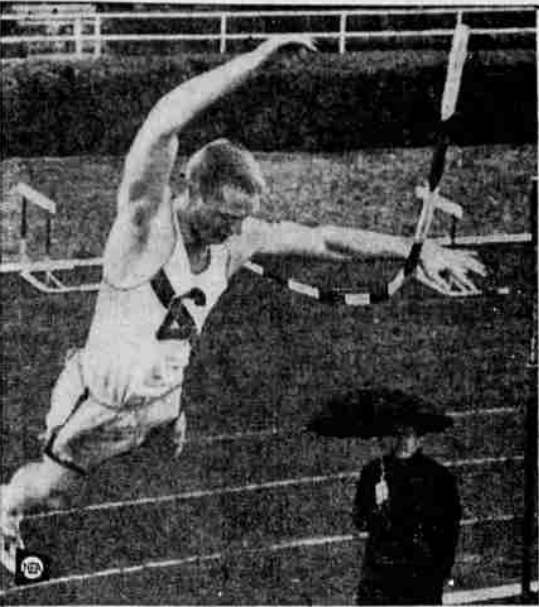

## Indecision Might Cause A Withdrawal Of Sox Bid

CHICAGO (AP)—The indecision to either accept or reject a bid of \$4.8 million for controlling interest in the Chicago White Sox could result in a withdrawal of the offer today.

Sox President Bill Veeck announced Monday that he, Hank Greenberg and A.C. Allyn Jr., had not reached a decision on the offer made by Chicago Atty. Bernard Epton, spokesman for a syndicate which also includes entertainer Danny Thomas.

Epton, obviously perturbed by the delay, scheduled a news conference today and said if the Veeck group didn't reach a decision in the "immediate future" he would recommend to the syndicate that the offer be withdrawn.

Vice President Greenberg, who has been in charge of Sox affairs because of Veeck's ill health, says there can be no sale when there is no money.

"Epton keeps talking about the millions he has behind him," said

Greenberg, "but he never came up with enough cash to warrant our giving him an option."

Greenberg was reminded that Veeck only put up \$100 for an option from Mrs. Dorothy Comiskey Rigney which enabled him to purchase the 54 per cent stock now held by the group.

Chuck Comiskey owns the other 46 per cent of the club but his stock is not for sale. Comiskey has been fighting to gain control of the club since before his sister sold her stock to Veeck.

## 2 Southern Oregon Netmen Vie In NAIA

Ashland — John Root and Ron Singler, Southern Oregon college's 1961 Oregon Collegiate Conference tennis champions, have been selected to District 2 representatives to the NAIA tennis finals which begin Wednesday in Kansas City, Missouri.

The two Red Raider net aces, both juniors from Medford, left Tuesday by plane for the four-day annual classic.

Root, who won the recent Oregon Collegiate Conference single championship, and Singler, who teamed with Root to nab the OCC doubles crown, were declared representatives from this area by the District committee last weekend after the Northwest Conference candidates withdrew from the recently scheduled NAIA District 2 finals.

Root had a 4-8 win-loss record in singles action this season prior to the OCC matches. Singler boasted a 7-5 season record. They are the first SOC tennis players in the National finals, according to Coach Dr. Alex Petersen.

"It's a great honor to have our school represented at the NAIA finals," commented Dr. Petersen. "They've certainly worked hard enough to deserve the honor."

## Carry Back Suffers Bad Ankle Infection

OCEANPORT, N.J. (AP) — Carry Back, the 3-year-old colt who missed the Triple Crown when he lost the Belmont Stakes but still is the favorite of the two buck fans, was being treated today for an infection of the left front ankle. When he returns to racing is questionable.

Dr. William O. Reed, veterinarian from Belmont Park, gave Carry Back a close inspection Monday and confirmed that X-rays showed no fracture of the ankle bone.

The veterinarian had been summoned by Jack Price, trainer of the Kentucky Derby-Preakness winner, after the colt arrived by van Sunday from New York.

Asked how long Carry Back might be out of training, Reed replied:

"That depends on how he responds to treatment."

# Pirates Take 5-2 Win From Dodgers; Cincinnati Leads NL League Again

A year ago Vern Law was a 20-game winner and the Pittsburgh Pirates were on top. Now it's news when the big right-hander wins one and the Pirates are fourth.

It's been as simple as that to spotlight the Bucs' slump in the National League race, what with Law losing four of his first five and Bob Friend, an 18-game winner last season, losing seven in a row as a starter.

It also could be as simple as a return to form by the two aces for the champs to get back on top. For with Law winning his first in more than a month, the fourth-place Pirates moved within 2½ games of first place and knocked Los Angeles out of the lead with a 5-2 victory over the Dodgers Monday night.

