## Jackie Has New Hair Style For Tonight's State Dinner

PARIS (AP) — A leading French hairdresser gave Jacqueline Kennedy what he called a "Gothic madonna" look Wednesday night, clipping more than an inch from her locks and pinning a tambourine-shaped wigpiece and a dazzling diamond on the back of her head.

For tonight's state dinner in the fabulous Hall of Mirrors at the Palace of Versailles, the hairdresser, Alexandre, said he would style the U.S. First Lady's coiffure in keeping with the scene, a style of the period of Louis XIV.

Four diamond flame clips will give her a "fairy-like air," Alexander said.

Mrs. Kennedy changed her wardrobe plans and appeared Wednesday night in the pink and white straw lace gown she had originally intended to wear to Versailles.

Fashion experts immediately speculated that she had some new unpublished gown she plans to show off tonight.

French newspapers — except the Communist L'Humanite — had nothing but praise for the visiting First Lady. They said she had been adopted by Paris, looked like a Parisian and had a Parisian air.

One paper noted with some surprise that she was not the sophisticated sure-of-herself personality that had been expected.

L'Humanite made only brief mention of the visiting President's wife.

French officials after the dinner Wednesday night said that no guest of honor at the Elysee Palace had ever made the sensation Mrs. Kennedy did.

## Oregon Accidents Claim Two Lives

Widely separated Oregon accidents claimed two lives Wednesday night.

Charles L. Houston, 26, Salem, was injured fatally when the car in which he was riding left North River Road and crashed into a power pole near Waconda, 14 miles north of Salem. He died on his way to a hospital.

Suffering various injuries were four other Salem residents: the driver, Pat Wilson, 25; Donna Zetwick, 28; Patricia Pulliam, 20; and Patricia Cantrell, 24.

In eastern Oregon a car left Mt. Glen Road some two miles north of La Grande, crashed into a ditch and burned.

The lone occupant was killed outright. He was identified by state police as Roy John Pedersen, 25, Portland.

The accidents increased the state's highway death toll for the year to 180 in the Associated Press tabulation. Thirty-seven were killed in May.

## Fined For Drunkenness

Jake Nicholas, 34, Oakland, has been fined \$55 and sentenced to serve five days in the Douglas County jail after he pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk on a public highway.

## Police Net Fishermen For Exceeding Limits

The Eugene Register-Guard's outdoor and sports writer will appear in Douglas County District Court June 5 to face a charge of exceeding the limit of trout allowed.

He was arrested at Diamond Lake with another fishermen, Kenneth Lillard Haynes, and both were charged. Together they had 32 trout. The limit is 10 per person.

As the first week of fishing at the lake ended, state police have also arrested two for operating motor boats at speeds in excess of the legal 10 miles per hour and one for not having a life preserver in the boat.

# Mark Signs Daylight Savings Time Referendum Measure

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Hatfield signed into law Wednesday afternoon 28 more bills passed by the Legislature, leaving only 12 on which to act.

Bills made law Wednesday include legislation to ban future utility duplication in Oregon, refer daylight saving time to the voters and create community mental health clinics.

Hatfield also signed a bill that would permit the state to hold elections for employees of firms in intra-state commerce to decide if the employees want a union to represent them.

A bill that permits police to give blood tests to suspected drunken drivers with oral rather than just written consent was approved.

Another signed bill would permit suburban farm property to be taxed as farm property rather than as its highest and best use as long as it remains zoned as farm property.

The governor also signed a controversial bill to ban the export of logs taken from state lands.

Lumbermen sponsored this law which is aimed at requiring that Oregon grown logs be processed in the state.

Hatfield signed the bill for mental health clinics although it gave authority over the clinics to the state Board of Control.

The governor had proposed the clinics as part of a state mental health division under the governor, but the Legislature turned this down.

Under the utility bill, the state public utility commissioner can assign territory in the state to a utility and thereby give it the exclusive right to serve the area.

The commissioner also can seek a cooperative end to present duplication in utility service. The law does not affect the Portland, Salem and Eugene - Springfield areas.

## Oklahoma Boy Champ Speller

WASHINGTON (AP) — John Capehart, 12, Tulsa, Okla., won the 1961 National Spelling Bee today.

The calm young son of a neurosurgeon outspelled Mary Lukes of Oxnard, Calif., in the 25th round for his victory over more than five million other youngsters who started in regional competition.

John's triumph was set up by correctly spelling "distichous," which means arranged in two vertical rows, after Mary had misspelled it "distichous."

He then clinched the championship by spelling "smaragdine," as his extra required word.

He did not even pause for the pronouncer to define the word, which means of or pertaining to emeralds.

The field, which started out at 73 Wednesday, was cut to 17-12 girls and 5 boys—in those rounds.

Then today's first round of blackbusters trimmed the list to 9. Eight finalists fell in the first round of the second day of competition.

The contest is sponsored by Scripps-Howard newspapers in 18 cities and 54 other newspapers and radio and television stations.
