Picturesque Fishing Hole Drawing Fishermen Host; Vacationers Due

Diamond Lake, the gem of the Cascades, is booming again. The fishing season started last weekend, in good weather, with a tremendous turnout of 3,000 people, and the jewel-like lake in the shadows of towering Mt. Thielsen (9,182 feet) and Mt. Bailey (8,360 feet) was dotted by 494 boats the first day.

The fishermen, friends and families crowded into the lodge, 129 trailer houses and a host of tents. The result was a mighty busy lake in the picturesque setting, and most fishermen would agree it was a successful venture despite the numbers.

Game Department men estimated each fisherman averaged four

fish, ranging in sizes from 12 to 21 inches.

This run on the lake was just the harbinger of a summer-long busy spell. And personnel at the lake are ready for them.

For lodging, the attractive Diamond Lake Lodge, complete with 60 employees, has 62 cabins and 10 rooms, as well as a restaurant, 149 boat rentals, two stores and two gasoline stations.

The land for the lodge was leased by the U. S. Forest Service to the Diamond Lake Improvement Co. The two principal stockholders, John Koch and Bill Edes, manage all holdings and facilities of the company.

\$117,000 Total Winnings For Foyt

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Young A.J. Foyt of Houston, Tex., picked up an extra \$6,575 today—a personal gift from owner Tony Hulman of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway that rounded out the total purse for Tuesday's 500-mile race at an even \$400,000.

The total purse was a record, and so was Foyt's winner's share, which was \$117,975 when Hulman announced his gift at the victory dinner Wednesday night.

The first place winnings topped by \$7,975 the money won last year by Jim Rathmann. The total purse was \$30,850 more than the \$269,150 paid out in 1960.

Eddie Sachs of Center Valley, Pa., won \$53,400 for second place. Rathmann, who won \$110,000 last year, took \$5,270 for 30th place.

Bob Christie of Grants Pass, Ore., got \$4,850 as his share of the purse in the Indianapolis 500-mile race Tuesday.

Len Sutton, Portland, got \$4,650. Both of the Oregon drivers were forced out of the race by engine trouble before completing the 500.

Trout Egg Take Good In Diamond Lake Waters

There is little doubt that the rainbow trout egg take now in progress at Diamond Lake will be one of the best. Jerry Bauer, game commission fishery biologist, reports that the first spawn was taken on May 10 and during the next nine days more than 3,600,000 eggs were placed in the hatchery trays at the Diamond Lake hatchery.

According to the last report, more than 7 million eggs have been taken and it appears the egg take will exceed more than 10 million before spawning is complete.

According to the report, the average size of Diamond Lake adult fish is nearly two inches shorter than last year. The main size group of spawners is running in the 17 to 19-inch group which is almost identical in size to the fish spawned in 1959. The size range is greater than a last year with a number of spawning fish exceeding the 24-inch mark. Last year the bulk of spawners ranged from 19 to 21 inches, with about 3 per cent reaching the 21-inch mark.

Danny Thomas Eyes White Sox

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Is Danny Thomas, the singer-comedian, a prospective owner of the Chicago White Sox?

Public statements on the question differ.

Thomas announced Wednesday night that he and a group of associates had acquired an option to buy controlling interest in the American League club from Bill Veeck.

But Veeck, in Chicago, said he had no knowledge of any option. A denial was issued also by A.C. Allyn Jr., a director-stockholder of the Sox who said flatly, "No option was signed."

Allyn told a Chicago newsman: "I should know if one had been signed and so should Veeck."

Thomas, advised of these reactions to his announcement, indicated strongly that he wasn't kidding.
