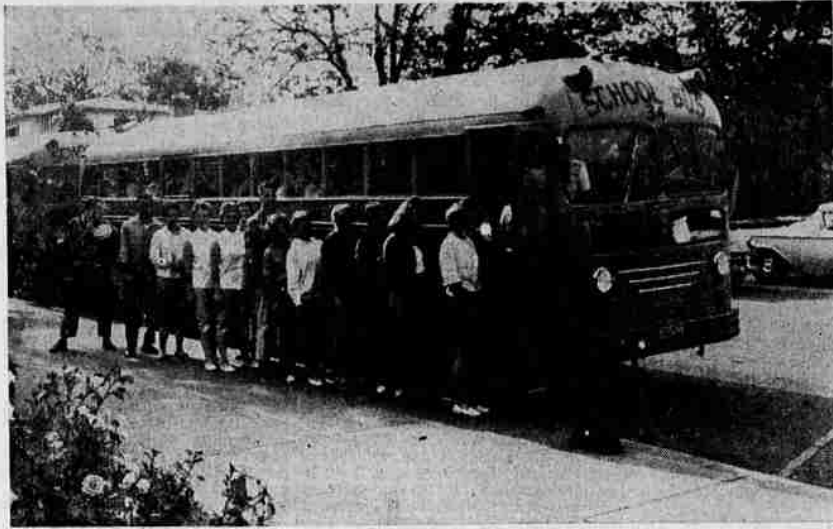


EMERGENCY BOARD ADVISES RR WAGE HIKE

Budget Accepted At Myrtle Creek

The Myrtle Creek City Council accepted the budget for 1960-61 and set a date for the budget hearing on July 12, according to Lorraine Bierenbaum, correspondent.

Bill Pfeiffer of Canyonville requested that the city move a post for a rock club "Tail-Gaters" organization convention over the weekend. Overnight camping for members of the group, who'll thus protect their rock exhibits, have been allowed.

The Myrtle Creek fire department entered into a contract with the city. They'll provide fire protection outside the city limits excepting for grass flames which do not endanger buildings. The agreed yearly cost is \$1,200.

A census has been requested by the state of the newly-annexed East Myrtle Creek district. Engineer Don Martin has also been directed to draw plans for water lines in the area.

Buying of fence for the city yard on the Oak St. side at a cost of \$882 was authorized, with half to be paid from this year's fiscal budget and the other half next year.

School Board To Hear Agriculture Speaker

Hopkins, 243 SE Fowler Street. The two Winston enlistees are Jim A. McClelland, son of Mr. and Mrs. William O. McClelland, Winston and Allen J. Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Bailey, Winston. David R. Halbert, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer L. Halbert of Route 1, Box 248C, Myrtle Creek and Martin N. Russell, son of Mrs. Inez Wilson of Sutherlin are the remaining two enlistees.

All seven are taking their recruit training at the Naval Training Center at San Diego, Calif. Halbert, Thompson and McClelland enlisted under the High School Graduate program, and will attend a Navy service school after recruit training. The other four, after qualification, will be assigned to various schools for further training upon completion of their recruit training.

Conservatives Plan Rousing Ike Welcome

TOKYO (AP) — Japanese conservatives today made plans to rally 600,000 Japanese to give President Eisenhower a rousing welcome, countering leftist demonstrations against his visit.

Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's Liberal-Democratic party and Japanese business leaders joined in a "National Welcome Ike Committee" to ensure a warm reception when the President arrives June 19.

An organized reception for the President was made necessary by mounting leftist opposition to the visit and student threats to stage a giant sit-down strike on the runways of Tokyo's International Airport to impede the President's landing.

Behind the students are Socialist, Communist and left-wing labor groups contending that Eisenhower's visit amounts to interference in the bitter dispute over ratification of the new U.S.-Japan security treaty.

Kishi ignored a boycott by the Socialist minority in Parliament and opened a debate in the upper house aimed at final ratification of the treaty.

Kishi and Foreign Minister Aichihiro Fujiyama explained government arguments for the new treaty, which permits continued American use of Japanese military bases for at least another 10 years but gives Japan more say in controlling deployment of U.S. forces from Japanese bases.

Without upper house action, the new treaty automatically would take effect on June 19—the day Eisenhower arrives—or 30 days after its approval by the lower house. Apparently the government felt earlier final ratification might take some of the steam out of the anti-Eisenhower demonstration.

The government planned to designate 10,000 civilians to help 9,000 police quell any disorders when Eisenhower arrives.

Grand Jury Sets Five Indictments

The Douglas County Grand Jury Tuesday returned five indictments, two of them secret.

Those named in the non-secret indictments were Norman McDonald, Richardson, 28, of Roseburg; Raymond W. Fields, 33, Myrtle Creek; and Michael Duane Wingett, 2, of San Francisco, Calif.

Richardson was arrested after an April 6 incident in which he allegedly threatened Little Frances Burgess during a family argument. The indictment says he told Mrs. Burgess "I will blow you to kingdom come" and other things of similar import. Mrs. Burgess is his mother-in-law.

