Court Decision Favors Lambert

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court, in a decision by Justice Alfred T. Goodwin has upheld the right of Multnomah County Sheriff Francis Lambert to ban moonlighting by deputies. Thus reversed was a circuit court decision by Judge Alan F. Davis in the case of Kenneth E. Croft et al versus Lambert, Lambert had appealed.

Davis had granted an injunction suit brought by certain deputies which restrained Lambert from enforcing an order prohibiting moonlighting—the holding of another job.

The outside employment of the deputies is prohibited by law, but Davis held the statute unconstitutional.

The Supreme Court held to be without merit the contention that the limitation of the statute to Multnomah County made it unreasonable, arbitrary and special or class legislation.

"No workman has a constitutional right to work for the sheriff," it said. "If working conditions are unduly oppressive, he has two alternatives; he may seek a change in working conditions, including a change in legislation, if necessary; or, he may work for somebody else."

Other opinions included: Mary Alice Bradford, appellant, vs. Kenneth William Kammerer, appeal from Umatilla County. A judgment for the defendant automobile driver by Circuit Judge William Wells was affirmed in an opinion by Justice Kenneth J. O'Connell.

December Business Still In Doubt As To Final Score

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation wheels into the last month of a perplexing year still in some doubt as to what the final score will be.

In four weeks the short-term cliff hangers should be resolved. The longer-term course of the economy may well still be anybody's guess.

The short-term ones:

1. How much selling to establish losses for tax purposes will the stock market have to absorb? And how much, if any, will that shake its balance?
2. Will the Christmas-conscious consumer be generous enough to answer the prayers of the nation's merchants for a better sales season than last year?
3. Will the majority of the nation's corporations hold the profit line and bring 1948's earnings close to 1957's? It will be several weeks after New Year's before the figures are made public—but company executives will be giving a general idea in their yearend statements.

Stock selling for tax purposes could take a toll of the market. Prices of many stocks are well below the start of the year. And traders would want to take advantage of these losses to offset any income gains in other directions.

Ex-Athlete Woody Strode Carves Out New Career

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Twenty years ago, a giant Negro with a body like a Greek god was playing superb football for UCLA. Today Woody Strode is carving out a new career as an actor and he is still a hard-muscled, flat-bellied giant of a man.

This time he is playing for the John Ford team. The cantankerous director gave Strode his first real dramatic part in "The Trial of Sgt. Rutledge." He played the little role as a frontier soldier accused of raping a white woman.

Woody is again working for Ford, this time as a villainous Indian chief menacing James Stewart and Richard Widmark in "Two Rode Together."

"Ford browbeats me, but it's great working for him," Woody remarked. "This is a great part for me. The first time I've played an Indian. If I can pull it off, it might open a whole new field for me. If not, it's back to the jungle."

Woody has had a long, hard pull up from the sports jungles and then through the lairs of Tarzan and Rambo. Through it all, he has remained the same as when he played for UCLA, physically and temperamentally.

How does he do it?

"Two hundred pushups every morning," said Woody. That helps maintain his 6 feet 4 inches at a trim 205 pounds.

His temperament hasn't changed. He was a cool passer-catcher in his gridiron days, and he is still taking life as it comes.

A brickmason's son, Woody grew up in the depression years in Los Angeles with never a thought of going to college—"we went to school to learn a job in those days." But in a couple of years he turned from a short fat boy into a slim athlete and attracted scholarships to several colleges.

He chose UCLA, and starred at end on a team that was also notable for Kenny Washington and Jackie Robinson.

After the war, Woody rambled through pro football, then drifted into professional wrestling.

His performances as a TV wrestler led to a role as jungle chief in a Tarzan film.
