4, two points behind Marshfield.

Undefeated Lincoln's fifth Portland league victory, a 21-12 affair over Franklin, helped move the Cardinals from No. 6 last week to fifth.

Beaverton climbed from tenth last week to No. 6 after downing Astoria, 13-6, in a Portland area Metropolitan League game.

Axemen Slide
South Eugene slipped from fifth to No. 7 after a 7-0 loss to North Salem. The victory brought North Salem back into the select group, in ninth position.

St. Helens, which beat Forest

Grove 14-0 for its fifth victory, retained eighth place.

Grants Pass, improving with every game, displaced Klamath Falls in the No. 10 spot by beating Klamath Falls, 31-0.

North Bend was strongest among the runners-up, getting considerable support after a 28-25 victory over Roseburg.

Art Wall Named 'Golf' Of Year

DUNEDIN, Fla. (AP)—Art Wall Jr., a 35-year-old exponent of the golf grip, is the PGA professional golfer of the year for 1959.

Harold Sargent, president of the Professional Golfers' Assn., announced the selection of the slim shotmaker for the award today.

The veteran of 11 pro seasons will receive the trophy awarded annually at a dinner in Clearwater, Fla., Dec. 8.

Wall, Pocahontas, Pa., is the reigning Masters Tournament champion. Leading money winner of the year with earnings of \$53,142, he also won the Motor City Open, the Azalea Open and the Bing Crosby Tournament en route to 1959 pro of the year honor.

Colts' Director Tabbed Best For Bell's Job

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Carroll Rosenbloom, majority owner of the Baltimore Colts, said today that his general manager, Don Kellest, "would be the best man for the job of National Football League commissioner if none of the older statesmen is available."

Rosenbloom said that by older statesmen he meant veterans of the league such as George Halas, owner of the Chicago Bears, and George Preston Marshall, owner of the Washington Redskins.

Both Halas and Marshall have said they don't want the job.

It was pointed out to Rosenbloom that by process of elimination this possibly would make Kellest, 50, a frontrunner among several others for the post vacated Sunday by the sudden death of Bert Bell.

Tigers Retain College Edge

Louisiana State pulled farther away from Northwestern today in the race for the season's college football honors but, looking back, saw not just one but three teams doing its tail.

Close behind LSU and Northwestern, still 1-2 in the weekly Associated Press poll, came Texas and Georgia Tech, both making threatening tumbles at the top position.

Also, while LSU drew 83 of the 129 votes cast by sports writers and broadcasters, the voting showed there was no clear-cut opinion on the No. 1 team. Eleven teams, the largest number in recent memory, shared first place nominations.

The pace-setters, who had only a 23-point bulge over Northwestern a week ago, went 217 ahead this week on the strength of their 27-3 rout of Miami (Fla.). Northwestern squeaked past Minnesota 6-0.

On the basis of 10 points for a first place vote, nine for second, etc., Louisiana State had 1,223 points compared with 1,096 for the runner-up team from the Big Ten. But both Texas and Georgia Tech showed growing strength.

Texas, which handed Oklahoma its second setback 19-12, took over third place from Georgia Tech, which dropped to fourth despite a 14-7 decision over tough Tennessee. Syracuse and Penn State climbed into the upper bracket with impressive triumphs over the two Eastern service eleven's. Syracuse walloped Navy 32-6 and Penn State upset Army 17-11.

Troy Leads Big 5 In Most Statistics

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Southern California's Trojans, although idle last week, will lead the Big 5 Conference Tuesday in five of the six major team statistical departments.

Stanford, which throws almost twice as much as any other team in the American Assn. of Western Universities, hung on to passing honors.

USC leads in rushing with 738 net yards for a 246-yard game average, in total offense with 1,043 yards for a 347.6 average, and in every defensive category. The Trojans have allowed only 379 yards for a total defense average of 126.3; only 174 yards to rushers for a 58-yard average; and only 205 yards to passers for a 68.3 average.

Stanford has gained 788 yards passing for a 197 average. The Indians threw 116 times and completed 64.

Washington's Huskies, who beat Stanford 10-0 in the only league game to date, leading in interceptions with 11 for 109 yards and two touchdowns.

California, the most scored-on team in the circuit, leads in kick-off returns with 21 for 339 yards, and Stanford leads in punt averages with 41 yards per kick.

Washington, ranking just behind USC in rushing offense, rushing defense and total defense, gets a chance to take over Saturday when the Huskies and Trojans—both unbeaten—Collide at Seattle.