Cincinnati jumped back on top, by a half game, by beating Milwaukee 5-3. Last-place Philadelphia dropped San Francisco to third with a 3-2 decision over the Giants. St. Louis defeated the Chicago Cubs 10-8.

Law, bothered by a sore shoulder and home runs, avoided both troubles at Los Angeles. He gave up eight hits and blew a 2-0 lead, but then singled home the tie-breaker in the sixth against losing reliever Ron Perranoski (3-1) before giving way to a pinch-hitter. Face then saved it, with two-innings of one-hit, shutout relief. Bill Mazeroski and Smoky Burgess homered for the Pirates, who collected 13 hits.

**Beat Burdette**  
The Reds came from behind and beat Lew Burdette (4-5) with a three-run eighth inning on homers by Frank Robinson and Jerry Lynch. Robinson singled and Lynch doubled as they scored Cincinnati's first two in the second inning on a single by Gordie Coleman after the Braves had counted three in the first on home runs by Ed Mathews and Joe Adcock. ## Joey Jay Named Player For May

CINCINNATI (AP) — Joey Jay, king of May, found June out of tune for a few moments Monday night.

The Cincinnati Reds pitcher won six games without a defeat last month, and Monday was named the National League's player of the month for May.

Came his first June start Monday and in the first inning, his old Milwaukee teammates Ed Mathews and Joe Adcock slammed Jay's offerings for home runs among four hits that got the Braves off to a 3-0 lead.

But Joey got back in gear then and yielded just one hit and no runs over the next six innings. The Reds eventually won 5-3 but Jay left for a pinch hitter in the seventh with his side still trailing.

In May, he worked 50 innings and allowed 32 hits while walking 14. His earned run average was 2.70 and he struck out 38 batters.

## Fracture Shelves Jockey

SEATTLE (AP) — A fractured ankle has shelved jockey Bud Giancomelli at Longacres Race Track for six weeks—but the mental pain is worse than the physical.

Giancomelli was in the scramble for riding honors when his mount fell in the second race Sunday. Other jockeys had to substitute for him on his remaining mounts.

Four of them won. One was John Walsh on Mercy Me, victor in the \$5,000-added Fashion Handicap.

Another was Enrique DeAlba. Enrique DeAlba now is the leading rider at Longacres with 14 victories. Giancomelli is second with nine.

on one hit over the last six. Jim Brosnan (2-1) then won it in relief, with help from Bill Henry in the ninth.

A six-run seventh inning, triggered by Carl Sawatski's two-run homer and capped by Bill White's grand slam, brought the Cardinals from behind. Maury McDermott,

gaining his first NL decision, was the winner in relief. Ed Bouchee and Ernie Banks homered for the Cubs. The losing pitcher was reliever Joe Schafermoth (0-3).

Robin Roberts, who had lost his first seven decisions, beat the Giants with a six-hit job. Chuck Hiller hit a two-run homer for San

Francisco in the second inning, but then put the tying run on base with an error ahead of Pancho Herrera's winning three-run homer in the third. Mike McCormick (5-5) was the loser, dropping his third in a row.

The Cleveland Indians, barred from high stake card games by Manager Jimmy Dykes, are playing a hot hand at the moment in the American League race, moving within one game of first place with a seven-game winning streak.

Dykes ruled out the big pots to make sure the Tribe kept their minds on baseball, and the Indians have done just that. Out of the first division just one day this season, they've stacked the bullpen with aces and have come from seven games back by winning 19 of their last 23.

The three-man fireman brigade of right-handers Frank Funk and Barry Latman and lefty Bob Allen has a 13-3 record. With seven saves tacked on, those three have been in on 20 of Cleveland's 31 victories.

Latman, acquired in the Herb Score deal with the Chicago White Sox last year, nailed a 4-0 record and hung up the Indians' seventh in a row Monday night, breaking a 5-5 tie with a triple and blanking Washington in four innings of two-hit relief for a 7-5 victory over the Senators.

**Sox Club Tigers**  
That put the Indians even with front-running Detroit in the decisive "lost" column as the White

Sox knocked off the Tigers 8-0 behind the seven-hit pitching of Frank Baumann. Third-place New York drew within 4 games of the top with a 6-1 and 6-2 twin-night doubleheader sweep over the Minnesota Twins. The Los Angeles Angels dropped fourth-place Baltimore 3-0 on southpaw Ron Moeller's six-hitter.

Kansas City split a doubleheader at Boston, winning 18-6 after the Red Sox had won the opener 6-2.

