### Gas Chamber Takes Wife Slayer's Life

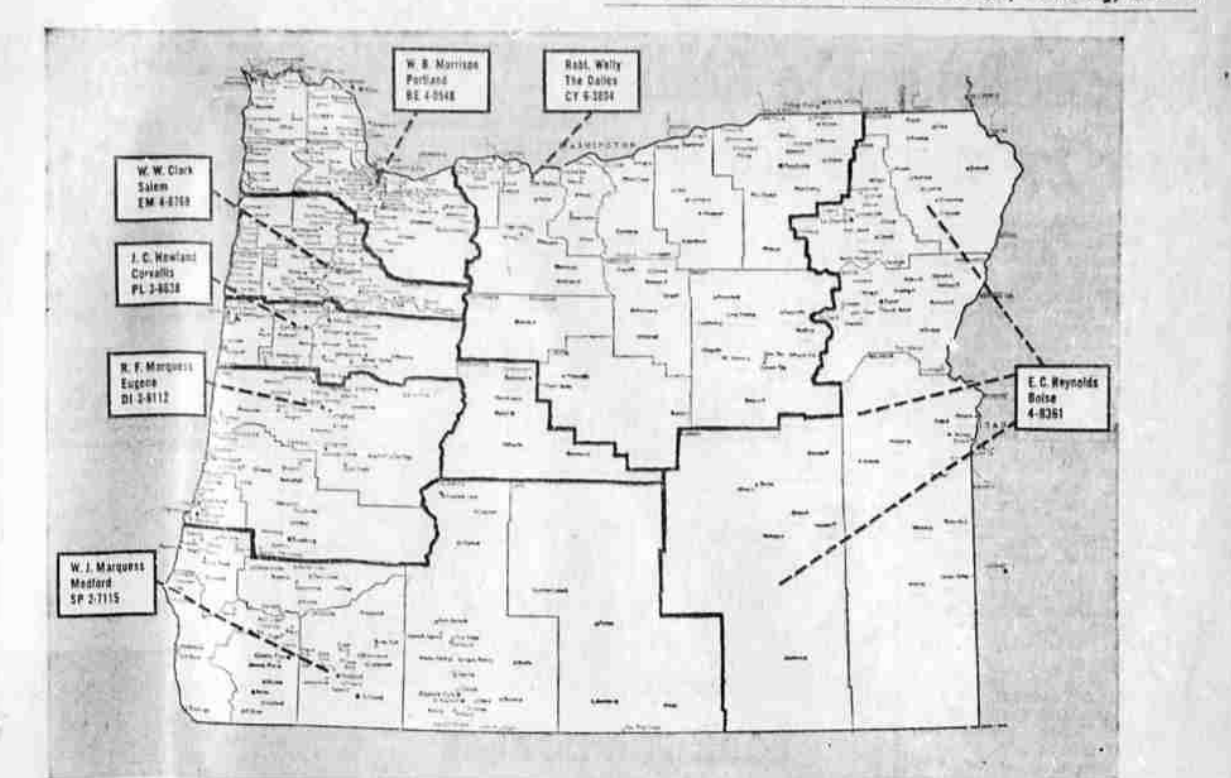

### Red China Asks Halt To U. S. 'Aggression'

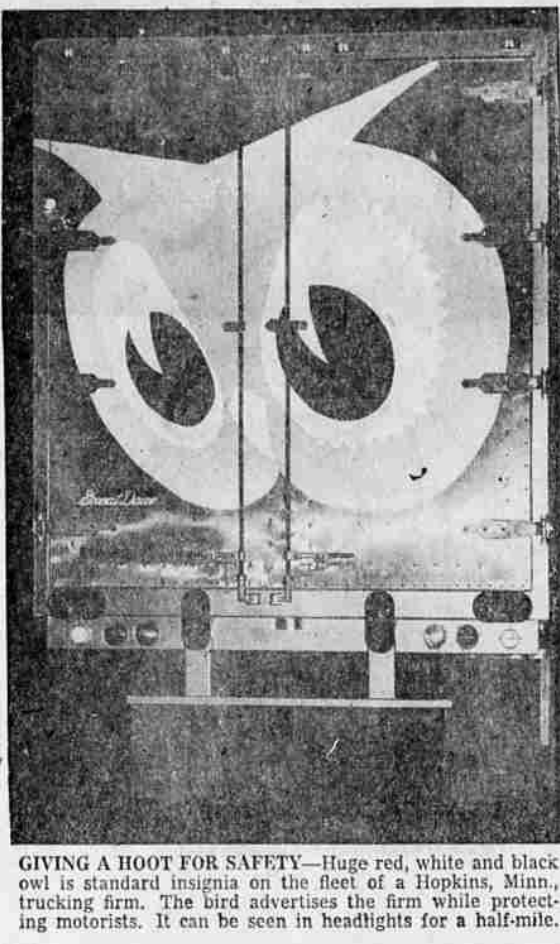

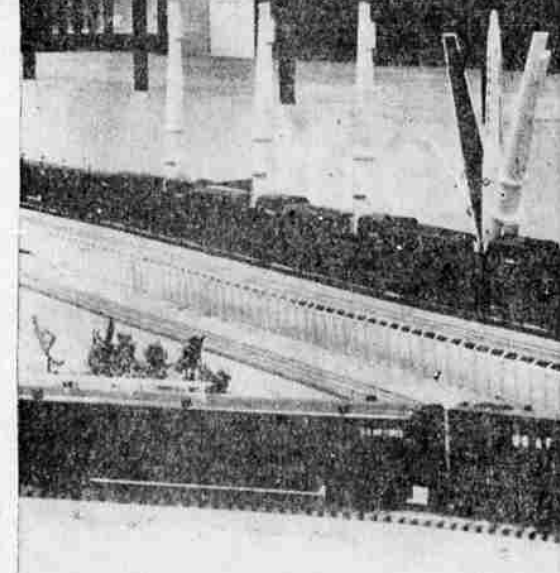
#### Creative Children Overlooked
