

# Artichokes Now Plentiful; Asparagus And Rhubarb Show Some Drop In Price

Artichokes are being featured by some of the supermarkets this weekend as specials, as they are plentiful and very reasonable. This is at the peak of the season in the Watsonville producing area. The larger ones are reportedly the better buy, but small ones also are being offered reasonably.

Asparagus has come down in price to offer a refreshing new vegetable. Salem areas and Washington are now producing and the quality is very good. Rhubarb is another spring crop which is coming down in price as new northern areas start producing. So far very little rhubarb has shown on the market, but Portland is shipping.

Cucumbers, which have been almost out of sight for price, now are coming down within reason as Florida has started shipping in such quantities that they are cheaper than the hothouse supply out of Salem and those from Mexico. The flood on the market has reduced the price.

Peppers also are coming down some in price, but not too much as yet. California has started producing, but there are some from Florida still in the hands of retailers and they are very good. Tomatoes continue firm in price, those from Florida being better in quality than the Mexican shipments. The Imperial Valley is shipping a few.

Local cauliflower is nearing its cleanup. An approximate 700 to 800 crates are being shipped out this week, and they will finish the local picture. One grower, Cliff Hess, has a new, small crop coming on, but it is slow to mature. This will be the last of the local cauliflower until fall. Meanwhile, it will be necessary to go to Portland for supplies.

Lettuce is showing strength, with higher prices for poorer quality. However, a new area in the Imperial Valley will be shipping very soon with some excellent heads. The price probably will stay firm until other areas come on. Salinas will be coming on very soon also.

Romaine, endive, red and butter lettuce out of Salinas continue good and reasonable. Very fine radishes and green onions are coming from the same area. Arizona is also shipping radishes but they are of lesser quality, although cheaper. Cabbage is very good now, the

heads being green and solid. Demand has dropped sharply on Salinas broccoli. Celery is in a rather weak position, but the quality on both celery and hearts is very good. Giant Stride peas from Bakerville are available but demand is practically nil, with frozen peas on the market.

Banana squash is available. Danish squash from California and Florida is on but high, and Zucchini also is being brought in but demand is very poor. The same applies to egg plant. Brussel sprouts are almost non-existent. Mustard and beet greens and spinach are very good.

Delicious apples have shown some flury upwards in price, as the supply nears its end. Winesap and Roman Beauties continue steady. Pears are in abundance, but storage grapes are all but through. Fresh strawberries are moderating in price, but demand locally is slow.

Small oranges dropped in price this week, with large ones unchanged. The supply stays short. Lemons are unchanged. Some Indian River and Texas grapefruit are available, but are nearing the season's close. California grapefruit are coming on steadily. There has been little change in the banana picture. The same holds for pineapples and grapefruit. Mandarin oranges are on and very good. The market is steady on avocados, the fruit moving out nicely as the winter crop nears its end.

Potatoes were showing some strength this week as supplies of the old crop diminish. New potatoes from California and red varieties from Florida are keeping the price from climbing too fast.

Carrots are in short supply and high f.o.b. in price, with no immediate relief in sight. Turnips come in steadily from California with good demand. Parsnip demand is slipping fast. A few local rutabagas are in the hands of retailers. Dry onions remain steady, and indications are they will clean up very well. New crops should be on in another month.

Sweet potatoes are through, and only a few yams at 50 to 75 cents a hundred higher than usual remain.

Eggs and poultry were reported as unchanged at wholesale this week.

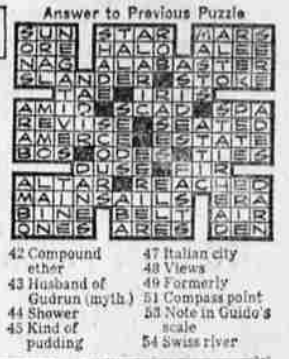
### Knotts Visit
