

Patterson Predicts Return Battle With Johansson Early In New Year

NEWTOWN, Conn. (AP)—Former heavyweight boxing champion Floyd Patterson, who ought to know, says his rematch with Ingemar Johansson will be held "early next year."

Patterson, who is training here in a determined effort to regain boxing's richest prize, expects the bout will be held "any place but New York."

The 24-year-old Negro fighter claims up about details, however. But if the fight is going to be held early in 1960, the size of the expected crowd and weather con-

ditions would dictate a Southern or Pacific Coast outdoor site.

At New York Thursday, Johansson said he would prefer to fight next spring in New York. In Göteborg, Sweden, Edwin Ahlquist, Johansson's adviser, also put in a pitch for New York.

Meanwhile at Miami, Fla., Promoter Vincent J. Vella said he would sue to attach every avenue of Johansson's income if the champion refuses to fight Patterson in Miami's Orange Bowl, March 1.

that the Danbury News Times today about New York and the personal treatment he (Patterson) received there in his title bout.

Losing the crown and taking a right hand pasting from Johansson last June in the Yankee Stadium isn't exactly what Patterson means.

There's more to it than that, he told Sharpe. Here he again buttoned his lips.

Patterson and his manager, Gus D'Amato, have moved into a former roadhouse here, high in the

Connecticut Hills, where the fighter is training.

He says he wants more than anything else to regain the title and to restore D'Amato, currently under suspension in New York state, to good standing.

Floyd says that Johansson's right hand blow that floored him the first time last summer was not a lucky punch.

"Like most others," explains the champion, "I thought that Ingemar's well publicized right was highly overrated, if it existed at all."

Martha Of Washington Coaching Family Has Led Colorful Life Too, By George

SEATTLE (AP)—Martha Owens likes to think of herself as an average homemaker, just making a pleasurable routine of caring for a husband and three small children.

Only she's not at all ordinary.

(1) She's about the prettiest girl ever to come out of Oklahoma.

(2) Her husband is Jim Owens, coach of the University of Washington football team.

And making a routine of home life may work on week days, but autumn Saturdays are something else. "I haven't," she admits, "had a calm football Saturday yet."

This includes quite a few Saturdays. Jim and Martha were married the year she graduated from high school in Oklahoma City. She was 18, he was 19 and destined for stardom with the University of Oklahoma football team.

She has watched her husband play in many games and coach many more, but blue-eyed, brown-haired, charming Martha Owens insists she doesn't know as much about football as many people think.

They ask her, for instance, if Washington is going to the Rose Bowl.

She answers: "I'm not allowed to talk about it." And she implies she is not even supposed to be thinking about it. "That would be counting our chickens—or something."

People near her in the football

stadium often ask why the team is or isn't using a certain strategy. It does no good, says Mrs. Owens, to explain that she is not the coach.

And some people, she smiles, seem to think "I have a printing press in my basement turning out football tickets." All stamped "Complimentary," of course.

Those hectic Saturdays reach a climax when husband Jim walks out of the locker room after the game. He doesn't know confides Martha, that you can't win 'em all. "He doesn't figure he's got to lose any." After a defeat he comes out "looking like he's ready to commit suicide."

"But when we win, it's fun." Do they celebrate? Sure—"we talk about the game."

Between seasons Mrs. Owens becomes a football widow, with

Jim away most of the time making player contacts and giving speeches. "I don't mind any more," she sighs. "I just leave the door open for him."

But Martha Owens does hope the family is through with moving. Since her husband started coaching they have moved every three years—and this is the third at Washington. The Northwest is where she wants to stay.

"I like it here," says Martha Owens.

Elgin Baylor, the former All-America at Seattle, is setting a torrid scoring pace with Minnesota in the National Basketball Assn., but he still has a long way to go to better Bob Pettit's feat just a year ago.

Pettit, a former All-America at Louisiana State, almost single-handedly rewrote the NBA record last season with his performance for the St. Louis Hawks. He set six records (1) most points scored with 2,105; (2) the highest average 29.2; (3) most field goals scored 719; (4) most free throws attempted 879; (5) most free throws scored 667; and (6) most 50-point games in a season, 3.

So far Baylor has set one NBA mark with his record 64 points against the Boston Celtics last Sunday. In addition he leads in total points with 398 in 11 games on 149 field goals and 100 free throws.

Baylor came up with 23 points Thursday night against Detroit, but it wasn't enough to keep the Lakers from losing to the Pistons 107-93 in the first game of a doubleheader at New York's Madison Square Garden before 2,247.

The Syracuse Nats blew a 25-point lead in the second game against New York, but forged ahead again in the final minutes to beat the Knicks 113-104.

Wilt Chamberlain tossed in 53 points to lead the Philadelphia Warriors to a 124-116 win over Cincinnati in the other NBA game of the night.

Huskies In Effort To Capture Roses Scent In Scrap With Rugged But Luckless Bears

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Washington tries to sew up a Rose Bowl bid Saturday against luckless—but dangerous—California.

The Huskies, led by quarterback Bob Schloredt, face a California Bear that's lost seven straight, the last four by one touchdown or less.

Schloredt, a one-eyed wonder who passes as well as he runs, is backed by fullbacks Ray Jackson and Joe Jones and a solid defense. The team's sole loss was to undefeated southern California, 22-15, USC whipped Cal 24-7.

Schloredt ranks second in Big Five total offense, 615 yards; passing, 499 yards and a 563 percentage, and in punting, 41.3 yards per boot.

To lose out on the Rose Bowl trip, the Huskies would have to lose their last two games while

Oregon, 7-1, must win its last two. The Oregon defeat was a one-point loss to Washington. Southern California is ineligible for the Bowl because of NCAA sanctions.

Running Leader In Wrong Place

AMES, Iowa (AP)—Fullback Tom Watkins is the leading ground gainer in college football this fall and at a position he didn't want to play.

The 182-pound junior, who reached Iowa State by way of Chicago and Los Angeles, has run for 707 yards in eight games. He should add to that appreciably in Saturday's game here with San Jose State.

Watkins, who has played five positions in football, had to be sold on playing fullback.

"We realized last spring that Tom's greatest potential was at fullback," said Coach Clay Stapleton. "We used persuasion and a little psychology—we did a selling job."

The quiet Chicagoan was overlooked in early games by opponents who concentrated on the Cyclones' tough tailback Dwight Nichols, the country's No. 2 total offense leader.

The outstanding inside and outside running of Watkins and Nichols has brought Iowa State a 6-2 record and a tie for second place in the Big Eight Conference.

Watkins has good speed but he lacked the desire to play fullback because of the spinner play—so vital to the Iowa State single wing offense.

The 22-year-old native of Arkansas started his football career as a guard at Chicago Wonder High. He later played halfback there and at a Los Angeles Junior College.

Former Cyclone Coach Jim Myers induced Watkins to come to Iowa State with him in 1957. Myers was an assistant at UCLA at the time.

Two years ago when Watkins was serving out a year of residency here, he was the only capable player Myers had who could handle the role of the opposing teams' stars during practice all season.

Portland Boxer Dumped In First

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland's John Massey, who weighed 199 pounds, was flattened three times in the first round and his opponent, Joe Sullivan of Stockton, Calif., 190, was awarded a technical knockout in their scheduled six-round fight here Thursday night.