Dick Norman of Stanford is the league's top passer, having completed 52 of 93 throws for 640 yards. He also leads in individual total offense with 640 yards in 103 plays.

Steve Bates of Cal is the top rusher with 177 yards in 20 attempts.

Nation's Sports Figures Pay Respect To Bell

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Sports leaders from all over America began arriving here today to pay their final respects to Bert Bell, the late commissioner of the National Football League.

Requiem mass will be celebrated at 11 a.m. Wednesday for Bell—a man whom NFL owners, coaches and players say, cannot be fully replaced.

Bell will be buried in Calvary Cemetery near his Narberth, Pa., home. Honorary pallbearers will be NFL club owners.

The 63-year-old commissioner suffered a fatal heart attack Sunday at Franklin Field while watching the Eagles—Steelers game.

Prep Frays, Jamboree, Harrier Contests Slated

One of the heaviest sports week-ends of the fall prep season is slated this week for Douglas County athletes.

Eleven football games, one junior high grid jamboree and a four-team cross country meet are slated this weekend.

In the junior high jamboree, Central and Joseph Lane Junior High School teams will perform in three games Thursday night at Finlay Field. The midweek, seventh and eighth grade teams from the two schools will play each other in the first annual junior high grid jamb.

Starting time for the night of football is 7 p.m., with the midweek playing a 10 minute game; the seventh graders playing two six minutes halves and the eighth

graders playing four seven minute quarters.

Harriers Mix
The Roseburg cross country team hosts teams from Grants Pass, Ashland and Douglas in the fifth meet of the year for the Indians.

And the county football teams have eleven games on tap, including eight league games.

The Umpqua Valley League plays a full round of games as the league-leaders, Sutherlin and Douglas, host Oakland and Glendale respectively and Riddle is at Myrtle Creek.

The Bulldogs (3-1) will attempt to pad their 2-0 league record at the expense of the Oakers (1-4). The Trojans place their 2-3 season mark on the line against the tough Wildcats (3-2). Riddle (3-1) is expected to down the Myrtle Creek Vikings (1-4) and retain a slim chance at the title.

The Glendale-Douglas fray is a Saturday contest and the other two are slated for Friday night.

Tigers Test Eagles
Bico B League action has the

potent Yoncalla Eagles (5-0) hosting the Canyonville Tigers (1-3). The Eagles are 1-0 in league action and the Tigers have a 1-1 loop mark.

An interesting contest is expected at Elkton as the Elks (1-3) host the Days Creek Wolves (1-3). The other league member, the Powers Cruisers (4-1) travel to North Bend for a date with the Bulldog JV's.

The Roseburg Indians step out of Midwestern League action Friday night at Finlay Field to host the District 8-A-1 Vikings of North Salem. The Indians take a 1-4 season mark into the non-counter.

Trico League six-man play has the Camas Valley Hornets (1-3) hosting the league-leading Triangle Lake Lakers. And in Emerald League action, the Drain Warriors (1-3-1) host the Elmira Falcons.

One Rogue Valley League contest is slated for Saturday and has the Glendale Pirates traveling to Klamath County for a date with the Henley Hornets. The Pirates are winless in five outings and 0-2 in league play.

Cus, Others Face Charge

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission instructed its attorneys today to prepare charges of misconduct against Cus D'Amato, manager of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson; Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., and William Rosensohn, who promoted the June 26 Patterson-Johansson bout.

The three also were asked to show cause why their licenses should not be revoked.

The commission also said that Charles Antonucci, known in boxing circles as Charley Black, was forbidden to participate in the promotion of any pro boxing bout or to attend any event under the jurisdiction of the commission.

Today's decisions and orders stemmed from the long investigation of the promotional aspects of the Patterson-Johansson bout in which the Swede knocked out Patterson in the third round.

A subsequent feud within Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., promoter of the bout, resulted in the ouster of Rosensohn as president and brought to light many business details which the commission, the district attorney and the state attorney general all felt should be investigated.

The fight itself never has been questioned.

D'Amato was suspended by the commission two weeks ago when he failed to appear during its investigation.

Black, a personal friend of D'Amato's, moved into Rosensohn Enterprises after it obtained the signed contracts of the two fighters. It now is headed by Vincent J. Velella, Harlem attorney.

Rosensohn Enterprises has the license for a return bout tentatively scheduled for next spring.

