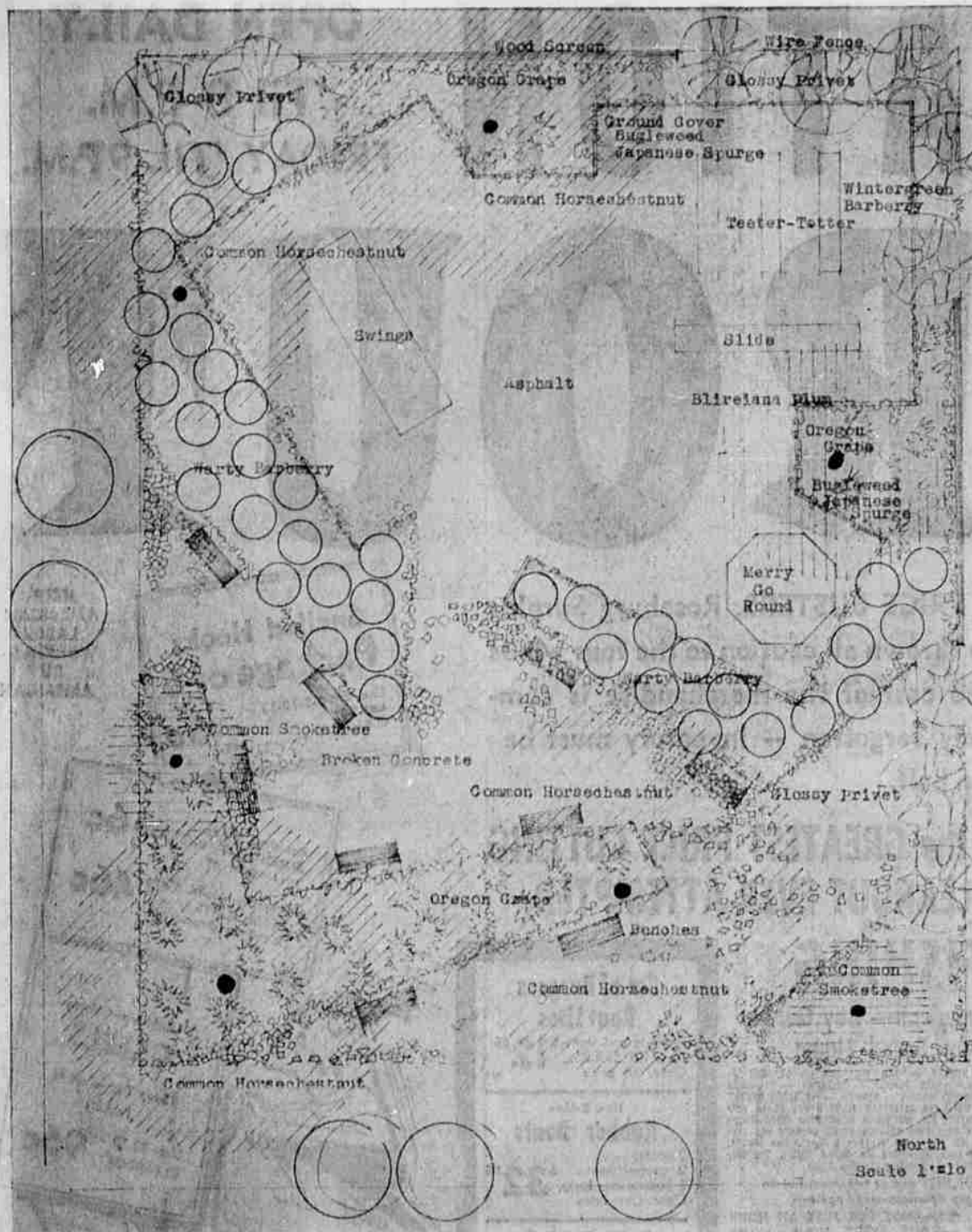


Park Improvement Planned

Bipartisan Group To Study Expenses Of Legislators

SALEM (AP)—A four-member bipartisan subcommittee to consider legislative pay and expenses was named today by Chairman Norman Howard, D-Portland, of the House State and Federal Affairs Committee. The committee was instructed to study all of the various measures to increase the legislators' \$600 annual pay. It also will study the problem of paying legislators for their legislative expenses. The Supreme Court ruled constitutional last Friday the resolution to pay each legislator up to \$75 a month expenses during sessions and up to \$150 a month between sessions. The subcommittee will try to make rules on what the legislative expenses that could be paid. The Constitution bars payment of personal expenses. The committee already has voted for the principle of a resolution that would have annual sessions and legislators fix their own salaries. Any measure to increase the salaries would have to be referred to the people.
