

Doctor Says Family Held Captive By Plotters Of Trujillo's Slaying

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (AP) — A young doctor said four of those who plotted dictator Rafael Trujillo's assassination held him and his family hostage for four days until hunger drove them out of hiding.

Dr. Robert Reid Cabral said his home was commandeered by the four fugitives shortly after Trujillo was gunned down last Tuesday night.

Reid Cabral said he, his pregnant wife and their infant son were held hostages until Sunday. The family's ordeal ended when the fugitives, desperate for food

and cigarettes, came out of hiding. Within two hours, two of the four had met death in a gun battle with police. The two others surrendered to authorities.

Leader of the group and alleged mastermind of the assassination was retired Gen. Juan Tomas Diaz, 52.

Reid Cabral told this story: After the Trujillo slaying, Diaz and his accomplices went to the office of another physician, Dr. Marcelino Velez, to get treatment for a bullet wound.

The men threatened Velez unless he found them a hiding place

B. Goldfine Could Shorten Length Of Term In Prison

BOSTON (AP)—Upon Bernard Goldfine's willingness to make full disclosure of financial manipulations exceeding \$600,000 depends the length of his stay behind bars, federal sources said today.

The 37-year-old industrialist, beginning a jail sentence of a year and a day for evasion of nearly \$800,000 in federal income taxes, could win freedom in four months, these sources said, or might be imprisoned 2½ years.

U.S. Dist. Judge George C. Sweeney sentencing Goldfine Monday, attached a condition to the defendant's five-year probation—that Goldfine give the attorney general all information of what ever character on funds taken from Strathmore Woolen Co. and other Goldfine holdings through cash withdrawals or checks written to cash.

Such withdrawals the judge said, total something in excess of \$900,000 and it is the intent of the court to compel disclosure of where this money is and where it went.

Reports issued from the federal building that a grand jury would be called to hear Goldfine if the defendant decided to comply with the disclosure requirement.

Goldfine began his sentence at the federal correctional institution at Danbury, Conn., late Monday. He had been a prisoner there before, when he served a 90-day sentence last year for contempt of court.

Goldfine, born in Russia, made a fortune in textiles and real estate and spent freely on gifts for influential men. A congressional committee threw a spotlight in 1958 on his lavish gifts and hospitality for government officials.

Out of that came the resignation of former Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire as White House assistant to President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Adams admitted Goldfine had paid some of his hotel bills and given him an expensive vicuna coat.

He denied any wrongdoing, despite testimony that he had telephoned the Securities and Exchange Commission for reports on proceedings against Goldfine.

Goldfine's blonde secretary, Mildred Papernan, 43, was placed on probation for three years for evasion of corporate income taxes as an officer of the Strathmore company. She was given an indeterminate suspended sentence.

Both Goldfine and his secretary were ordered to pay the evaded taxes plus penalties and interest.

Lutherans Accept New Congregations

TACOMA (AP) — Twenty congregations and seven new pastors were welcomed into the North Pacific district of the American Lutheran church at Tuesday's sessions at Pacific Lutheran University. The four-day convocation has attracted 500 pastors and delegates from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Alaska.

Thirteen Idaho congregations came into the district as of Tuesday in a realignment of the district.

They are located in Craigmont, Deary, Genesee, Gifford, Juliaetta, Kamiah, Kendrick, Lewiston, Lewiston Orchards, Nez Perce, Orofino and Polatch. Formerly they were in the Rocky Mountain district of the ALC.

New congregations accepted into membership were Our Savior's, Salem, Ore.; Northlake, Kenmore; Church of the Master, Pasco; Ascension, Kennewick; Faith, Elma; Holy Cross, Bellevue and Our Savior's, Issaquah.

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Five Eugene Young People Arraigned In Burglary Try

Five Eugene young people are being held in the Douglas County jail under bail of \$1,500 on charges of attempted burglary. On arraignment in the District Court of Gerald F. Hayes Monday, each asked to see an attorney and their cases were continued until 1:30 p.m. today.

They are David Allen Newman, Connie Lee Newman and Shirley Jean Courtney, all 19, Kenneth Lee Knight, 20, and Richard Earl Trantham, 18.

