## Two Changes Noted In Dunes Park Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two major revisions in legislation to establish an Oregon dunes national seashore recreation area are contained in a bill introduced by Senator Maurine B. Neuberger, D-Ore., Monday.

A similar bill was introduced by her husband, the late Democratic Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon, at the last session of Congress. No action on it was taken.

She proposed these major revisions: Set up a five-member Oregon dunes advisory board to confer with the interior secretary on management policies and zoning standards and provide for local zoning of private property within the area's boundaries.

Mrs. Neuberger said the purpose of these changes is to provide "maximum local influence on matters relating to development of the seashore, and to minimize the need for the secretary (of Interior) to acquire privately owned property in the area."

She told the Senate, "We can not legislate an awe-inspiring natural wonder into existence, but we can give protection to unique and majestic works of nature."

## Willamette Board Approves Projects

PORTLAND (AP) — Nearly \$100,000 for campus projects was approved by the Willamette University Board of Trustees Monday.

The biggest project is a new hard-surfaced tennis courts for the new south campus area, to be named for the late Dr. Frank Brown, a Salem physician who was Willamette's first athletic director.

The improvements will be paid for from Willamette's share of Brown's estate, estimated at more than \$30,000.

The board also approved a plan to expand and modernize the kitchen of Baxter Hall, at a cost estimated at more than \$40,000.

The trustees voted to raise board charges \$20 per student each semester next year to offset higher charges in a new contract with a food service firm that handles dormitory meals.

David Lewis, head accountant, was appointed business manager. An accountant will be employed to aid in the business office.

Appointed to the board was Floyd Bowers, head of a Salem accounting firm.

## Pact Signing Due

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Deputy Premier A.N. Koyyari arrived by plane today for a two-week tour of India as Prime Minister Nehru's guest. Tuesday he will sign the papers for a \$126-million Soviet credit for India's third five-year plan, which begins April 1.

## Missouri Farmer Owes His Life To The Sharp Eyes Of A Friend

GALLATIN, Mo. (AP) — Paul Holcomb, 38, a farmer, owes his life to the sharp eyes of Archie Blackburn.

Holcomb was recovering today in a hospital from a 64-hour ordeal in a wrecked car in freezing weather. His three companions are dead.

Martin Kenneth Boulton, 41, and Lucky Norris Holcomb, 41, were killed when the car plunged off a curve during a heavy rain Friday night. It rolled 100 yards from the highway and hit a tree in a deep ravine.

Paul Holcomb and Lewis Lee Smith, 41, were trapped in the wreckage. The Holcombs were not related.

Blackburn, knowing the four Gallatin men were missing, went back for another look Monday and spotted car tracks in a pasture two miles west of Gallatin.

He followed the tracks to the wrecked car, hidden so well that

farmer Glen Sullenger, feeding livestock just 50 yards away, didn't know it was there.

"If Blackburn hadn't noticed those tracks it could have been weeks before the men were found," said Sheriff S. L. Houghton.

"Paul Holcomb was conscious enough to know me, but he couldn't talk," the sheriff added. "Smith died as we were putting him in an ambulance."

It was warm Friday, so the men were wearing only light clothing. But Saturday brought snow and that night the mercury dropped to 12 degrees above zero. Sunday night's reading was 22.

Paul Holcomb, with a broken leg, broken finger, lacerations, bruises and shock, could hardly move in the wreckage.

"The doors were jammed and we had to pry them open," Sheriff Houghton said. "He's mighty lucky Blackburn saw those tracks."

## State Police Foil Attempt At Abduction Of Patrolman

SALEM (AP) — State police Monday night foiled an attempt to abduct a state patrolman at gunpoint.

They set up a roadblock and captured three young persons after patrolman Thomas Hedgecock, 29, escaped by leaping from a still-moving car as it rolled toward the roadblock.

Hedgecock said he was seven miles south of Salem on a secondary road when he stopped a car for which Polk County authorities had been searching.

The patrol said he was searching the two young men who had been in the car, when the third person in the car, a girl, stopped him by drawing a gun from her clothing.

Hedgecock said they then made him drive their car toward the Pacific Highway freeway. Before they got there they passed another state patrolman, who recognized the car and radioed ahead for a roadblock.

Hedgecock said he was driving slowly when they saw the roadblock. He leaped out, tumbling onto the pavement and suffering

cuts and bruises. As the driverless car came to a halt, three state policemen arrested the three persons inside without resistance.

They had been sought since a 16-year-old Dallas girl reported earlier in the day that she had been raped.

The state police booked Lawrence Allen Morrow, 21, Ricks, 20, Ricks, on a Polk County warrant charging rape; Arlie Day Ellis, 20, Ricks, on a Polk County charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor; and Darlene Wood, 16, Dallas, on a charge of violating parole from the Hillcrest School for Girls.
