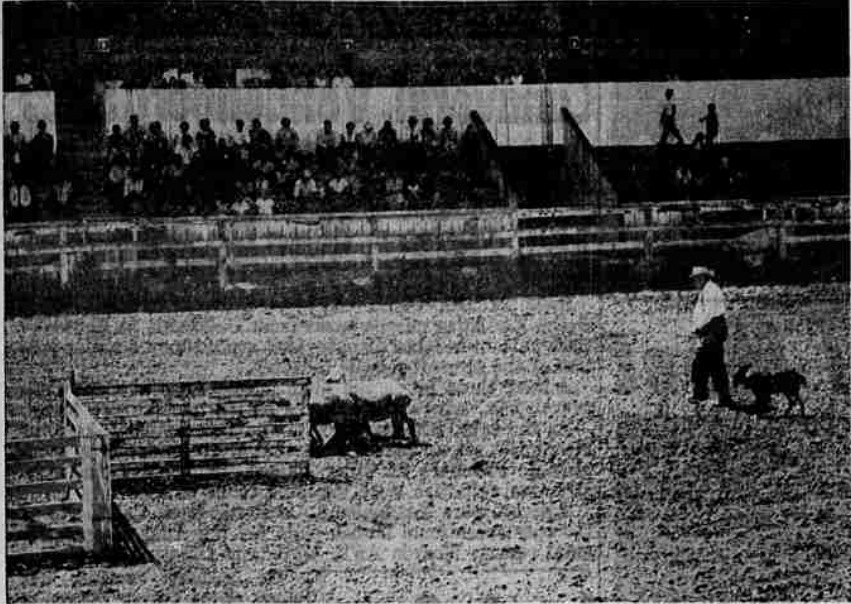


Shepherd's Best Friend

Art Rychard With 'Paint' Winner In Lamb Show Sheep Dog Trials

Lots of lambs and lots of people showed up for the 21st annual Douglas County Fat Lamb Show held at the Fair Grounds Saturday.

The days' events started with the junior singles judging. These comprise youngsters in 4-H or FFA lamb projects. Alfred Ollivant walked off with first place honors. He was followed closely by Jack Lawrence, second, and Martin Crouch, John Mitchell, Donna Davis, Tom Owmpugh, Bob Dan-

iel, Sandra Monett and Jill Lawrence, third to 10th place winners.

All placings in these events were awarded cash prizes and ribbons. First place winners in the junior champion single, the open class champion single and the champion pen of five were awarded trophies. A trophy was also awarded for the champion sheep dog event.

Showmanship
Following the junior singles, the

junior and senior showmanship contests were held. Here the owners are judged on the best way they show their lambs to the judges. Kathleen Crouch was winner of the junior showmanship and Martin Crouch was winner in the senior division.

Second through fifth place winners in the junior division were Jean Pruchern, Donna Davis, Gerald Briggs and Krista Kittleson. Senior winners, in order, were Toni Ollivant, Sharon Redding, Susan Monett and Sandra Monett.

Next came the junior judging event in which the youngsters again took the spotlight and judged lambs against the regular judges. Seven winners were picked and included Pam Murphy, Toni Ollivant, John Brand, Jean Pruchern, Kathleen Crouch, Kathy McNaughton and Krista Kittleson, in that order.

Ladies' Program
A ladies' program then took over at 10 a.m. and consisted of a talk on cooking, educational movies and a style show based on "make it yourself with wool" sponsored by the National Wool Growers.

At noon the traditional lamb barbecue was served.

Sheep dog trials was the first event in the afternoon. In this event, a dog, coached by his owner, must herd five sheep around the fair grounds arena, passing through two gates and stopping the sheep and holding them, and then pen them. Judging was based on obedience of the dog to signals from the handler. Special consideration was given one entry because the dog did not spit up the sheep so much. The judges felt this was important.

Winners in the event were Art Rychard with his dog Paint; Monte Lewis, Hazel, Bob Allen, Speck, Albert Pelland, Queen; and Alfred Ollivant, Boots, in that order.

Following the dog trials, trophies and ribbons were presented.