They are accused of the attempted burglary of Model Market No. 2, on Garden Valley Road at NW Curry Rd. early Sunday morning. The complaint charges that they attempted to gain entry to the market by cutting glass in the window, but were intercepted by the surprise of the burglary alarm.

Their car was seen leaving the scene at 3:40 a.m., and they were arrested by Lane County State Police.

Charles Damon Frach, 31, of 2897 W. Harvard, who asked for a preliminary hearing for Monday, had his case continued. He is being held in \$1,000 bail on a charge of check forgery.

Harry Squire, 41, of 765 SE Sheridan, arrested by City Police on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, asked to see an attorney when he appeared in court. His case was continued. He is accused of passing a worthless check for \$30 at Howard's Men's Wear for shoes and cash on June 2.

Linda To Reign Over Rose Fete

PORTLAND (AP) — The daughter of a former princess is the queen of the Portland Rose Festival.

A secret panel of judges Monday night chose Linda Ann Fuqua, 17, of Cleveland High School, to rule over the civic celebration. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Fuqua. Her mother, who was Agnes Nan Graham, was a princess in the 1929 court.

It was the first time in the history of the festival that there has been a second generation of royalty.

Miss Fuqua, who pronounces her name Few-Quay, stands 5 feet 8½ inches tall—the tallest of the candidates. She has brown hair and green eyes.

Her selection from among 10 other candidates was the highlight of a program at the Memorial Coliseum Monday night. More than 12,000 spectators jammed the huge arena.

Each candidate gave a two-minute talk. She was judged 40 per cent on appearance, 40 per cent on poise and personality, and 20 per cent on speaking ability.

All the queen candidates wore lilac-colored dresses of silk or tulle.

Miss Fuqua was overcome by emotion when the selection was announced. She wept and was not able to talk to reporters.

She and her court of 10 princesses will preside at all official festival functions for the rest of the week.

Oregon Senator Picks Successor

SALEM (AP) — State Sen. Melvin Goode, R-Albany, is the first legislator to name the men who would succeed him if he dies in an enemy attack.

The 1961 Legislature passed a continuity of government law which says that legislators and other state and local officials should each name three possible successors. They have until Sept. 8 to name them.

Goode named three Albany men. They are Walter Kropp, former state Rep. Jess W. Savage and Floyd M. Hopeman, in that order.

The line of succession to governor is the president of the Senate, speaker of the House, secretary of state and state treasurer, in that order. If all of them are killed, the senior surviving circuit judge would be governor.

Jackie's Handshake Startles Britishers

LONDON (AP)—Mrs. John F. Kennedy used an American-style handshake to greet Elizabeth II instead of the curtsy the queen ordinarily makes.

"Protocol doesn't call for a curtsy from the wife of a chief of state and government," was the explanation of Miss Pamela Turner, Mrs. Kennedy's press secretary.

Even so, the warm handshake in lieu of curtsy apparently startled some of the tradition-steeped guests at the dinner party given the Kennedys at Buckingham palace.

Saturn Launch Site Completed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Construction has been completed on the launching site from which early Saturn space vehicles will be fired.

The super rocket, which will generate 1½ million pounds of thrust on liftoff, is America's best hope of overtaking the Soviet lead in the space race.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration dedicated the \$11-million facility Monday, accepting it from the Army Corps of Engineers in a brief ceremony.

Engineers supervised the two-year building program for the massive 45-acre complex, whose centerpiece is a service tower which is as tall as a 30-story building.

Scientists and technicians now will prepare the ground support and launch control equipment for the first experimental Saturn firing, set for next fall.

Dr. Kurt Debus, head of NASA's launch operations directorate, called the complex "the first launch point for the world's greatest known rocket."

"Saturn," he said, "will be the workhorse booster for many existing space experiments planned in the next decade."

"The main application of the Saturn launch vehicle will be man into space. Not too many years hence, three astronauts will be blazing toward an orbit about the moon atop the mighty Saturn."

The early Saturn C1 vehicle will be fired from this launch pad. A second stage will be added later, giving the rocket capability of placing 10-ton payloads into earth orbit.

A second Saturn launch complex will be built here to handle the advanced C2 vehicle, which will have considerably more power and twice the payload capability.

