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### Con Loses Appeal After Death Date

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ralph Dawkins has lost again, not that it matters to him.  
On July 16, Dawkins was put to death in New York's Sing Sing Prison.  
Monday—three months and three days later—the Supreme Court refused to consider his appeal from conviction of killing a South Ozone Park, N.Y., grocer during a 1957 holdup.

The Supreme Court last April 20 denied him a hearing.  
He filed a second appeal, but no stay of execution was asked. So on the day set, the State of New York went ahead with the execution.

There was no official word to the high court. In its routine way, it got around to his appeal and closed the judicial record by writing "denied" on his petition.

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### State Income Hike Far Under Average

MILTON-FREEWATER (AP) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) told a community dinner here this week that the average income in the nation has risen 17.6 per cent in recent years.

But, he said, the income of Oregonians has gone up only 5.5 per cent—less than the inflation in consumer prices.

He said the economy of the state has been hurt by "political budget juggling" of the Eisenhower administration.

"A budget that starves housing, forests and dams is a poor budget for Oregon," he said. "More attention must be given to the basic purposes to which we devote our national productivity. We point with pride to our rising gross national product, but perhaps we should be worrying more about what we are producing and how much is going into the public sector of the economy for schools, medical research and natural resource development."