Reds Buy Suds' Hurler

CINCINNATI (AP)—The Cincinnati Reds today bought Dave Stenhouse, 26, a righthand pitcher from their Seattle farm team of the Pacific Coast League. Stenhouse won 12 games and lost 13 for seventh-place Seattle last year.

Toppling Tenpins... No. 12 Foot, Arm Together

In any approach, the movement should be made with one objective—to have the left foot and right arm reach the foul line together. If the foot arrives ahead of the ball or the ball is there first the body will be completely off balance and the delivery cannot possibly be smooth.

Faults here can stem from practically everything you've done before this final guiding step. If the pushaway has been done correctly, then perhaps you are holding the ball too long at the height of the backswing. Or not bringing it back far enough and coming forward ahead of your steps.

If you find your delivery is poor check on this. They both have to be there together, the left foot and the right arm.

The left foot should be the brake at the foul line, so this foot-arm alignment shouldn't be hard to accomplish. You're not trying to keep up with anything moving. It's a law. If you're breaking it, you're not helping your scores.

NEXT: The right spot for the ball to start rolling.

Cas Views Film, Says Refs Right

EUGENE (AP)—Len Casanova, University of Oregon's head football coach, said today that after looking at the Oregon-San Jose game movies, he thought that most of the penalties charged against Oregon in the 35-12 victory over the Spartans in San Jose last Friday night were justified.

Oregon, which averaged losses of about 33 yards a game last year, was penalized 10 times against San Jose, losing 120 yards. Inexperience on the part of Oregon rookies accounted for most of the violations, Casanova said, that some of the penalties were not called. He said, however, that the game was somewhat "over-officiated."

Gillman Knocks Fair Catch Rule

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Coach Sid Gillman of the Los Angeles Rams, says a revision is in order on football's fair catch rule.

He told the Football Writers Assn. in a telephone interview Monday that he believes the Rams should have been credited with a touchdown in a controversial fair catch play in the 28-21 victory over the Chicago Bears Sunday.

The Rams thought Bear safetyman Johnny Morris signalled for a fair catch. Morris fumbled or dropped the ball and as the Rams rearranged their defense for the fair catch, Morris grabbed up the ball and raced 78 yards for a touchdown.

Officials ruled that Morris merely raised his hand to shade his eyes from the sun.

Said Gillman: "The movies show Morris signalled for a fair catch. His hand definitely was raised above his head, as the rule insists. The rule must be changed. Possibly the receiver should wave his hand from side to side over his head."

New York Group Ready With Title Bout Findings

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission is expected to announce its decision today in its lengthy investigation of the promotional aspects of the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson heavy weight title bout last June.

The commission already has suspended Patterson's manager, Cus D'Amato, for failure to appear at a hearing as requested; and suspended the promoter's licenses of Bill Rosensohn and Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., now controlled by attorney Vincent Velella and Irving Kahn, president of Teleprompter, Inc.

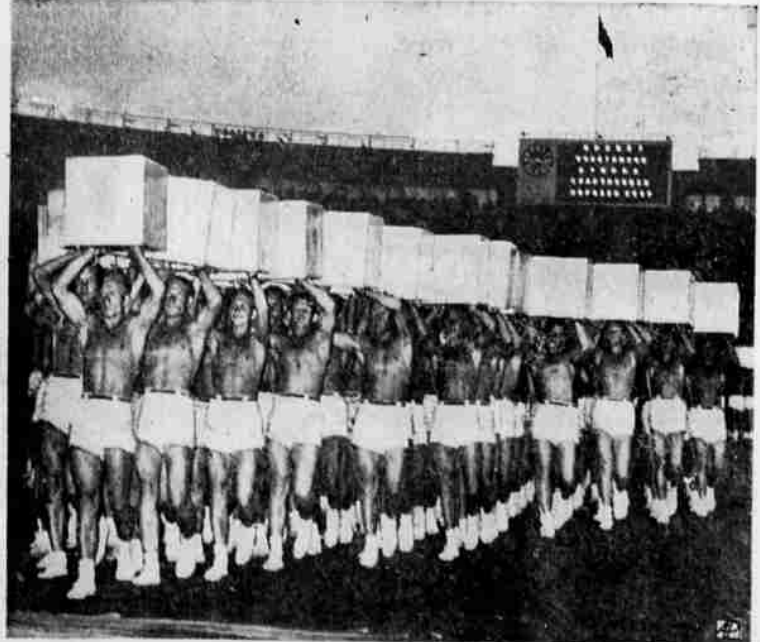
