Famed Hollywood Clown Gets Canyonville Yule Tree

An expressed wish of a year ago and a friendly act making the wish come true have brought a warm and happy feeling to a couple of old friends this Christmas season.

Vague memories of long-ago Christmases as a child in his native Jacksonville and the floating imagined scent of fragrant evergreens, grown more tantalizing in repeated recollections, were expressed by Vance (Pinto) Colvig in a note added to his last year's Christmas greeting to Miss Bess Clough of Canyonville. She resolved then and there to see that he had a fresh green tree from Oregon for the 1949 holiday season.

Bozo The Clown
Fame and fortune as a Holly-

wood personage — he is successful as Bozo the Clown in personal appearances and on children's records and does character voices for Walt Disney productions — failed to dim his appreciation of the Oregon outdoors and the desire for a deep breath of rain-moist evergreen perfume at Christmastime. Colvig is a grandson of Canyonville's first physician and druggist, Dr. William F. Colvig, who settled in Canyonville in 1855. His mother's people, the Birdseyes, settled between Gold Hill and Rogue River where the more-than-a-century-old home still stands along the highway at Birdseye Creek.

Miss Clough, who attended a convent school in Jacksonville, became acquainted with the Colvig

family there. Over the years the friends lost contact until Miss Clough's published history of Douglas County made its appearance during the Canyonville Centennial. Colvig learned of the book and wrote Miss Clough, and they exchanged Christmas greetings and occasional letters since. The tree which Miss Clough shipped to Colvig last week was obtained under Forest Service free use permit from the Slick Creek area some 15 miles northeast of Tillamook. It was a small, densely branched, deep green Douglas fir.

Tucked carefully under the branches covering protecting the tree in transit were a few sutzar pine boughs and a bit of herring mistletoe to give him a sampling of real Oregon Christmas greenery. Talking to Miss Clough, the pleasure she received from this chance to grant a friend's wish is evident, and it is not hard to visualize the pleasure Colvig experienced as he removed the covering and inhaled the fragrance of the rich scent of Douglas fir. "I'll tell this year, not just remember!"

First Day Of Winter Finds All Kinds Of U. S. Weather

This first day of winter found

Californians basking in mid-80 degree temperatures and in South Dakota the mercury dipped to 20 below zero. At least 16 deaths were attributed to stormy weather, which erupted in the Plains and spread eastward rapidly. The storm deaths included 7 in Illinois, 5 in Ohio, 3 in Michigan and 1 in Missouri.

The blustery, snowy cold spread from the eastern Rockies into the Northeast in the wake of a snowstorm which left foot-high falls in the Midwest. Subzero readings were reported from the Northern Plains into Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois. It was 20 below zero at Huron, S. D., and -18 at Williston, N.D., in the pre-dawn hours.

The temperature soared to 86 degrees at Miramar, Calif., Tuesday and the sunshine boosted the thermometer into the 80s again today. The same pattern appeared in all Southern California, but there were gusty winds in some areas. Tuesday's 81 in Los Angeles was the warmest Dec. 20 since 1933.

In upstate New York the snowfall continued today with the new fall in the northern portion up to 8 inches and 5 inches in the Buffalo area. The speed limit on a large section of the State Thruway was reduced to 35 miles an hour because of road conditions. Most of Connecticut had rain, although there was sufficient snow in the area to close schools in Norfolk.

The storm lost some of its force in crossing the Alleghenies. Newark, N.J., had a morning temperature reading of 42 degrees and a steady rain eliminated icy spots on most of the state's highways. Snow mixed with sleet and rain began Tuesday night in western Maryland and continued through the morning.

In Ohio, the snow accumulated up to 10 inches, disrupting traffic and normal activities throughout the state. Schools were closed in most sections of the state. Main highways in Indiana were open in new snow up to 8 inches, but badly drifted side roads caused the closing of many schools.
