### Broccoli, Cauliflower, Filbert Harvests Good; Walnuts Take Dip

The broccoli, cauliflower and filbert harvests in Oregon were good this year, but there were declines in walnuts, cranberries, apples, pears and cabbage.  
The Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service today said Oregon growers were expected to produce a broccoli crop of 156,000 hundredweight for processing and fresh marketing. This was a near record yield.  
The cabbage crop was down to 333,000 hundredweight, 8 per cent less than the 1959 production of 360,000.  
The cauliflower production was at 221,000 hundredweight, up 47 per cent from the 1959 crop of 150,000 hundredweight.  
The filbert production for Oregon and Washington was placed at 8,600 tons—up 7 per cent from the 10-year average. The walnut harvest now underway was estimated at 2,100 tons, about one-half of the 1959 total.  
Cranberry production in the state was 30,200 barrels, off sharp-

ly from previous estimates and 41 per cent under last year's record production. The crop, however, is 10 per cent above average.  
Oregon's apple production estimates declined during October to 2,150,000 bushels or slightly under last year's total and 14 per cent below the 10-year average. Newtowns were on the small side and scab resulting from wet weather early in the season reduced the quality.  
Oregon's winter pear crop of 75,000 tons is 9 per cent below 1959 production and 12 per cent under the 10-year average.

In her earlier Hollywood career, Rita herself got caught in the spitfire category. She may have contributed to it through a somewhat gay social life. She seems different now. "Perhaps it was her friendship with Marlon Brando, perhaps two years of intensive dramatic training. At any rate, she seems level-headed and adjusted to the problems of pursuing a career in Hollywood."  
"I no longer have the desire to be one of the big, flaming stars," she said. "If I can just do interesting things and fulfill myself as an actress, I'll be happy."

Rita's hopes for her career are considerably brightened by her role in "West Side Story." She sings, she dances, and she acts. "This is the first time I've played a real woman," she commented. "She is a Puerto Rican in New York City, and she likes everything American."  
Rita's sympathy with the part is understandable. She was born in Puerto Rico and grew up in Manhattan. She was familiar with the kind of struggle that is portrayed in "West Side Story." She herself made it out of the slums by starting as a dancer early.

### Medic Predicts Cure For Cancer

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Dr. John R. Heller, head of the Memorial Sloan-Kettering Institute in New York, says he is convinced a cancer cure soon will be developed.  
"I think we are poised on the edge of such a breakthrough," he told a cancer group here.  
"I think it will be in the anti-metabolite class of drugs."  
Heller says one of the drugs has brought marked improvement in 123 of 337 controlled cases of leukemia—cancer of the blood.  
In another controlled five-year experiment a similar drug brought significant improvement in cancers of the lung, breast, prostate and ovary, he said.
