Driver Training Classes Scheduled For Sutherlin

Through the sponsorship of Harry Held Ford Inc. the young people of the Sutherlin area will have an opportunity to take summer driver training at the high school.

The class is scheduled to start Monday June 6 at 8 a.m. For the first fifteen days all students will get two hours of classroom work. Lawrence Brown of the High School faculty will be in charge of the driving program. He has a regular certificate to instruct in this field.

Each student will be behind the wheel for 6 hours and will receive in-car instruction for 12 more hours. Every effort will be made to schedule the instruction in the car at the convenience of the students and their parents.

Two years ago the Held agency made a car available for the summer program and many students enrolled for the course. School personnel are much in favor of the summer program as it does not conflict with the academic classes.

National Figures Comment On Trip

Preparations were made, and now the Roseburg Senior High School Spanish classes are on their way. They left Friday for their tour of Mexico.

The group making the trip included 26 students and three advisors. The trip will take 12 days with eight days in Mexico. The goal of the trip is Guaymas, Mexico, on the Gulf of California.

Mr. Bertion Bailey, RHS Spanish instructor, will be one of the advisors. He started the idea of going to Mexico last year and headed the campaign for the necessary funds.

Mrs. Corrine McTaggart and Mrs. G. S. Haaf are the other two chaperons for the students. Mrs. McTaggart is a home economics teacher at the high school. Mrs. Haaf is a registered nurse.

The plans for the trip have gained nationwide attention. Presidential candidate John Kennedy wrote to the group. He said, "The experience your students gain will be of great and lasting value to them, not merely in their studies, but also in furthering good will and understanding on a personal level."

Wayne Morse telegraphed the group saying, "I know that your firsthand tour of Mexico will be experience from which you will learn a great deal about our neighbors to the South. These young people from Roseburg are, in my opinion, the best possible ambassadors the United States could send to Mexico or any other country."

Rep. Charles O. Porter wrote the group and enclosed a letter from the ambassador of the United States, Vincente Shachez Gavito. Gavito said, "Both you in the United States and we in Mexico need more of this. In democracies such as ours, international relations must be based on respect for the individual, on tolerance, on sympathy, on appreciation and admiration of the peoples involved for one another. There can be no better way of doing away with the negative elements in these relations, and of developing the constructive ones, than by personal contact during the formative years."

While in Mexico the group hopes to see the sites in Nogales, Hermosillo and Guaymas. They are also planning to see a bullfight.

A boat excursion from Guaymas on the Gulf of California is tentatively planned. Also in Guaymas the group will visit radio station XEDR. This station sent the group a 30-minute tape for the Pan American Day activities in April.

Superior Student Program Expanded At Oregon State

An important new feature has been added to the Oregon State College superior student program that permits exceptionally able students to go "faster and farther" in college work.

Beginning this coming year, the advanced placement program of the national College Entrance Examination board will be used at OSC. This program permits high school seniors who pass the special examinations to be placed in advanced classes in some departments and permits them to get college credit for college-level work now offered in some high schools.

This year, 41 freshmen and 22 sophomores have made up the first honors degree group. Nicholas L. Lehnback of Roseburg, a freshman, was one of those selected.

Plans to enlarge the superior student program and to expand the honors degree program in science to include some 50 new freshmen were announced by President A. L. Stuedgen.

The school of science honors program is a part of the superior student plan. Under it, students do extra work such as special readings, research and seminars, and take some special classes throughout their college careers. At graduation, they will receive diplomas that indicate honors in their specific science field.

To be eligible for the honors program, a freshman must have ranked near the top of his or her graduating class and must have the recommendation of the high school principal or a science teacher.

If the extra study load of the honors program proves too demanding, students may withdraw from the program at any time and resume normal course schedules. At the same time, provisions are made for students who show exceptional ability to be added to the program during the year.