Fields allegedly assaulted James D. Gale of Myrtle Creek with a pocket knife on April 23. Gale made a citizen's arrest after a quarrel between the two reportedly resulted in the assault.

Wingett, charged with burglary not in a dwelling, is now in Rocky Butte, the Multnomah County jail, serving a one-year term for "joyriding," a reduced charge from a car theft count. He will be brought to Douglas County to face the burglary count after he has served his Rocky Butte term.

The indictment says Wingett broke into Nick's Shell Service in Dillard Dec. 11 to steal items. The station is operated by E. O. Nickerson.

Bomarc Missile Explodes In Pen

McGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE, N. J. (AP) — A needle-nosed Bomarc missile, battle-ready with an atomic warhead in its concrete launching pen, caught fire Tuesday, touching off a radiation scare.

The missile was badly damaged and some radiation seeped out of its nuclear tip.

First reports were that there was a fire of heavy material in the remote penland around the base. The Air Force later said that the radioactivity and a slight amount at that—was confined to the badly damaged launching pen. Investigators of the Atomic Energy Commission, the Defense Department and the New Jersey Department of Health said they would all probe the incident.

The Air Force said the Bomarc caught fire as it nestled unattended in its concrete launching shelter, one of 54 at the missile base. There apparently was a small explosion in the missile fuel system and then fire broke out, an Air Force spokesman said.

There were no reports of injuries in the fire.

Air Force officials said a system of safeguards is installed on each missile to bar an accidental detonation. Because of the safeguards, it takes a deliberate action by a missile or bomber crew to start the warhead so it will explode.

The launching site is about 20 miles southeast of the state capital at Trenton. State civil defense authorities were ready to order evacuation of the public from areas at and near the base.

The missile itself was a total loss, burned out or melted down by the blaze. The weapon costs between a million dollars and \$1,200,000.

Vandals On Loose

Vandals are on the loose again, according to Harry G. Rapp, a member of the American Legion and World War I Veterans.

He reports some of the American flags, placed at the graves of veterans for Memorial Day in Roseburg, have been pulled up, the small staffs broken and the flags wadded up and dumped in ash cans.

Bartenders Set Contract Parley

The Hotel & Restaurant Employees & Bartenders Union's contract with restaurants, cafes and other establishments in this field expired June 1.

Negotiations have been under way between the union and employers for a new contract. The union, it is understood, is asking for an increase in wages.

Dick Smith, secretary of the Douglas County Restaurant and Beverage Assn., said that his group and the union have set their next negotiation meeting for June 16 at 2:30 p.m. The association represents 51 teachers from 11 states, of which 23 were picked from Oregon.

Non-Suit Ruling Ordered By Court

A Douglas County Circuit Court jury didn't get a chance to rule on a civil case in which Glen R. Corder of Roseburg sued J. C. Compton Co. of Corvallis and the Douglas County Court.

The case in which Corder asked \$6,850 for injuries allegedly received when he slipped into a creek from a culvert along the North Umpqua Highway just east of the city limits of Roseburg, was ruled an involuntary non-suit.

The court decided Corder himself had not been careful in walking across the culvert.

The road is a county road and the culvert was allegedly built by the Compton company.

Tillamook Police Chief Gets New State Post

SALEM (AP) — Philip G. Averill, 42, chief of police at Tillamook for the past three years, was named Tuesday to direct the new Crime Prevention Division in the state Department of Justice.

Averill, who was police chief at Colville, Wash., before going to Tillamook, was appointed by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

Violence Flares On Picket Line

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Violence broke out on picket lines today as a strike against the United Aircraft Corp. spread to seven of the company's plants.

Police said strikers clashed in Windsor Locks when pickets attempted to bar a truck from entering the Hamilton Standard division plant there.

Strikers reportedly attacked policemen attempting to clear a path for the truck. Police used their clubs.

At North Haven earlier, strikers smashed two windshield on autos of nonstrikers. Three policemen were injured slightly when they were struck by a nonunion worker's auto.

Some 30,000 production workers, members of two unions, were affected by the strike. The company employs about 57,000 in the state, including three other company plants not affected by the strike.

The walkouts began Tuesday at the Sikorsky plant in Stratford and Bridgeport. They spread today to Pratt & Whitney plants in North Haven, East Hartford and Manchester, and Hamilton Standard plants in Windsor Locks and Broad Brook.

Workers are represented by the United Auto Workers at the Sikorsky plants and at the Pratt & Whitney aircraft division plant in North Haven.

The International Assn. of Machinists represents workers at Hamilton Standard in Windsor Locks and Broad Brook.

H. Trusty Named To Oakland Council

At a meeting of the Oakland city council Tuesday night Homer Trusty was sworn in as councilman, according to Edith Dunn, correspondent. He replaces Vern Little, who resigned.

The bid of the Roseburg Paving Co. was accepted to re-grade, rock and oil Third St. from Maple to Magnolia Sts. Magnolia from Third to Fifth St.; Pine St. from First to Second St.; and the post-office alley between Oak and Locust Sts. The work will begin immediately.

