

John Davenport Is Named President Of Forest Group

John Davenport, Roseburg Lumber Co. forester, has been elected new president of the Umpqua Chapter of the Society of American Foresters.

He had been serving in the post in an acting capacity to fill out the previous term, which had been vacated early when the previous president resigned.

Other new officers are Donald Smith, Forest Service ranger at Steamboat, vice president; Richard Hanlin, U. S. Plywood forester, treasurer; and Alan Thomson, Bureau of Land Management, delegate at large.

The election was held at the annual ladies' night meeting at the Roseburg Country Club.

Speaker at the meeting was John Bennett of Portland, representative of the Associated Forest Products Industries. In a speech entitled "Foresters Must Speak Up," he urged greater public relations efforts be made by foresters.

McDonald Claims Double Jeopardy

SALEM (AP) — Levi S. McDonald, Portland stereotyper who was convicted twice for dynamiting trucks used to haul papers of the strikebound Oregonian and Oregon Journal, claims he was put in double jeopardy.

His attorney, William B. Murray, asked the Supreme Court Monday to toss out the second conviction on grounds that McDonald was tried twice for the same offense.

Clackamas County Dist. Atty. William E. Schumacher, and his deputy, Donald B. Bowerman, argued that they were two separate offenses.

McDonald got 10 years for each offense.

He was convicted in Multnomah County for engineering the dynamiting of four trucks in Portland. The Supreme Court upheld that conviction May 10.

Then, in Clackamas County Circuit Court, McDonald got another 10 years for dynamiting six trucks in Oregon City. Both offenses occurred the night of Jan. 31, 1960.

McDonald is accused of hiring men to do both jobs.

May Was Best Month For Automobile Sales

DETROIT (AP)—The nation's auto dealers sold more new cars in May than in any previous month this year. The daily selling rate also was the highest of 1961.

The five automakers reported Monday that May sales totaled 537,825 cars with a daily sales rate of 20,686.

Last month's upturn failed to match the pace of May 1960 when sales totaled 566,650 and the daily rate was 22,665.

Sales had been lagging nearly 100,000 units per month below 1960, but the gap was cut to less than 30,000 in May.

Jackie Planning Trip To Greece

LONDON (AP) — Jacqueline Kennedy stayed in bed until nearly noon today, resting up from a hectic round of public appearances with her husband.

In response to questions about Mrs. Kennedy's plans for what remained of the day, a secretary said: "I really don't know what she is going to do. She might get an impulse to do something."

As the President flew home, the First Lady stayed behind at the home of her sister, Princess Lee Radziwill.

The secretary said that Mrs. Kennedy plans to leave sometime Wednesday for Rome en route to Athens but that the departure time was still not fixed.

In Greece she plans some rest and sightseeing, and a short cruise to the islands in the Aegean.

America's beautiful young First Lady has captivated London just as she did Paris and Vienna.

In her last official appearance at Buckingham Palace, Monday night she displayed still another new hairdo that drew a chorus of "oohs" and "ahhs" from spectators outside. Her black hair was lifted high in front, nestled in slight waves across her ears and tucked into a swept-up bun enhanced with diamond clips and diamond-drop earrings.

Queen Elizabeth II gave what was described as a "good old English dinner" for the President and his wife under soft lighting in the palace's state dining room.

Mrs. Kennedy wore an American-made sleeveless gown of pale blue silk with a V-neck at the back, bow at the waist and loosely gathered bell skirt.

The queen wore a full-length gown of larkspur-blue silk tulle with a fitted bodice and full skirt.

Kennedy was the first U. S. President to dine at the palace since Woodrow Wilson in 1918.

Jewish Boy Forced To Extract Gold Teeth Of Gassed Victims

JERUSALEM (AP) — A young Jew told the Eichmann trial court today that at 13 he was forced to extract the gold teeth from bodies of gassed victims in the Chelmo concentration camp.

Simon Srebnik, a Polish-born mechanic now in Israel, testified he saw an average of 1,200 Jews paraded to their deaths daily over a period of nine months.

The routine was always the same, he said. The Jews were given towels and soap and 80 to 100 at a time were herded into a bus van and driven away.

"The doors were hermetically sealed," he said. "When the van moved on, the gas would enter it and in this way they all were killed."

Srebnik's job was to pull gold out of the teeth of the bodies on their arrival at the crematorium.

"I do not sleep well at night. Those horrid pictures are still haunting me," the witness said. Attorney General Gideon Hausner said Adolf Eichmann — on tri-

al as director of the Nazi extermination of six million Jews — was responsible for the Jews being sent to such death camps and "therefore is responsible for what happened to them there."

Srebnik said all the Jews forced into the operational work of the death camp were chained night and day.

In 1945, just before the Russians overran that area of Poland, the SS liquidated the camp. The "staff" of 78 Jews was ordered shot.

Srebnik said his bullet hit him in the back of the neck and came out his mouth. The SS executioner, checking bodies and where necessary finishing the job with his pistol, apparently was convinced the boy was dead. But Srebnik said he managed to crawl away and found refuge with a Polish gentile who hid him in a stable.

