House Approves Convention Bill

SALEM (AP)—The House has passed a bill to hold state political party conventions elect the delegates to national party conventions. They now are elected at primary elections.

The House had defeated the bill 33-27 Thursday. It now goes to the Senate.

The action followed a parliamentary tangle in which a half-dozen motions were made in efforts to delay or kill the bill.

The measure sets up a system of state and county political conventions.

Supporters said the bill would reduce the size of the model primary election ballot. Opponents countered that it would take away some of the rights of the people.

The Senate is believed sure to kill it, since it already has passed a bill to let the conventions do nothing except adopt party platforms.

The legislature adjourned today for the Easter weekend. It hopes to wind up the session in three weeks.

The Senate completed legislative action on a memorial asking the United States Senate to ratify the treaty with Canada, under which that country would provide stream storage on the Columbia River. This treaty, however, was ratified two weeks ago.

The Senate sent to the House a bill to let urban renewal agencies issue bonds without vote of the people. These bonds would be financed by revenues and increased tax receipts from the projects. The people authorized the legislature last November to pass such a bill.

A bill to change the term "parole" to "trial visit" as it affects state hospital patients was passed by the Senate and sent to the governor.

After a sharp debate, the Senate postponed action until Tuesday on a bill to repeal the relative responsibility law. Under this law relatives, when financially able, are required to contribute to the support of welfare cases or persons who would otherwise become welfare cases.

Emphasis On Space-Age Subjects Included In Revision Of Guides

SALEM (AP)—A new emphasis on space-age subjects was included in a revision of the State Board of Education's guide to secondary education in Oregon this week.

The emphasis included modernization of science and social studies fields. Increased stress on studies of African and Asian studies also was included.

The board granted a six-month extension on the time-limit for and approved for reorganization plans of school districts in Polk, Wallowa, Umatilla and Union counties.

The board set May 1 for an election on a proposal to create a southwest Oregon education district in Coos and Curry counties.

It accepted petitions, carrying more than 1,000 signatures, asking for creation of a similar district in Malheur and part of Baker counties.

It heard a report that 76.9 per cent of Oregon's public school pupils now are attending school in 139 unified school districts and the remainder are in some 359 school districts without a unified program.

Two plans were approved for reorganization in Umatilla County. One would join the districts of Athena No. 29, Thornhill No. 45 and Gibson No. 102 to parts of Adams No. 15 and Weston Union High School districts. The other would join district No. 16 of Pendleton to parts of district No. 15, Adams district.

The board approved and praised a department-prepared booklet designed to teach high school seniors how education is financed.

The board was told by Dr. Leon Minear that he received 42 petitions from parents at Medford and Bend asking the board to approve a department-prepared booklet designed to teach high school seniors how education is financed.

At present the students who want to get out of dancing instruction must bring the notes of approval from parents. But the Protestants say instead those who want to dance should have to bring the notes.

The board indicated it was satisfied with the present system.

Christians' Procession Contrasts With Samaritans' Passover Fete

JERUSALEM, Jordan Sector (AP)—In the streets of Old Jerusalem Friday tourists from Illinois and Iowa wearing wash 'n' wear suits followed the procession of the Way of the Cross commemorating Christ's trial, death and crucifixion.

Last evening as the sun set a bearded patriarch in a white, flowing robe stood on a stone block on the slopes of Mount Gerizim chanting from ancient scriptures. When he pronounced the word "kill" 12 knives flashed and 12 sheep were slaughtered.

The two contrasting scenes dramatize the diversity of religious devotion in the Holy Land during Easter 1961.

The bearded patriarch is high priest of the almost extinct Samaritan community which still observes the feast of the Passover in exactly the same way Moses commanded in the Old Testament.

There are only 345 Samaritans remaining in the once-flourishing community.

But the Samaritans have clung to rigid observance of the Passover in the most minute details. Their Passover this year fell on the same day as Good Friday. On this occasion every Samaritan alive is expected to gather on Mount Gerizim—the Samaritans' sacred sanctuary near Nablus, Jordan.

Sawmill Workers Union Ends Annual Convention

PORTLAND (AP)—The Western Council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union approved Thursday a doubling of the per capita tax from 10 to 20 cents a month, as the council ended its annual convention here.

The proposal now will be submitted to a vote of the 45,000 members.

In other action the convention approved a resolution against the export of logs. "Natural resources of a country are the nation's wealth," the resolution said, "and export of logs degrades the economy of our country."

All officers were re-elected for four-year terms. They are: Joseph Hazzard, San Francisco, president; Robert Weller, Kalispell, Mont., vice president; Earl Hartley, Portland, executive secretary; William E. Wilson, Santa Rosa, Calif., conductor, and John Moore, Tacoma, Wash., warden.

House Kills Solon Transportation Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposal to allow senators unlimited trips back home has been knocked in the head by the House.

As a result, Sen. Clair Engle, D-Calif., probably will have to dig into his own pocket to pay for a trip he made to his home state, after Congress adjourned last fall, to preside over conferences arranged by the Senate Small Business Committee.

Engle's voucher was presented to the financial clerk of the Senate by the chairman of the committee, Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala.

"It bounced back," Sparkman told the Senate Appropriations Committee recently because it was held to conflict with a 1960 law which said that members of Congress can't be paid for official inspection or investigation trips which wind up in their home states.

The Senate committee heeded Sparkman's plea and added to a House-passed appropriations bill a provision repealing the 1960 ban.

The Senate approved the proposal without debate and without a dissent.

Then the bill returned to a Senate-House Conference Committee. House members balked and the senators agreed to abandon the repealer without a struggle.
