

Rockefeller Asks Nixon Statement Following Meeting With President

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller called upon Vice President Richard M. Nixon today to declare "precisely" what Nixon believes and proposes in order to meet "great matters before the nation."

such declarations but "it has not been done."

Rockefeller's statement was made to a closed door meeting of Republican leaders here a few hours after he had personally notified President Eisenhower that he planned to make the statement. The statement also was critical of current national defense policies.

The New York governor also told the meeting he would head the New York delegation to the Republican National Convention next month in Chicago.

The statement made no reference to Rockefeller's current political position "available" for a draft to run as the GOP candidate for president.

However, the tenor of the statement indicated that Rockefeller was striking out on his own as a Republican spokesman independent of the Eisenhower-Nixon administration.

Rockefeller said in a prepared statement issued to newsmen as he was meeting with the leaders: "I find it unreasonable, in these times, that the leading Republican candidate for the presidential nomination has firmly insisted on making known his program and his policies not before, but only after, nomination by his party."

Earlier, Rockefeller told reporters in Washington that he and the President had talked some politics at their private breakfast.

Rockefeller said that neither the nation nor the Republican party could "march to meet the future with a banner aloft whose only emblem is a question mark."

Nixon, the Republican party's only declared candidate for the presidential nomination, has said he does not intend to speak out on major issues as part of his campaign until after he is nominated.

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"I find it reasonable, and urgently necessary, that the new spokesmen of the Republican party declare now, and not at some later date, precisely what they believe and what they propose to meet the great matters before the nation... I have been waiting for this."

"It has not been done. I can no longer be silent on the fact."

Kitchen, who had been with the firm 33 years, is survived by the widow and three children.

Assault Case Hearing Set In District Court

Judge Warren Woodruff set a preliminary hearing for Monday afternoon and set bail at \$1,000.

Denn is charged with threatening his brother, Victor J. Denn, with a wooden tool handle Tuesday at Camas Valley. The charge is an indictable misdemeanor.

Frach Pleads Guilty

Charles Doman Frach, 30, of Rt. 1, Box 21, Roseburg, was fined \$35 after pleading guilty in Roseburg Municipal Court Tuesday to an immoral practice charge. He was arrested at Stewart Park Monday night by Roseburg police, who charged that he had indecently exposed himself.

Drunk Driver Fined

Ronald William King, 43, of Roseburg, was fined \$150 and sentenced to 10 days in the county jail after pleading guilty to a drunk driving charge in Douglas County District Court Tuesday.

Air Cleaner Stolen

Bobby Joe Sanders of Myrtle Creek reported to Roseburg police Tuesday that an air cleaner had been stolen from an automobile stored at the Roseburg Motor Co., 504 SE Rose St.

An eyewitness, Kenneth Sanders of nearby Medora, said he heard the roar of the jet engine and then several sharp explosions.

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Coast-To-Coast Primaries Show Preference For Nixon

Primary results from coast to coast offered evidence today of the popularity of Vice President Richard M. Nixon in California and the weakening of Tammany Hall in New York.

Nixon polled more votes on the Republican ballot in Tuesday's California primary than Gov. Edmund G. Brown did on the Democratic ballot. A pension promoter came deeply into Brown's total.

Tammany leader Carmine DeSapio suffered a major setback

when reform Democrats defeated some of his followers in New York City.

The California and New York primaries came during a busy day of voting. Montana, Idaho, South Dakota, and Mississippi also had primaries Tuesday.

In California, Brown, running as a favorite-son candidate, won control of the state's 81-vote delegation to the Democratic National Convention. But pension promoter George H. McLain received 30 per cent of the Democratic total.

The combined vote of Brown and McLain was greater than the total piled up by Nixon. But the Democratic margin was not as great as the party's 3 to 2 majority in the state.

With 17,678 of the state's 28,783 precincts reporting, Nixon had 668,073 Republican votes, Brown had 627,584 Democratic votes and McLain 291,180.

Republican leaders hailed Nixon's total, which added 70 votes to his cause at the Republican National Convention in July. The runoff winner will meet Republican Sen. Henry Dworshak in November.

In New York, DeSapio denied the results were a challenge to his leadership. As head of Tammany Hall, he leads the party in New York City's borough of Manhattan. He also serves as National committeeman.

The primary fights were "local contests," DeSapio said.

But an insurgent leader, Francis W. H. Adams, called on DeSapio to resign as committeeman.

In Montana, Rep. Lee Metcalf held a lead in the four-man contest for the Democratic nomination to the Senate. The incumbent, Sen. James E. Murray, 84, is retiring.

Former Rep. Orvin B. Fjare was leading in the six-man contest for the Republican nomination.

In Idaho, Rep. Gracie Pfof, running for Democratic renomination, easily defeated Leslie McCarthy.

In the race for the Democratic nomination to the Senate, no one came near getting the 40 per cent vote needed to win. Five tried.

The leader was Gregg Polvin, who will enter a runoff June 28 against either Robert McLaughlin or Compton White, running neck and neck for second place. The runoff winner will meet Republican Sen. Henry Dworshak in November.

