

Palmer In Lead, Snead Six Behind

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Arnold Palmer, a husky young Pennsylvanian, today is right where the oddsmakers said he should be — leading the pack into the second round of the 24th Masters golf tournament.

The former Wake Forest College star, hottest item on the tour this year, shows no signs of cooling off. Three days after being head-bound with the Palmer, he fashioned a nifty 5-under-par 67 in Thursday's opening round and grabbed a two-stroke lead.

Some golfers are superstitious and feel it is bad luck to be pegged the pretournament favorite.

"I try not to let that bother me," said the Ligonier, Pa., professional who won the 1958 Masters.

Three of Palmer's contemporaries and one oddtimer fired 69s. Veteran Claude Harmon of Mamaronck, N.Y., who won the 1948 Masters, was bracketed there with Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., Dow Finsterwald of Okeechobee, Fla., and Jay Hebert of Lafayette, La. Amateur Bud Taylor, a dentist from Pomona, Calif., joined Britisher Harry Weetman and tour

regular Don January of Denver, Colo., in the 70 column.

Others in the 11-man par-busting brigade were British amateur champion Deane Beman of Bethesda, Md., and pros Gene Littler of Singing Hills, Calif., and Bill Casper Jr., reigning U.S. Open champion from Apple Valley, Calif. They had 71s. Par for the rolling 6,536-yard Augusta National course is 36-72.

Among those well off the pace were Sam Snead and Ben Hogan, both with 73s, and Jack Nicklaus, the young national amateur champion from Columbus, Ohio, who started with a 75.

Even more spectacular than Palmer's fine pace-setting round was the blowup by his No. 1 rival in pre-tournament figuring, Ken Venturi of Palo Alto, Calif.

Venturi, whose final round 80 cost him the Masters title in 1956 when he was an amateur, shot the front nine in a record-tying 31.

But he plummeted to earth with a thud on the back nine, finishing without a 42 for a 73.

After today's second round, the field of 83 will be trimmed to the 40 low scorers, plus ties.

Giant Rookie Belts Homers In Sox Loss

San Francisco's Matty Alou and Washington's Don Mincher, the other guy in the Sievers - Battey trade, can be added to the list of potential power hitters.

Each homered twice Thursday as the Giants and Senators won spring training games. And it may not be too long before their names turn up frequently in major league baseball boxscores. Both spent last season with Class A minor league teams.

The Giants, who defeated the Boston Red Sox 4-2 at Phoenix, already have a solid starting outfield in Orlando Cepeda, Willie Mays and Willie Kirkland.

The Senators, who whipped Kansas City 10-5 at Orlando, have a definite need for first baseman Mincher. When they sent Roy Sievers to the Chicago White Sox for Earl Battey, Mincher and \$150,000, Julio Becquer, a pesky but light hitter, inherited the first base job.

On Rio Grande

Alou, square name Mateo, is on the roster of the Rio Grande Valley Giants in the Texas League and probably will be sent down. But only Kirkland among the Giants' regular outfielders bats left-handed, and an injury to, or slump by, Kirkland could give Matty a break.

Matty's second consecutive homer Thursday capped a three-run seventh that made a winner of Giant starter Mike McCormick. Both were off Tom Brewer.

Mincher batted in five runs in a two-run blast off A's starter John Tsiouris and a three-run shot off Bob Trowbridge. Allison also homered for the Senators.

In other games, Milwaukee defeated Cincinnati 7-5 at Columbia, S.C.; Baltimore beat Pittsburgh 9-8 at Fort Myers; New York shaded Detroit 2-1 at St. Petersburg; St. Louis defeated Cleveland 10-7 at Tucson, and Los Angeles outlasted the Chicago White Sox and Philadelphia were idle.

Braves Scared

The Braves got a scare when Lew Burdette, cruising along with a 5-2 lead, was hit on the left hand by a ball batted by Reds rookie Tony Gonzalez in the sixth inning. The ace right-hander will be OK, however, X-rays showed.