Persistence Pays Off For College Student

SEATTLE (AP) — It took Robie Rushton 10 years to get his bachelor of arts degree at the University of Washington — and he says he isn't through yet.

Earning his way and supporting a family, Rushton attended school when he could. He worked in an airplane plant, sold cutlery, ran a fence company.

He thinks it may take only three more years to get a master's degree.

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Skin Diver Drowned At Fern Ridge Lake

EUGENE (AP) — A 21-year-old skin diver drowned Monday at Fern Ridge Lake, near here.

The victim was Harry A. Diehl, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur L. Diehl, of rural Eugene.

He and Kenneth Brown, Dexter, were diving in the lake for a bull-tail which had been lost in a boating accident some time ago.

They were not able to find it and were returning to shore when Diehl suddenly began thrashing about in panic.

Brown said he was not able to rescue his diving companion. At the time of the accident, neither of the divers was using scuba equipment. They were using snorkels.

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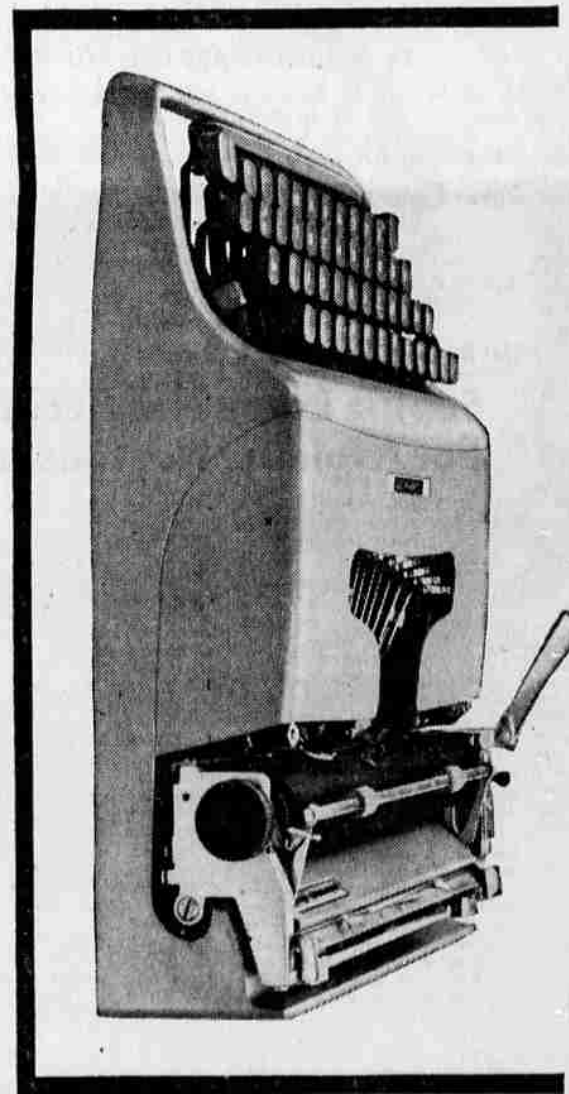
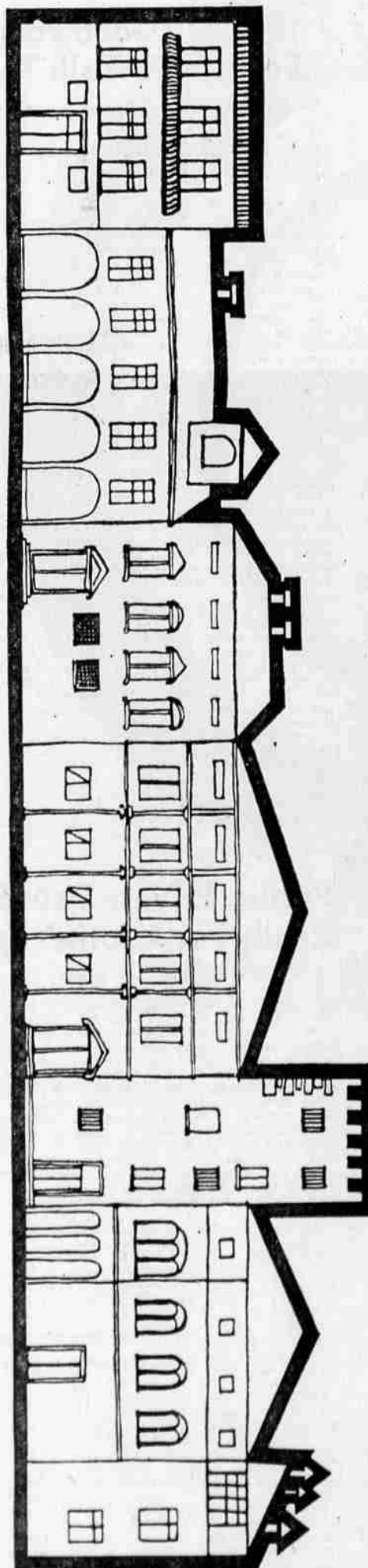
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
