

Eagles Remain Undefeated; Crush Loggers, 59-20

Yoncalla Juggernaut Advances To 'B' Finals

The wind, rain and mud at Finley Field Friday night failed to slow the Yoncalla Eagle juggernaut in the state semifinals. The Anderson crew was again a potent grid eleven as they tipped the Knappa Loggers, 59-20, to advance into the state Class B finals for the second consecutive year.

After the first half, there was little doubt as to the outcome of the game. The Loggers felt the sting of the two-pronged Yoncalla offense worked to perfection in the important contest.

With the Eagle sturdy forward wall opening huge holes, the Logger defense was riddled by drives and the Eagle backs roared at will. And, when the Loggers stopped this attack, Ron Revelle's passing started the Eagles anew.

The Eagles piled up a new total offense record for one game in this night's work. They rambled for 427 yards on the ground and added 124 in the air for a total of 551 yards.

"It was by far the best game I've seen them play," opined an overjoyed Anderson. "How about that Wiley (Holman)!"

Wiley tallied four times, twice on passes from Revelle and Holman hit paydirt three times. Wiley came up with the longest run of the night, a 82-yard scamper from the Eagle 11 to the Logger seven before he was dropped.

Emery kept the Eagles in business all through the game with his running and Revelle also hit Jim Booth and Cliff Morin to bring his total TD aerials to 35 for the year.

But it was Holman giving just credit to the horses "up front." When congratulated on his big night of running, his only comment was: "But did you see those holes those guys (the linemen) were giving me? They did a great job."

Erly Garrison told his tired, but battling troops, "We knocked off some good teams this time we just took it on the nose." But before they "took it on the nose," the Loggers started as if to give the Eagles an interesting night of football. They opened with a 32-yard sustained drive through the mud, rain and wind to score with 6:54 left in the first period.

It was the running of fullback Tom Mark and right half Mike Ala, coupled with two passes by Bob Keppela taking the Loggers to the initial touchdown of the game. Keppela hit Ala from 11 yards out for the score and the Eagles stopped the PAT attempt.

It was a 52-13 score. The Eagles wrapped up their scoring with 2:24 left. A Revelle-to-Booth pass good for 28 yards set up the score on the 19. Then the Eagle general fired to Wiley down the middle again for the touchdown. Revelle rolled out to the left and ran for the PAT.

Another Logger fumble, this recovered by Carroll Noel on the Knappa 35, appeared to be another TD for the rampaging Eagles. But a Revelle aerial was picked off by Patterson on the 34 and he returned it the 66 yards for the third Logger tally. Ala hooted the PAT successfully to end the scoring with 24 seconds left.

And now the Eagles return to the state finals for a second try at the grand prize of them all—the state championship.

Last year the Eagles had the dubious honor of helping set a new combined scoring mark in a state championship football game—400 points. The Eagles won that game by a score of 60-7 against the state champion, Clatsop.

Perhaps this year the shoe will be on the other foot.

Champs Pile Up NBA Wins

The Boston Celtics are aching in every joint and muscle but you never would know it from the way they continue to pile up victories in the National Basketball Assn.

With six players nursing injuries the Celtics defeated the Syracuse Nationals 114-101 Friday night as two healthy members, Bob Cousy and Bill Sharman, tallied 19 and 25 points, respectively.

All the injured players, including Bill Russell who has a swollen left ankle, got into the game but they were unable to pay up to par. Russell did contribute 17 points and 26 rebounds.

Warriors Drop Third
The victory was the Celtics' 12th in 14 games and strengthened their hold on first place in the Eastern division as the Philadelphia Warriors went down to their third defeat. The St. Louis Hawks held Wilt Chamberlain to 24 points, his lowest output of the season, and won 118-117 on Bob Pettit's 15-foot jump shot 38 seconds before the end.

Pettit led the Hawks with 28 points and was topped by Philadelphia veteran Paul Arizin, who put on a one-man-show in bringing the Warriors down to their first half deficit to a 74-73 lead midway of the third period. He ended up with 41 points for a career high.

The Minneapolis Lakers also played without their ace, the rugged Elgin Baylor, but had no trouble defeating Detroit 103-85.

For the second straight year it will be Jefferson of Portland vs. Medford in the final of the Oregon Class A-1 high school football championship.

Both won impressive victories in semifinals state Friday night. In the final game Jefferson, ranked No. 2 behind Medford in the Associated Press poll, rolled over David Douglas of Port-

land, 33-0. Douglas was the No. 8 team in the poll.

Medford crushed sixth-ranked South Salem, 42-6, scoring in every quarter.

Jeff's 34th Win
Medford's victory broke the Portland league scoring record this season led Jefferson as usual.

After Mike Wyborne had scored on a three-yard plunge, Renfro put his team two touchdowns up by returning a punt 79 yards into the Douglas end zone. He scored later on a six-yard run.

It was the 54th straight victory over a three-year span for the Portland League champions, who outgained Douglas 433 net yards to 214.

At Salem Medford, which lost 27-7 to Jefferson in the championship final last year, scored the first time it got the ball, marching 77 yards on 10 plays. Mike Hood swept left end 3 yards to the touchdown.

Medford Tallies Twice
Shortly afterward, Medford recovered a fumble on the South Salem 84-yard line. On the first play Skip Bennett scored the

game's second touchdown. South Salem looked as if it might get back into the contest when Ken Sawyer ran 60 yards from scrimmage for a touchdown before the end of the first period.

But when Medford blocked the kick for conversion, the Saxons still trailed, 14-6.

Before it was over Hood had scored two more touchdowns, on a 21-yard run from scrimmage and an 88-yard kickoff return. Bennett scored again on an 8-yard dash.

Title Game At Multnomah
McCulloch Field in Salem, where the game was played, was in good shape. Heavy rain that had fallen most of the day stopped just before the opening kickoff.