With the National League season opening next week, the Braves already have right-hander Joey Jay on the shelf with an ailing back. The Pirates were jolted by a poor performance by Bob Friend, their opening day nominee. Friend went the route, but gave up 12 hits, including homers by Gene Woodling and Gus Trandov.

The Yankees won their third straight, but it took a sharp relief job by Ryne Duren after Bob Turley lost control in the seventh inning.

Back To Wall, Hawks Stay In Pro Playoff

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — "They're going to get the winner's share even if they lose Saturday," owner Ben Kerner says of his St. Louis Hawks. "This is the greatest display of guts I've ever seen."

For the fourth time in two weeks, the Hawks rallied to win with their backs to the wall Thursday night, squaring pro basketball's world series at 3-3 with a 105-102 victory over Boston's defending champs.

"They have (Larry) Foust out of action with an injury after playing on an injured heel, Bob Pettit with an injured back and Jack McMahon and Dugie Martin out of the entire series," Kerner said. "Yet they keep coming back."

The winning team in the National Basketball Assn. title series gets \$17,000 from the league treasury, the loser \$11,000. Including their winnings for their regular season finish and for the division playoffs, the Celtics can win as much as \$36,000, the Hawks \$34,000 in prize money—because Boston had the best regular season record.

Boston Coach Red Auerbach lashed out against Bob Burns, sports editor of the St. Louis Globe - Democrat, who devoted most of his daily column to a discussion of Auerbach's court-side antics, closing with a suggestion that the officials make Red sit down throughout the game.

"He (Burns) is the bush league rattle-brain cheer leader trying to get the fans stirred up," Auerbach fumed.

Burnes said "That is one of the nicest compliments I've ever had."

Kerner declared that Auerbach, dean of NBA coaches, "is a bushier if he wins 10,000 games. The only time he sat down was when he led by 26 points."

Sports Ex-Bevo Mows Down Portland

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — Ex-Portland Vic Lombardi allowed only one hit in five innings and Terry Fox shut out the Portland Beavers in four more Thursday as Sacramento triumphed 3-1.

The only Portland score of the spring training game between the two Pacific Coast League rivals was in the fourth. Gerry Mason walked. After two outs, Jim Greengrass walked, moving Mason to second. Len Tucker then singled Mason home.

Bob Rous led off the Sacramento scoring in the second with a bases-empty homer. The second Sacramento run, in the fifth, was unearned. J. W. Porter singled, took second on a wild pitch and scored on an error.

Jim Bolger tallied the final run for Sacramento after he walked, went to third on a single by Rous and then scored when Rous was forced at second.

The Portland outfield, in need of help, got a lift in the form of Joe Gaines, 23-year-old who will come on option from Cincinnati. He is very fast, a right-hand hitter and thrower and plays anywhere in the outfield. He batted .280 for Savannah last season, hitting 12 homers, 4 triples and 26 doubles. He drew 67 walks and was struck out 53 times.

Manager Tommy Heath was reported pleased with Gaines, a 6-foot-1, 190-pounder. The reason Portland got him instead of Seattle, which has a working agreement with Cincinnati is that Heath promised to play him every day. At Seattle he might have trouble breaking in as a regular.

Gaines was scheduled to arrive today at Ontario. The Beavers play Vancouver at Yuma, Ariz. Heath arranged for Gaines to be driven to Indio, Calif. Saturday, where Portland will play, probably against San Diego.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Big Gene Conley plans to put aside basketball and head for Leeburg, Fla., to get reacquainted with baseball.

The 6-foot-8, 225-pound pitcher-rebounder discussed his summer-time work Thursday night after the Hawks beat the Celtics 105-102 and forced the National Basketball Assn. title playoffs to a seventh game at Boston Saturday afternoon.

Conley, like the rest of the Celtics, is confident of beating the Hawks. In fact, he's anxious to get the job over with so he can shift his thoughts and talents to the Philadelphia Phillies, his employer from April to October.
