

American Records Tumble In National Swimming Meet

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—Too bad the Olympic games are not being held again this year, say America's top swimming experts here for the National A.A.U. Indoor Swimming Championships. They feel so good mainly because of the awesome display of power displayed so far in the three-day meet which ends tonight.

There have been seven races and seven American records, tops in a 25-yard short course pool. World records can be made only in a long course tank. The way things have been going, hardly anybody will be surprised if the current standards in the eight remaining tests survive after tonight's bombardment.

Six American marks were broken Friday night in five races, two of them in the 440-yard freestyle relay won by the New Haven Swim Club's "A" team and its leadoff star, Mike Austin of Rochester, N.Y.

The quartet of Austin, Jim Lofthouse, Dave Tyler and Gary Ball finished in 3:15.9, one-tenth of a second under Southern California's record. Austin, a Yale freshman, paced the exciting triumph with 0:47.7 split for the first 100 yards. The listed record was made here last year by Jeff Farrell, 0:48.2.

The other record-smashers were defending champions Charley Bittick of Southern California, 220-yard backstroke, 2:09.7, for his second time in as many days, and Mike Troy of Indiana, 220-yard butterfly, 2:10.9. Steve Clark, Los Altos, Calif., high school senior, 220-yard freestyle, 2:00; and Chet Jastrzemski of Indiana, 220-yard breaststroke, 2:26.7.

On opening night, Bittick bettered the American 400-yard individual medley mark, and Murray Rose, Southern California swimmer from Australia, lowered the meet record in the 1500-meter grind.

Lois Vitucci, the Ohio State sophomore from Hollywood, Fla., is the new one-meter dive champion.

A feature last night was Clark's two-yard triumph over the mighty Rose in the 220-yard sprint. It was the Australian gold medal winner's first setback in a middle-distance race in America, and broke an eight straight National A.A.U. indoor meet victory streak. He was disappointed, he said, "naturally, of course."

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Presence Of Washington Senators In Grapefruit League Is Obvious

The Washington Senators have been making their presence felt in the grapefruit league this year. For a franchise that started from scratch and picked players out of a grab bag pool of players, the newcomers have progressed remarkably well in the baseball exhibitions. The "new" Senators manager is Mickey Vernon, the old-time Washington favorite.

Senators Club Athletics

The Senators clubbed the Kansas City A's 13-3 at Pompano Beach for their sixth victory in the last seven citrus starts. This made Washington's win-loss record 11-8, second best among the 10 American League teams this spring.

Fans Could Cheer

Fans in Washington who saw last season's edition of the Nats finish fifth after three straight years in the cellar could have a lot to cheer about if "new" Senators continue to improve. Castoffs Dale Long, Danny O'Connell, Willie Tasby and Pete Daley provided the batting punch in Washington's 15-hit outburst against the A's. Each contributed three hits with Long and O'Connell collecting homers.

Rookie Ed Hobaugh, 26, a right-

hander drafted from San Diego,

pitched seven innings for the Senators, allowing all three A's runs on five hits. Norm Sieben homered for Kansas City. Southpaw Carl Mathias, picked up from Cleveland, finished with two scoreless frames.

Pittsburgh Beats Yankees

In other games Pittsburgh won its second game this spring from New York 4-2. Cincinnati blanked Indianapolis of the American Association 3-0. Cleveland edged Tacoma of the Pacific Coast League 4-3 and in a night game at Miami, Detroit whipped Baltimore 6-3.

The Pirates posted their 15th victory in 21 games in maintaining their World Series supremacy over the Yankees. Harvey Haddix, Pittsburgh's winning pitcher in the seventh game of the series, yielded three hits and an unearned run in six innings to gain the verdict.

Ralph Terry, losing hurler for New York in the final series game, worked four perfect innings before the Pirates tagged him for four runs in the fifth inning. Haddix' two-run double was the decisive hit. Tony Kubek batted in both of the Yankees' runs.

Mickey Mantle of New York was sidelined with a pulled stomach muscle.

Coleman Homers

Gordie Coleman's three-run homer in the eighth inning accounted for all the Reds' runs. Bob Purkey held Indianapolis to nine scattered hits in turning in the first nine-inning tour by a Cincinnati pitcher this spring.

Tito Francona's two-run double in the seventh gave the Indians their win over Tacoma. Barry Lattman worked for the first six innings for the Tribe and Steve Hamilton pitched three scoreless frames. Dick Phillips had three hits for Tacoma, including a homer.

Jim Bunning went the distance for the Tigers and limited the Orioles to six hits while striking out nine and allowing only one walk. Detroit bunched four of its nine hits off Baltimore starter

Milt Pappas for a four-run eighth inning uprising that snapped a 2-2 tie. Ron Hansen and Jim Gentile homered for Baltimore.

The Milwaukee Braves got pitchers Moe Drabowsky and Seth Morehead from the Chicago Cubs in exchange for infielders Andre Rodgers and Daryl Robertson.
