RHS Indian Thinclads, Netmen To Do Battle

While the Roseburg Indian stars are inactive over the weekend, the tennis team and the track squad will more than make up for the lull.

Weather permitting, the defending state champion tennis team will host the Oregon State Rooks today at 3 p.m., then clash with the invading Medford Black Tornadoes at noon Saturday. The Tribe's thinclads will be in action Saturday when the varsity and the Jayvees travel to Grants Pass to compete in the Rotary Relays. Under the tutelage of coach Al Hoffman, the Indian netmen have racked up 10 consecutive wins without a setback so far this season. The Rooks are expected to be the stiffest competition faced to date as they have the state champs from Arizona and Idaho, along with the runner-up from Oregon in action. The Black Tornadoes are not entirely unknown to the Indians as the local squad started with a 7-0 victory over Medford.

Leading the Indians to battle will be state singles champ, Mike Brundage. Along with Brundage the defending champs have good cover down the line in Don Love, Doug Green, Howard Sohn, Tom Kirk, Jack Beaman and Don Harris.

The local thinclads will be out to gain prestige at Grants Pass after a poor showing in the Hayward Relays last weekend. In the Metro class at the Hayward Relays the Indians were able to place in only two events picking up 1 1/2 points.

For the season coach Jim McAllister's thinclads have placed third in the Roseburg Jayvee Invitational Relays, second in the Spike Leslie Relays at North Bend, and have split in a pair of dual meets. The loss in dual meet competition came by a 62-68 count at the hands of the Corvallis Spartans, while the lone victory came over the North Bend Jayvees.

In addition to the varsity stars in action at the Rotary Relays, the Indians will have their Jayvees in action in the annual event.

Thompson Holds One Stroke Lead In Golf Classic

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Peter Thompson, the Australian who has won the British Open four times, began the second round of the \$40,000 Houston Golf Classic today with a one-stroke lead over Chick Harbert.

Thompson birdied the last two holes Thursday to overtake Harbert, the 1954 PGA champion, with a 32-33-65 for the 7,122-yard par 35-35-70 Memorial Park course.

Harbert birdied the final two holes to offset a pair of back nine bogies for a 32-34-66 posted half an hour earlier.

Both Thompson and Harbert slipped Thursday. A major portion of the gallery of 20,000, a first day record for the 15-year-old classic, concentrated on Gary Player and Arnold Palmer, playing their first competitive rounds since their Masters tournaments thriller two weeks ago.

Palmer, seeking his second classic victory, had a two-under 68. Player three-putted six greens and took a 72 that left him seven strokes off the pace.

A 19-foot putt that refused to drop on the final green knocked Palmer out of a tie at 67 with Jack Burke Jr., Julius Boros, Jerry Pittman, Johnny Pott and Gordon Jones.

Grouped with Palmer at 68 were Huston Laclair of Birmingham, Ala., Freddie Haas of New Orleans and Jerry Barber of Los Angeles.

Player, the young South African star who took the Masters title from Palmer by one stroke, was disgruntled with his late-afternoon finish. He bogied four of the last eight holes.

"My putting was bad, my chipping was bad," he said. "In fact, my chipping putting were pathetic."

Thompson meanwhile hit 17 greens while collecting five birdies and 13 pars. Harbert hit 15 while mixing 10 pars with 6 birdies and 2 bogies.

Oregon Ducks Open ND Conference Race

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special) — Oregon's hustling baseball team, which had a highly successful non-conference record of 13 wins and four losses, opens the Northern Division race this weekend with games against Oregon State at Corvallis on Friday and here at Howe Field at 2 p.m. Saturday.

Denny Peterson, the talented junior from The Dalles who has been undefeated this spring in five starts, seems certain to be the starter in the first game and lefty Fred Ballard will probably get the call for duty on Saturday.

The return of Capt. Jim Hollister, the two-time, all-league first baseman, to action strengthens the Web-foot infield and he'll team with either Dave Moore or Trev Swangard at second. Leon Hayes at short and Peter Gumina at third in the infield. Eddie Davidson, the converted infielder who leads the club in hitting, will open in center field with Jim Cloutier in right and either Eric Hardin or Walt Baranski will start in left field.

Oregon's improved hitting in the last half dozen games has given Coach Kirsch renewed hope his club will be an outside threat for the league pennant this spring. The Ducks, who won most of their early games on strong pitching and a tight defense, began to find the range with the bat during the last week and pounded opposition pitching for a refreshing number of hits, including more extra base blows that they had collected in the previous three weeks.