Both teams moved the ball well. Medford making 286 yards rushing and 22 passing and South Salem going 232 yards on the ground and 21 in the air.

A crowd of 4,300 watched. The championship game will be played at Multnomah Stadium in Portland either next Friday or Saturday.

Miami Eyes Orange Bowl After Upset Win Over Spartans

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Miami's Hurricanes, a young but eager football team led by 122-pound Fran Curci, stood within one victory of an Orange Bowl berth today after an 18-13 upset of Michigan State Friday night.

By beating Florida in their final game next week, the Hurricanes can clinch an invitation to meet the Big Eight runner-up in the Miami bowl New Year's Day.

Michigan State's Big Ten leaders were in the running for the Rose Bowl but their position was less hopeful. They'll go to Pasadena only if Northwestern and Wisconsin are beaten or tied in their closing games today.

Curci Excites Crowd
Miami's stunning victory over the Spartans last night heightened Curci's All-America chances. The little field general directed his team beautifully and shored a crowd of 40,870 with an exciting mixture of passes, runs and pich-

with bowl bids and conference championships hanging in the balance.

Badgers Try Minnesota
Washington will become the host team in the Rose Bowl if the Huskies defeat Washington State.

The Big Ten team for the Rose Bowl also could be decided. Wisconsin, Northwestern and Michigan State all are tied at 4-2.

Clemson can nail down the Atlantic Coast Conference crown by beating Wake Forest.

In the Big Eight, Kansas, Missouri and Iowa State all are tied for second behind Oklahoma. The second-place team will go to the Orange Bowl since Oklahoma can't return. The Sooners can knock Iowa State out of contention, while Kansas and Missouri go at each other.

Louisiana State goes after Tulane and a victory will give it a spot in the Sugar or Blue Bonnet bowl.

Arkansas, committed to the Gas Bowl if it doesn't get the hot spot in the Cotton Bowl, tackles Texas Tech.

Colts Given Touchdown Edge Over 49ers; Rams

Y. A. Tittle comes "home" to Baltimore Sunday to match football with Johnny Unitas, the quarterback who replaced him in the hearts of rabid Colt fans.

The Western Conference lead of the National Football League is the prize, and the Colts are seven-point favorites to grab a share of it from the front-running San Francisco 49ers.

Tittle, the 12-year pro from LSU, is on the spot. San Francisco Coach Red Hickey says Y. A. will be starting quarterback. But only last Sunday Hickey yanked Tittle after the veteran threw two poor passes early in the 49ers' 14-3 loss to the Chicago Bears.

No Cheers For Y. A.
But sub John Brodie did no better, so Y. A. must return to the form he showed in the 49ers' first seven games. He must do it before the Baltimore fans who loved him when he quarterbacked the old Colts of 1948-49 and kept on cheering for him when he went to San Francisco.

Sunday, however, the Baltimore cheerers will be for Unitas, who has thrown 22 touchdown passes this season, passed for at least one score in 33 consecutive league games and needs only seven more scoring passes to break the season record set by Sid Luckman of the Bears in 1943.

49ers Seeking First Title
San Francisco has never won a divisional crown in its 13 full seasons, but a victory by the 49ers (6-2) would put them two games up on the Colts (5-3) with only three games to play and all but three Baltimore hopes of repeating its Western and NFL titles.

San Francisco's victory would result in a first-place tie with the Colts (5-3) and Baltimore at San Francisco's game the stepping stone into the NFL Dec. 27 title game against the Eastern Conference winner.

Browns Favored
The Cleveland Browns driving hard to victory in the Eastern crown they lost to the New York Giants last season, are nine-point favorites over the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers. The Steelers 3-4-1 clipped the Giants 19-9 last week, enabling the Browns to move into a first-place tie with the Giants at 6-2.

The Giants' victory scored a touchdown in their last nine quarters, are five-point favorites over the Chicago Cardinals (2-6) at Minneapolis.

Towel Impressive In Win At Philly

NEW YORK (AP)—Willie Towel can come back anytime. The former British Empire lightweight champ from Johannesburg, South Africa made a hit Friday night in winning a split decision over Philadelphia's Ken Matthews.

It wasn't Towel's victory that inspired the enthusiasm. In fact, there were many who thought Matthews deserved an edge.

Avoids Knockout
The thing that caught the crowd's fancy at Madison Square Garden was Willie's skill in avoiding a knockout after being knocked down twice in the eighth round. Under New York rules, it is an automatic TKO when a fighter is down three times in one round.

"I knew what I was doing all the time," said Willie later. "I knew about the three-knockout rule. When I got up the second time I said to myself, 'He's not going to get me. I'm going to run.'"

Boxes Out of Trouble
In the ninth Towel boxed his way out of trouble after a heavy body barrage. All night long he stuck an annoying jab in Matthews' face and kept dropping an overhand right to the jaw or bringing up a right uppercut to counter Len's furious advances.

Both Referee Harry Ebbs (5-4-1) and Judge Artie Adala (6-3-1) voted for Towel. Judge Ray Kozak had 4-5-5 in rounds but voted for Matthews on points 6-5. The AP card was 5-4-1 for Towel.

Towel, 139½, was clever. No question about that. He didn't carry too much thunder in his punch. Perhaps he had trained down too fine. Matthews, 136½, was the slagger, always moving to the attack. Too often he missed fire.

Wales Tennis Queen Upsets World Titlist
SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—An 18-year-old New South Wales girl, Jan Lehane, rocketed into the world tennis spotlight today with an upset victory over world champion Maria Buena of Brazil.

Playing in the semifinals of the New South Wales women's singles championship at White City Miss Lehane won in three thrilling sets 6-2, 4-6, 7-5.
