Sutherland and Glendale recorded Umpqua Valley League victories Saturday night as they remain knotted for the top spot in the league, and Glide continued to win staying close on the heels of the leaders.

Sutherland Wins
Sutherland's Bulldogs rolled to a 66-48 victory over the Myrtle Creek Vikings, while the Glendale Pirates trounced the Riddle Irish 64-54.

Two Teams Tied
Glendale and Sutherland currently have identical 6-2 marks in league play and the Bulldogs rest in third place with a 6-3 record. Douglas and Riddle are tied for fourth place as both are 4-4 in the league with Myrtle Creek in sixth place sporting a 3-6 record. Oakland is still winless in UWL action having lost eight out of 10.

The Bulldogs took a 19-7 first quarter lead over the Vikings and went on to down Myrtle Creek 66-48. Four Sutherland cagers broke into the double figures with Marcus Mann setting the pace with 18 points. Bob Lucas took the scoring honors for the Vikings with 14 points.

Comes From Behind
Glendale was forced to come from a first quarter deficit to defeat the Irish 64-54. The Pirates had trouble in the first quarter and then started their drive which put them out in front by two at half-time. During the second half the

Myrtle Creek Vikings Fall To Strong Sutherland Squad

Four players broke into the double figures as the Sutherland Bulldogs exhibited a well-balanced scoring attack in their 66-48 rout of the Myrtle Creek Vikings Saturday night in Umpqua Valley League competition.

Holds 6-2 Record
The win gives the Bulldogs a 6-2 league record and keeps them tied with the Glendale Pirates for the league lead. Myrtle Creek remained in sixth place, although its record dropped to 3-6 as the Vikings trail the leaders by three and one-half games.

Sutherland left little doubt as to the outcome of the contest as it burst into a 12 point lead by the end of the first quarter. The Vikings picked up in the latter periods, but were never able to get over the shock of the first quarter onslaught of the Bulldogs. The Bulldogs increased their lead to 20 points at the end of the third period and the Vikings chopped two points off the margin in the final stanza.

Bulldogs Never Headed
Breaking into an early lead the Bulldogs were never headed as they rolled to the win over the Vikings. At the end of the first period the Sutherland cagers enjoyed a 19-7 lead and by halftime had increased the margin to 39-21. Continuing to dominate the action the Bulldogs added two points to their lead in the third quarter only to see the Vikings narrow the gap back to 18 as the final buzzer sounded.

The Bulldogs outshot the Vikings from both the field and the foul line. Sutherland collected 28 field goals compared to 21 two-pointers made by the Vikings, and the winners made 10 out of 18 free throws while the losers converted six out of 12 attempts.

In the preliminary action the Myrtle Creek Jayvees dumped the Sutherland Jayvees 37-29.

Donkey Games Slated

A Donkey Basketball game will be held at Douglas High School Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. with the Winston-Dillard Kiwanians meeting the Roseburg Kiwanians. The public is invited. An admission will be charged.

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Pirates dominated the game as they rolled on to the victory. Jim Allen was the big gun for Glendale with 29 points.

At Glendale the Wildcats took a slim one point lead at halftime and then roared on in the second half as they routed the Oakers 72-39. The Wildcats picked up 22 points in the third quarter and then ended the contest with a 24-point final period. Ron Polley racked up 15 points to lead Glide, but the scoring honors for the game went to Pat Early of Oakland with 16 points.

Statistics Given
Statistic-wise Glendale is the top offensive team in the UWL and Sutherland has the best defensive mark. The Pirates have scored 474 points in eight games for an average of 59.25 points per game and the Bulldogs have held the opposition to 40.75 points per contests.

All rounds of action are set for Friday and Saturday nights in the league, and Glide continued to win staying close on the heels of the leaders.

Forward Jim Allen netted 29 points Saturday night as he led the Glendale Pirates to a 64-54 victory over the Riddle Irish in Umpqua Valley League play.

Allen connected on 13 field goals and made three shots at the foul line for his 29 total. Glen Blevins and Jim Bowen added 12 points apiece for the winners, while Ron Weakley and Walt Brown led the Irish with 12 and 11 points respectively.

Fouls Spell Difference
From the field the Pirates held a slim 24-23 margin over the Irish, but the winners outshot the Irish at the foul line. Glendale connected on 16 free throw attempts and the Irish only converted eight charity tosses.

By virtue of the win the Pirates kept a share of the UWL lead as they sport a 6-2 record, the same as the Sutherland Bulldogs. Riddle dropped into a tie for fourth place with Douglas, as both teams are 4-4 in the league.

Emergence Victorious
Though the Pirates emerged victorious, they did not do it without a fight from the scrappy Irish. At the end of the first period the Irish were out in front, but it did not last as the Pirates came back to take the lead by halftime and then slowly build up their margin as they went on to take the 64-54 victory.

At the end of the first period the fighting Irish were on top 16-9 as they thrilled the home town fans. However, the Pirates were not to be outdone as they came back in the second quarter to outscore Riddle 19-10. At halftime the Pirates held a slim two point margin, with the score reading 28-26.

Gradually Move Ahead
The Pirates added three points to their lead in the third quarter and then outscored the Irish by five points in the final stanza. The Irish tried desperately to keep the pace set by the Pirates, but the height displayed by the winners under the boards was more than Riddle could handle.

Riddle's Jayvees rolled over the Glendale Jayvees 52-36 in the preliminary game. Tom Roberts and Don Fisher had identical 10 point totals to lead the winners, while Roger Lee racked up 11 points for Glendale.

Glide Scores Easy Win Over Oakland, 72-39

Glide's Wildcats racked up 46 points in the second half Saturday night as they outclassed the Oakland Oakers 72-39 in Umpqua Valley League action.

Winners Move
The Oakers kept the pace set by the Wildcats in the first quarter and then watched the winners move out in front by one point in the second period. Coming back on the floor at Glide in the second half

the victors showed a spirited offensive attack which proved too much for the Oakers as the Wildcats roared on to the lopsided victory.

Coach Jack Forsythe used many reserves in the game with Wildcat starters playing much of the first half and the final stanza. A total of 12 Glide players got into the action and 11 of these accounted for points.

Polley Hits 15
Center Ron Polley led the point parade for the Wildcats with 15 points as three players broke into the double figures. Following Polley was Guard Darrell Cellers with 11 points, while Doug Coplin accounted for 10 points against the Oakers.

Pat Early took the scoring honors for the game as the Oaker forward bucketed 16 points. Arthur Beck was second in the scoring for the Oakers with 10 points.

12-12 Deadlock
The two teams battled to a 12-12 deadlock at the end of the first quarter and the Wildcats, led by guard Dick Reese, went on to take a 25-25 advantage at halftime. In the third quarter Polley hit for 10 points and Cellers collected nine as the Wildcats moved out in front 48-33 at the three-quarter mark.

In the final quarter the Wildcats had things their own way as they racked up 24 points while holding the Oakers to six. Polley again set the pace as he hit for five points while the remainder of the scoring was evenly divided among the reserves.

Holds 6-3 Mark