Pender Not Underestimating Challenger Carmen Basilio

BOSTON (AP) — Champion Paul Pender refuses to underestimate older Carmen Basilio in final preparations for their middleweight title Saturday night.

The nationally televised ABC, 10 p.m. scheduled 15-rounder at Boston Garden offers a contrast in fistic styles between the clever boxing Pender making his second defense and the hard-hitting challenger appearing in his 11th championship test.

Pender's crown has geographical limits in recognition — Massachusetts, New York and Europe. But Pender, 30, from Brookline, Mass., expects to get nearly \$80,000 as his share of an expected \$100,000 gate plus \$75,000 in video rights.

Giving away four years in age and five inches in reach, Basilio expects to reach \$30,000.

"This is a good fighter," Pender said Thursday night after a light workout. "I'm making no miscalculations with Basilio."

A pair of track meets will find all seven Umpqua Valley League schools competing on the oval Saturday, and Sutherland's Bulldogs will be in action tonight.

Tonight the Bulldogs' spring relay team consisting of Jim Trimmer, Steve Thomson, Paul Trimmer and Wayne Fagin will be in action in the Independence Relays. The Relays are scheduled to start at 6 p.m. at Independence.

Saturday the Bulldogs will join the Douglas Trojans and the Myrtle Creek Vikings for a triangular meet at Myrtle Creek starting at 1:30 p.m. Glide's Wildcats, the Glendale Pirates and the Oakland Oakers will converge on Riddle to take part in a four-way meet against the host Irish starting at 10 a.m.

The meet at Myrtle Creek promises to be a thriller with the top three local A-2 powers in action. In the last triangular meet between the three schools the Vikings edged the Bulldogs by one point, with the Trojans following closely on the heels of the leaders.

Husky Trackmen To Battle Bruins

LOS ANGELES (AP) — UCLA, winner over California and Stanford in dual track and field competition, is favored to defeat the Washington Huskies in another Big Five meet Saturday on the Bruins' Trotter Field.

The Huskies have several individual stars, however, notably pole vaulter John Cramer, one of the best in the nation with a formidable best leap of 15 feet 3 1/2 inch. Sophomore Cramer's teammate, Don Fallis, is a threat himself as is Bill Logan of UCLA, both of whom have cleared 14 1/2 feet this spring.

Another standout for Washington is John Douglas, Big Five winner in the javelin last year with a throw of 237 feet.

Douglas' main challenger is Bruin C. K. Yang, who did 236-3 last week, his all-time best.

The springs pose an interesting argument between Bob Saunders of Washington, who checked off a 9.3 last year, and the Bruins' Arnold Tripp and Chris Knott. Tripp has done 9.6 this spring.

The quarter-mile dash could be a duel between the Huskies' Rick Harder, with a 47.8 last year, and Bruin Andy Dunkell, who ran 47.7 last week.

Spahn And Wynn Aim For 300th Game Win

Early Wynn was one triumph nearer today to his 300-victory goal but the veteran Chicago White Sox pitcher was still three behind Warren Spahn in their spirited race to see who gets there first.

Wynn, 41, after three failures, finally notched his 285th major league success Thursday, pitching the White Sox to a 6-1 triumph over the Washington Senators. Spahn, the brilliant Milwaukee Braves' left-hander was slated to try for his 289th victory in Pittsburgh tonight.

For once, no game was postponed because of rain, snow or cold weather. The New York Yankees, led since Monday because of foul weather, swept a double-header from Los Angeles 7-5 and 4-2 to surge into a second place tie with Detroit, Minnesota, due to open its home season today, leads the American League race by one half game.

The Tigers pounded out an 11-4 victory in Cleveland, Kansas City, Baltimore and Boston, along with Minnesota, were not scheduled.

In the National League, San Francisco led the first place Cincinnati Reds 2-1, Chicago's Cubs shut out Pittsburgh 3-0, Milwaukee edged Philadelphia 7-6 in 11 innings and St. Louis halloped Los Angeles 11-2.

Wynn received solid home run support from his White Sox mates. Among the 11 hits off loser Hal Woodeshick and two relievers were four-baggers by Roy Seivers, Jim Landis and Al Smith. Early was tagged for nine hits.

Right-handers Art Ditmar and Bob Turley were the winning pitchers but both needed late inning help. Turley walked nine in 7 and two thirds innings of the nightcap before giving way to Luis Arroyo. Eli Grba and Ned Garver were the losers. Former Yankee utility outfielder Ken Hunt hit two doubles, a triple and a homer for the Angels, who lost the services of third baseman Eddie Yost with a hairline fracture of the middle finger.