Next came the pen of five judging which wound up the events for the day. Here the judging is based on the best five lambs. Thirty-four entered this event.

Jim Wadsworth took first place honors and was awarded a trophy. Second to fourth place winners were H. A. Doerner, Bill Stroder, Lynn Beckley, Dale Robinson, Ray Doerner, Chester Davis, Don Ollivant, Al Ollivant, Mike Johnson, Harold Nichols, Bill Buckley, Ray Medley and Ward Cochran.

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Car Mishaps Put Four In Hospital

Accidents injured four people over the weekend.

In one Sunday evening, Edward Jack Steward, 34, and Stanley Merbin Overturf, 30, both of Grants Pass, were taken to the Myrtle Creek Clinic after their car went over a steep bank.

State police said Steward was driving the car west on the South Myrtle Road east of Myrtle Creek. They said the car failed to negotiate a curve, went over the shoulder and down a steep bank. It came to rest 90 feet from the road. The accident occurred two miles east of Myrtle Creek.

The car was towed to Myrtle Creek after the accident. Steward is in satisfactory condition today, and Overturf was released after first aid treatment.

Catches Fire
In a second Sunday accident, Joe Smith, who lives eight miles east of Myrtle Creek on the North Myrtle Rd, told state police he had run off the road at the foot of Boomer Hill on the same road and his car had caught fire. He was not injured.

Another injury accident sent Mrs. Frank Moore, 34, of Idlewild Park to Douglas Community Hospital Saturday. She told state police her car had gone off the road about a half mile east of the county scales on the North Umpqua Highway. She had been in a similar accident several weeks ago on the same highway.

She said she had some children with her but they were not hurt. Mrs. Moore is in satisfactory condition at the hospital today.

Saturday Wreck
Roseburg police also investigated an accident Saturday near the intersection of SE Oak Ave. and Flint St. Involved were cars driven by John Robert Williams, 25, of 507 W. Umpqua Ave. and Albert S. Hughes, 27, Wilbur.

Police said Williams' car came off the Oak Ave. bridge as the Hughes' car was coming in the opposite direction. Williams told police a car had come out of Flint St. and he had to swerve into the opposite lane to miss it. His car and that of Hughes collided head-on and had to be towed away.

Both men were given first aid treatment. Williams was cited for operating his car in the wrong lane of traffic.

Hit-Run
Meanwhile, the sheriff's office has arrested Barton K. Armstrong of 1011 NE Newton Creek Rd., Roseburg, in connection with a hit-run accident on Rifle Range Rd. Friday night.

He was arrested for being drunk in a public place after Mrs. Bill Stewart of Rt. 1, Box 15, Roseburg, reported that someone had hit her car parked in front of their house. Police found Stewart's damaged car in a nearby parking lot.

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Japan Socialists Seek Kishi Ouster, Plan Further Demonstrations

TOKYO (AP) — The Socialist bloc in Parliament today formally approved its mass resignation in a pressure move aimed at ousting Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi and washing out President Eisenhower's visit to Japan.

Socialist leaders hoped the mass resignation would arouse public opinion to force Kishi to dissolve Parliament before the U.S.-Japan security treaty automatically takes effect June 19, the day Eisenhower is due to arrive.

The big national labor federation, Sohyo, called a national convention Wednesday and Thursday to draft plans for another strike against Kishi, the security pact and the Eisenhower visit.

The "People's Council to Block the Security Pact," spearheaded by the Socialists and Sohyo, announced a timetable on its anti-government campaign emphasizing protests against the President's visit. Included are demonstrations in

Hatfield Speaker At Whitworth Graduation

SPOKANE (AP) — America's real defense lies in the strength of its individual citizens, Gov. Mark Hatfield said Sunday.

"The intellectual, moral and spiritual qualities which we develop are the backbone of our strength," the Oregon Republican told 175 graduates and friends at Whitworth College's 70th annual commencement.

Hatfield called on colleges to provide the intellectual inquiry necessary "if higher education is to help us meet the challenge of the present and the future."

He said there was need to overcome inertia in the judicial system and emphasized the importance of civilian control over the military.

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