No one appeared at the budget hearing. The budget is for \$38,030, and is inside the 6 per cent limitation, thus not requiring an election.

The council voted to purchase a used Chevrolet pick-up truck for use of the street superintendent. A letter concerning compensation for city employees was discussed, without action taken.

New tables will be made for Stearns Park picnic facilities. The city hall and fire hall have been re-painted.

City Judge R. A. Wilkins reported fines of \$30 for May.

Five-Cent Hourly Pay Boost Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A presidential emergency board today recommended a five-cent hourly wage increase for 850,000 railroad workers who have threatened strikes against almost every American railroad.

The wage rise should take effect July 1, the board advised President Eisenhower. It recommended also that the parties negotiate a "number of improvements" in the rail industry's health and welfare program.

The latter benefits, the board said, should take the place of a further general wage increase when contracts with 11 railway labor organizations expire early next year.

Clerks Involved

The 65,000 railroad employees involved in the board's recommendation are those known as nonoperating workers—the clerks, maintenance men and others not directly engaged in operating trains.

The unions representing them had demanded a wage increase of 25 cents an hour.

Railroad management countered by proposing a 15-cent wage cut.

The average wage of these workers is now \$2.40 an hour.

The board's proposals are not binding on either management or the unions.

The board was appointed by the President under the Railway Labor Act. This law provides for creation of emergency fact-finding boards when a strike is threatened. Any strike is forbidden while such a board is examining the facts, and for 30 days after it reports.

Employment Loss Noted

The presidential board took note of the depressed condition of the railway industry and recommended to Eisenhower that national policies be shaped to meet the situation in the transport field which has cost the railroad industry 400,000 employees in the past 10 years.

The board was composed of Judge Arthur W. Sempiner of Detroit, Benjamin Aaron of Los Angeles, and John T. Dunlop, chairman, Belmont, Mass.

During the board's inquiry, the unions charged that the industry is "retreating to monopoly." The railroads replied that the industry is "in retreat to extinction, pursued by excessive and unreasonable labor costs."

"The American community expects more from both labor and management in this industry than retreat," the emergency board said.

Vacation Pay Covered

Other issues covered by the board's recommendations included vacations and holiday pay. The panel recommended that eligibility for a second week of vacation be reduced from five to three years of continuous service, and urged the modification of some rules to prevent hardship cases, which some workers may forfeit two or three weeks of vacation.

Rules governing eligibility for holiday pay also should be changed, the board said, so that such pay may be given employees who are not working on regular assignments and are frequently denied holiday pay. The health and welfare program changes should be made effective with the new policy year of the railroads' contract with the insuring organization, the board said.

The recommendations called for an equalization of benefits, group life insurance, and additional contributions by the railroads "to insure the continued solvency of the plan."

Moose Members Leave For Convention Sunday

Four members of the Moose Lodge from Roseburg will attend the national convention of the fraternal order next week in Chicago. They'll leave by car on Sunday.

Those who will attend include Bob Elliott, governor of the Moose Lodge 1037; M. E. (Mel) Lusk, grand north of the state Moose organization; Joe Cole, vice president of District 3; Doug Briggs, prelate of Moose Lodge 1037. Lusk is also secretary-manager of the lodge.

Sun Studs Firm Highest Bidder On Three National Forest Tracts

Sun Studs, Inc. of Roseburg Tuesday purchased three tracts of Umpqua National Forest timber from the U.S. Forest Service for a total of \$69,247.30. The appraised price on the three tracts, all located on the North Umpqua Ranger District, was \$58,463.10.

A fourth tract, also on the North Umpqua Ranger District, was not sold because there were no qualified bidders. This tract is now up for sale at the appraised price of \$5,508, pending any change in lumber market values which would change the appraisal.

The tract is on 14 acres and contains 180,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$30 per thousand feet and 15,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$7.20.

The first tract purchased by Sun Studs, Inc. was on 126 acres located 45 miles northeast of Roseburg. Total appraisal was \$44,235. Sun Studs, Inc. bid \$46 per thousand and 1,050,000 feet of Douglas

fir appraised at \$38.95 and the appraised \$27.40 on 100,000 feet of sugar pine and other pine species and \$11.95 on 50,000 feet of western hemlock and other species, for a total bid of \$51,637.50.

Other bidders on this tract were J. & R. Morgan and Douglas County Lumber Co. of Roseburg; Paul B. Hult Lumber Co. of Dillard; and Skeels Logging Co. of Winchester.

The second tract, on six acres 48 miles northeast of Roseburg, was appraised at \$10,389.60 and sold to Sun Studs, Inc. for \$13,024. They bid \$44 per thousand and 220,000 feet of Douglas fir and other species appraised at \$35.10.

Other bidders were Clossner and Brooks, Douglas County Lumber Co., and Skeels Logging Co.

The U.S. Forest Service will offer three more tracts of Umpqua National Forest timber for sale Thursday.