In South Dakota, Ben Reifel won the Republican nomination and Ray Fitzgerald the Democratic nomination for the seat now held by Rep. George McGovern.

McGovern, unopposed, won the Democratic nomination for the Senate. He will oppose Sen. Karl Mundt in November.

South Dakotans also voted for two unopposed delegations to the Republican and Democratic conventions. The Republican slate backed Nixon and the Democratic slate was unpledged.

In Mississippi, Sen. James O. Eastland and two congressmen came through as expected in Democratic primary contests. The trio won overwhelming victories.

Eastland, one of the South's strongest segregationists, defeated Alben Barkley by a better than 15 to 1 margin. In the other contests, Rep. John Bell Williams and Rep. Arthur Winstead won easily.

Glendale Board Hires Teachers

Several representatives from Wolf Creek were present for the recent Glendale School Board meeting, according to Mrs. Grace Fox, correspondent. They asked for information relative to the costs of education in the Glendale school system, the high school curriculum, and other matters related to education. The Board answered their questions and discussed with them the steps necessary for the annexation procedure should the area desire it.

The board hired three new teachers: Stanley M. Vanderwal, music director; Chester Smith, high school science teacher; and Mrs. Kathryn Hutto, fifth grade teacher. Superintendent Yoder reported that the faculty list for next year is now complete.

The board approved the hiring of a deputized person to handle the admissions to the football, basketball and baseball games next year. The official will be paid from the income to the games. They felt that there had been a loss this past year from persons having gained admission without paying to attend the games.

It was decided that the school system would participate in the following organizations for the coming school year: Oregon School Board Association; Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development; and the Oregon School Study Council.

After a discussion of the various fields in which the school board members must work, the board chairman made the following committee appointments for the coming year: Activities and Procedures of Administration, Mrs. Leola Fisher; Educational Program, Rodney Swanson, assisted by Mrs. Jean Gaedecke; Pupil Attendance and Activities, Life Edson, assisted by Martin Brooks; School Property and Insurance, William Albert Vaughn; and Community and School Relations, Martin Brooks and Mrs. Jean Gaedecke.

The next meeting will be held on Monday, June 13.

Glendale City Council In Routine Meeting

The Glendale City Council held a routine meeting at the city hall on Monday, according to correspondent Gerald B. Fox. There was little discussion except on a report brought by the mayor, Ralph Place, concerning the work being done by a business men's committee on community development with which he is affiliated. A public meeting on Community Development will be announced when arrangements have been completed.

An attempted entry to the Lindell Clinic, 1105 E. Douglas St., Roseburg, was reported to police Tuesday by Mrs. Barbara Warren. Officers said that a small window had been forced open, but that the building had apparently not been entered.

Grabow Found Innocent By District Court Jury

Dr. John J. Grabow, 47, Sutherlin, was found innocent of drunken driving after a daylong trial in Douglas County District Court Tuesday.

Grabow told the six-person jury that he had had eight mixed drinks in a period of about eight hours. The arresting state police officer said the doctor had been stopped on Highway 234 on the evening of Jan. 1 between Sutherlin and Oakland because his car had moved into the opposite lane of traffic on two occasions.

Released On Bail

Loren Shelby, 18, of Riddle, was released on \$1,000 bond this morning to appear in District Court Monday for preliminary hearing on a felony theft count.

He appeared before Judge Warren Woodruff on a charge of stealing a spark coil May 18 from railroad rolling stock owned by the Southern Pacific railroad.

Entomologists Warn Cherry Fruit Fly Out

Entomologists at Oregon State College notified the local extension office that the cherry fruit fly began to emerge June 6. Control measures should be applied immediately to prevent wormy cherries, according to J. Roland Parker, County Extension Agent.

Timing of spray or dust applications is important for effective control of the fly. Flies begin to lay eggs within 8 to 10 days after emerging and must be destroyed before eggs are deposited to prevent wormy fruit. Applications of sprays or dust for fly control should be made every ten days until harvest.

Perthane emulsifiable concentrate containing 4 pounds of actual Perthane per gallon is recommended where cherries are for fresh market or home use, as a minimum of spray residue adheres to the fruit and can be applied up to within 2 days of harvest. The amount of Perthane to use is 1 quart to 100 gallons of water where large quantities of spray is required. One cup of Perthane emulsifiable concentrate will make 25 gallons of spray.

Commercial cherry growers selling to processors may use one or several insecticides recommended for fly control that leave more of a spray residue on the fruit, because the fruit is washed prior to processing.

More complete details on approved insecticides for control of the cherry fruit fly is available at the County Extension Office.

Downing Gets 3-Year State Prison Term

Kenneth Fredrick Downing, 27, Reedsport, was sentenced to serve three years in the Oregon State Prison Tuesday by Douglas County Circuit Court Judge Eldon Calvey.

Downing was convicted of the crime of burglary not in a dwelling, in connection with the May 30 theft of various articles from a Reedsport logging supply company building.

A charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor in connection with the same incident was dismissed against Downing.

A similar charge was dismissed against Merle Monroe Coss.
