Finds New Talent For Plays

NEW YORK — Lucille Lortel has a favorite expression: "Maybe something wonderful is going to happen!"

That — plus a tireless talent for tackling obstacles — keeps Miss Lortel up in the vanguard of theatrical reform. Whatever is offbeat, new and unusual lures her like a lamp does the moth.

Her thespic record qualifies this actress-turned-producer as the most persistent and influential sponsor of experiment in this show business capital.

Wave Pusher
Whenever any "new wave" venture comes along, the odds are on Lortel involvement. Jonsson, Genet, Betti, Dos Passos, O'Casey are among authors she has helped to Gotham hearing.

Among performers, she gave initial opportunity to Geoffrey Holder, the Irish Player, Siobhan McKenna got a chance to do "Hamlet" for her. Other established players who tested untried talents include Eva Marie Saint, Jo Sullivan, Eileen Heckart.

Desperate Authors
"My biggest satisfaction is giving opportunity to performers, directors and — most of all — to authors," she says. "Writers are the most frustrated of all — they come to me in desperation."

Miss Lortel began her unorthodox staging 14 years ago at the White Barn theater in Westport, Conn., where invitation audiences examine shows on summer weekends. Currently she is producing the fifth season of matinee performances on behalf of the American National Theatre and Academy at another theater she owns, the de Lys in Greenwich Village.

Wedding Present
Miss Lortel got into production following her marriage to Louis Schweitzer, well-to-do business executive. Her stage career included appearances with Helen Hayes in "Caesar and Cleopatra," and Judith Anderson in "The Dove" and with Florence Reed in "The Shanghai Gesture."

As a 23rd wedding anniversary present, Schweitzer bought her the de Lys theater in 1955 for experimentation — but the playhouse ever since has been regularly occupied by her first venture, "The Threepenny Opera."

Fur Seal Gets Spring Haircut

Fur seal got a butch haircut for spring. The result is lakoda, a sheer, lightweight fur introduced recently by the fur seal industry to compete with cloth coats in mild weather, too.

Jealous of the silkiness and drapability of some fabrics spring wraps are made of, pelt-makers sheared the Alaskan seal to give it a flat, silky and golden iridescent appearance.

Since the new fur has reached the market, designers have fashioned it into jackets, caps and three quarter length coats. Crisply tailored shirtmaker jackets and coats are a fur design innovation which is not usually possible with other unsheared animal pelts.

Just as if it were fabric, the new lakoda fur is often trimmed with mink ranch or mutation, unsheared seal, blue fox or Persian Lamb dyed brown or black.

The shearing trick keeps the fur out of the storage vaults in spring, an inevitability for heavier pelts.