This nation's present largest space booster is the Atlas, which has 360,000 pounds of thrust. Estimated thrust of the Soviet space rockets ranges from 800,000 to one million pounds.

Cherry Fruit Flies Begin To Emerge

Entomologists at Oregon State College reported cherry fruit flies began to emerge last Friday, according to J. Roland Parker, county extension agent. Control sprays or dust applications should be made immediately to destroy emerging flies before eggs are laid in the fruit, states Parker.

Several insecticides are effective in control of the cherry fruit fly and convenience of application is often more important than the kind of insecticide used. Spraying and dusting equipment available should determine the kind of spray or dust applied. Suggested insecticides for cherry fruit fly are as follows:

Perthane, one quart emulsifiable concentrate, containing four pounds actual Perthane per gallon, in 100 gallons of water. Apply as a spray, and may be applied within two days of harvest. Especially recommended for cherries grown for home use and fresh market.

Malathion, two pounds of 50 per cent wettable powder per 100 gallons of water. Apply as a spray, but not closer than one day before harvest.

Commercial cherry growers producing fruit for processing often find dust form of insecticides desirable. If, so lead arsenate, 15 per cent, 50 pounds per acre but not closer than seven days before harvest; or Methoxychlor, 5 per cent dust, 50 pounds per acre but not closer than seven days before harvest. Where a dust application closer to harvest than seven days, Malathion 5 per cent dust may be applied, but not closer than three days before harvest.

Spray and dust applications to be effective should be applied every 10 days up to harvest time.

Three Timber Sales Held On Umpqua Forest Tracts

Three sales were conducted by the Umpqua National Forest on the Bohemia Ranger District Monday.

The first sale involved timber 32 miles southeast of Cottage Grove and 173 acres were concerned. The total volume was 2,300,000 board feet, with a total appraised price of \$68,335.

Bohemia Top Bidder

The total included two million board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$32.49 per thousand, and 300,000 board feet of Western hemlock and other species appraised at \$11.15 per thousand.

The second sale was 33 miles southeast of Cottage Grove on 20 acres, and involved 1,700,000 board feet appraised at \$37.215. It included 1,200,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$28.29 per thousand board feet, and 500,000 board feet of Western hemlock and other species appraised at \$6.75 per thousand. The high bidder was C&H R. Higginbotham Logging of Cottage Grove with a total bid of \$49,935. The concern bid \$38.80 per thousand on the Douglas fir and pine and the appraised price on the other species group. Other bidders included J&W Logging Co. and Bohemia Lumber Co.

Kebelbeck High

The last sale included timber 30 miles southeast of Cottage Grove on 610 acres. The total volume was 1,800,000 board feet, with a total appraised price of \$37,655. It included 1,300,000 board feet appraised at \$27.20 per thousand and 500,000 board feet of Western hemlock and other species appraised at \$7.65 per thousand.

The high bidder was Kebelbeck Logging Co. of Cottage Grove with a total bid of \$37,670. The concern bid the appraised price on Douglas fir, and \$7.70 on Western hemlock and other species. The other bidder was Bohemia Lumber Co., Inc.

Pentagon Threat Warned By Army

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Army spokesman says the Soviet Union has the trained operatives, gadgets and the means to strike the Pentagon's 30,000 employees in a secret attack.

The Army also warned that the Soviets are so far ahead in both offensive and defensive chemical and biological warfare that it would take the U.S. at least five years to catch up.

In recent testimony before the House Appropriations Committee, censored before release today, Chemical Corps Intelligence Officer W. E. Black said that the Soviets could start a general war using chemical weapons and sustain it along a major front.

He said that the Soviets were equally proficient in covert operations, citing the possibility of erupting a small vessel of highly infectious material into the ventilating system of a building such as the Pentagon.

Li Gen. Arthur Trudeau, Army research chief, said that about one-sixth of the huge Soviet military stockpile consists of chemical warfare weapons.

The Army's chemical chief, Maj. Gen. Marshall Stubbs, testified that all intelligence points with certainty to the fact that the Soviets and their allies are ahead of the United States and its friends in both the use and the defense against chemicals and germs.

The censors pruned out most of what the general said was required to catch up with the Communists.