The Indians, after blowing 3-0 and 5-3 leads behind starter Johnny Antonelli and Bobby Locke, finally made it with two unearned runs in the seventh at Washington against losing reliever John Gabler (2-2). Latman's two-out triple triggered the rally and gave the bullpen three victories and three saves in the Tribe's seven-game streak.

Cleveland collected 15 hits—including a 4-for-4 show by the three pitchers—with Jimmy Piersall cracking a triple and three singles and Johnny Romano extended his hit streak through 20 games with a double.

Baumann (4-4) gave the White Sox staff its first shutout and became the first lefty to go all the way against Detroit this season. He also had three hits and drove in three runs. Right-hander Phil Regan, a five-game winner for Detroit, lost his second in a row when the Sox scored twice in the second inning on two walks and singles by Jim Landis and Sherm Lollar.

**Yanks Set Records**  
The Yankees set AL home run records for 13 and 14 consecutive games while tagging the Twins with an 11-game losing string.

A three-run, pinch homer by Johnny Blanchard did it in the seventh inning of the opener, and Mickey Mantle then regained a tie for the AL lead with his 15th, a two-run shot, in the eighth. That made it 27 home runs in 13 games for New York, and Tony Kubek made it 28 for 14 in the nightcap with a two-run homer in the seventh that gave the Yankee shortstop a 14-game hitting streak.

Jim Coates (6-2) won his fifth in a row, first as a starter, with relief by Luis Arroyo in the opener. Rookie Roland Sheldon (2-2) then pitched his first complete game with a six-hitter in the second game, clinching it with his first major league hit, a two-run single, in the fifth. Don Lee and Chuck Stobbs, both 0-2, were the losers.

Ted Kluszewski hammered a two-run homer in the first inning for the Angels off Hec Brown (5-2), who had won four in a row. It was Klus's sixth hit off Baltimore pitching this season—all home runs. Moeller, an ex-Bird, struck out nine—fanning Brooks Robinson and Jim Gentile with the bases loaded in the fifth, and whiffing

Jerry Adair and pinch-hitter Dave Phillee with two on in the sixth. It was his first victory and complete game in the majors.

Mike Fornieles (2-3) gave up 19 hits but went all the way while making his first start in three seasons for Boston in the opener. Frank Malzone's single broke a 2-2 tie in the sixth off Ray Herbert (3-5). Joe Nuxhall (4-1) won the second game, with relief help from Bill Kunkel. Norm Siebern roached base eight times in a row for the A's in the twelfth, hitting a home run in a decisive five-run fifth in the second game against reliever Dave Hillman (2-2).

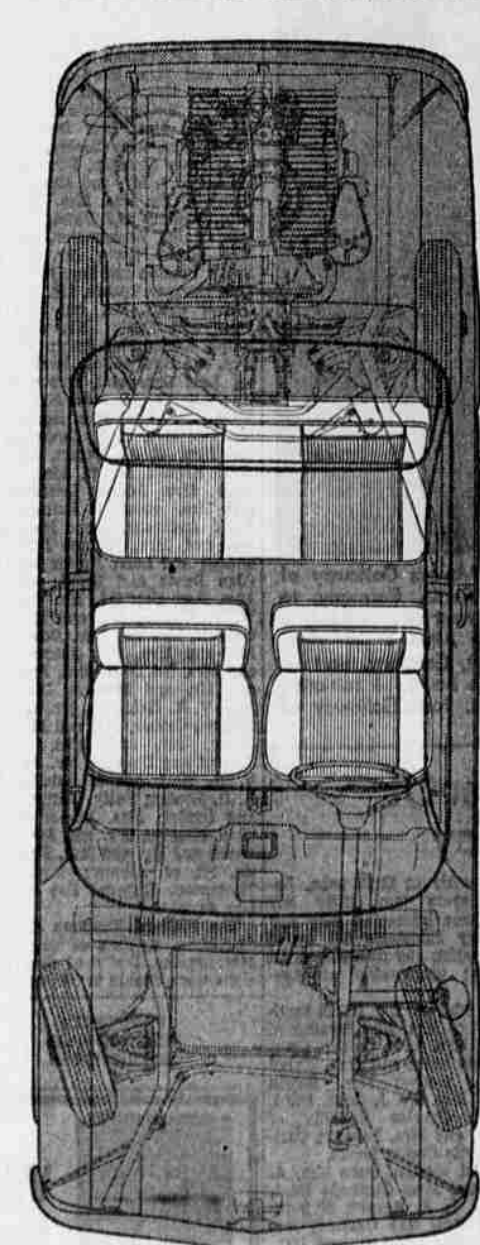
