

Injury Suit Damages Drain Pocketbook Of Seattle Cop

SEATTLE (AP) — The anguish drained from the faces of Jerry and Paula Poth, along with their plans for the future. The fright remained.

Paula, an attractive brunette mother of three, put it simply. "It's hard enough to support three kids. The whole thing scares me."

On Aug. 29, 1952, Poth, then a Seattle police patrolman, was ordered to the scene of an accident. His patrol car crested a steep hill and crashed into an overturned automobile.

Alfred H. Ludington, auxiliary deputy sheriff who was directing traffic at the crash scene, was injured. Ludington sued and won a \$45,000 judgement against Poth.

Under a State Supreme Court decision, the city is not liable for the negligence of its firemen or policemen while they perform their duty. However, a city-paid insurance policy took care of \$10,000 of the judgement. Poth was left liable for \$35,000.

The patrolman sued the insurance company, claiming that at one time the company could have settled with Ludington for a total of \$9,250. The insurance company claimed it had the right to choose whether to settle or try the case. A King County Superior Court jury agreed with the company this week.

Poth, now 30 and a detective with the Police Department, discussed his dilemma with no show of emotion. With accumulated interest, he now owes \$43,912.

If he goes through bankruptcy he will lose his job with the Police Department, yet, as he explained, he can't even keep up with the interest payments on his huge debt.

Poth said he has refused all offers of aid and will continue to do so.

"I wouldn't take a nickel from anyone. This is my own problem, but I don't see how I can pay it. My salary is \$190 a month. My take home pay is \$360. I'd have to pay more than half of that just to keep even with the interest."

Poth's eyes moved around his family, to 8-year-old Jeff and to 4-year-old Mike.

"I've been on many emergency calls," he said. "Since this happened I've sworn I'd never go over the speed limit, no matter what the emergency. But you've got to do your job."

"There's no way I can see to make any payment on it at all."

Reconstruction Work Continues; Carstens Re-opens

Work continued on blast reconstruction in Roseburg this week, but there were fewer places left for re-opening. Many of the others are operating while work continues.

Carstens Furniture Store re-opened Monday after closure most of the time since the explosion, while the store was being completely remodeled along with repairs.

The Roy O. Young Real Estate and Insurance office, is still located in temporary offices at 511 Pacific Building, while construction continues on the street level offices. All other main floor offices of the Pacific Building are completed, but work on the lobby and many of its upstairs office rooms continues.

The Umpqua Hotel hopes to have its fifth floor completed soon after Dec. 1. Three floors of hotel rooms have been opened, but work on other portions of the building goes on.

Work continues on the Hoehradel building, housing Roseburg Jewelers and Wilson Studio, the IOOF building, Hansen Motor Co. building and the St. Dillard building housing Sayre Volkswagen Sales & service. Lesser jobs continue on several other structures.

Demolition progressed on the Craig Masters building west of the Douglas County State Bank. The area eventually will serve as a drive-in area for the bank. Most of the old city Hall has also been torn away, to make way for a new U.S. National Bank building.

Probe Scheduled Into Payola Racket

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators reported plans here to look into activities of disc jockeys in at least six major metropolitan areas within the next two weeks.

Robert W. Lishman, chief counsel of the House Legislative Oversight subcommittee, said investigations will be sent to Boston, Chicago, Los Angeles, Milwaukee, New York and Detroit.

In addition to questioning disc jockeys and others in the radio-television industry, Lishman said the investigators also will look into all other phases of the "payola racket."

He defined this as including not only allegations of bribes to disc jockeys but also charges of secret payments for plugging products and individuals on TV and radio, kickbacks for promoting music sales, and conflicts of interests by disc jockeys who also have an interest in manufacture and sale of records.

Raymond W. Martin Jr., a subcommittee aide, told a reporter, "Our aim is to get a general picture of the entire payola racket."

The subcommittee, which recently concluded an inquiry into the TV quiz show scandals, has not set a date for public hearings on payola. However, both Lishman and Martin indicated the hearings probably will begin early next year.

Traffic Toll Figured

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's traffic death rate in September was 65 persons killed for 106 million miles of travel, the state Traffic Safety Division said today.

The rate in Sept. 1958 was 5.5, but the September rate was more than two full points below the August rate.
