Cal-Pacific Reports Increase In Earnings

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—California-Pacific Utilities Co. Wednesday reported revenue from all sources rose to \$12,318,539 in 1960 from \$11,340,112 in 1959. Net earnings, after taxes, were \$1,108,376 and \$1,064,564 in the respective years.

The company has budgeted \$3,315,000 for improvements this year. This will include bringing natural gas to Klamath Falls by connecting with the Pacific Gas & Electric Co. California-Alberta pipeline, now under construction.

California-Pacific operates electrical service in California, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Arizona and Wyoming. It has natural gas service and telephone service in California, Oregon and Nevada, and water systems in California and Nevada. It owns a 90-mile transmission line from Hoover Dam.

Numbers Game Stopped In Pentagon Building

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal agents say they have snuffed out a \$300,000 annual numbers racket in the Pentagon.

Joseph S. Bambacus, U.S. attorney, said the raid at noon Wednesday resulted in the arrest of 35 employees who were described as "writers, managers and players" in the numbers operation.

He said the gambling ring was centered in the Defense Supply Service, the Army agency that handles office supplies for the military departments.

All of those in the operation were Negroes, Bambacus said, and were mainly messengers or laborers.

The numbers ring used messengers who rode through the Pentagon corridors on bicycle carts to pick up bets.
