

Khrushchev Says W. Berlin Is Bone In Russia's Throat

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy has informed congressional leaders that Premier Khrushchev raised his voice when he told him in Vienna that West Berlin is a bone that must come out of the Soviet throat.

The president also reported Khrushchev indicated he regards Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro as unstable — and not a Communist.

Kennedy briefed influential members of both parties at a 90-minute White House conference Tuesday before he told the nation in a television-radio broadcast a few hours later that the West is ready to maintain its rights in Berlin "at any risk."

The briefing, during which the President read from his translator's transcript of some of the conversations, was said to have disclosed that Khrushchev was vitally interested in only two subjects at this time — Berlin and a change in the secretariat direction of the United Nations.

So reported by responsible sources, these were some of the major topics discussed and the positions taken in the 12 hours of conversations between the two leaders.

Berlin — Khrushchev has not changed his position of more than two years' standing that he intends to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany. He fixed no date for this action. He told Kennedy that nobody but the United States still believes East and West Germany can be reunited.

The only time Khrushchev raised his voice in the whole period of discussion was when he talked about Berlin and used the bone in the throat phrase he has employed before. Kennedy said in his broadcast to the nation "there was no discourtesy, no loss of temper, no threats or ultimatums by either side" during the Vienna conference.

The Soviet premier offered again to give Soviet and East German guarantees of continued Allied access to West Berlin. He proposed that U.S., French, British and Soviet troops remain in the city, and suggested stationing U.N. troops there.

Practical, Working Rocket Belt Now Lets Man Fly With The Birds

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—A practical, working rocket belt, torn from the pages of science-fiction, has made a reality of mankind's age-old dream of flying with the birds.

A twist of a throttle, a turn of a lever, and man leaps from the ground, his own personal rocket belt strapped to his back. He hovers in the air, he flies over rivers, he flits up a hill that would leave him breathless to climb.

His support is a twin-nozzle thrust of hydrogen peroxide steam.

All this was revealed today by Bell Aerosystems Co., which developed the belt—called a Small Rocket Lift Device—for the Army Transportation Research Command.

Photos of a test engineer, Harold M. Graham, in personal flight with the man-rocket showed him easily leaping a fire truck, handily swirling up a hill, casually jumping a stream.

In 30 successful test flights this spring, Bell said, Graham achieved a speed of about 20 miles an hour. His longest horizontal flight was 360 feet. He did not try for any great altitude, but the belt carried him up a steep, 30-foot-high hill with ease.

Bell has held the Army development contract since last summer, but Wendell F. Moore, director of Bell's man-rocket research program, has been dabbling with the idea since 1954.

"The current device is strictly a feasibility model designed to prove that lightweight rocket power can lift a man and transport him over the ground in controlled flight," said Moore.

The rocket belt is powered by hydrogen peroxide. When forced into a gas generator where it meets a catalyst, it decomposes into steam. Discharged through two nozzles directed toward the ground, this steam provides the thrust.

The position of the nozzles, set out from the sides of the device, plus the low temperature of the

steam, eliminate the need for protective clothing for the operator. The propulsion system is mounted on a fiberglass corset moulded to fit the wearer's back and hips. It is secured in front by two quick-release safety belts.

Two control tubes extend forward on each side so the wearer can reach them easily. One tube carries the throttle by which the operator controls the rate of power. The other is for a control lever leading to jet defectors on the nozzles which control the direction of flight.

In this post, Gwaltney will play a major role in planning and coordinating activities for the five-day institute which is expected to draw qualified social workers from seven states and British Columbia.

The institute is scheduled at Seattle July 30 through Aug. 4. The theme of the institute is "Values in Conflict" with impact of values in conflict on the social worker and the person with health problems.

Attendance by invitation will be restricted to 80 from Alaska, British Columbia, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

81 Negroes, Whites Now Arrested On Peace Breach Counts In South

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Nine more "Freedom Riders" sit idle in Jackson jails today following unsuccessful attempts to desegregate terminal facilities at an airport and a bus station.

For 16 days segregation-defying Freedom Riders have converged on Mississippi's capital with no intention of letting up. And Jackson city police have promptly arrested 81 Negroes and whites on breach of peace charges.

Air Terminal Try

Wednesday's airport terminal integration attempt was the first here and adds to one similar attempt on the train terminal and numerous attempts at bus terminals.

The latest group of arrivals were three airborne riders from the St. Louis area Wednesday. They were arrested almost immediately after their arrival by Delta Airlines. All were Negroes.

Only hours earlier three whites and three Negroes were arrested following their arrival by bus from Nashville, Tenn., via Memphis.

The airborne integrationists were arrested after attempting to use dining and restroom facilities at Municipal Airport. The terminal waiting room isn't segregated, but the other facilities are.

Gwendolyn Jenkins, 21, of St. Louis, was arrested as she attempted to enter the white women's rest room, while Robert Jenkins, 27, also of St. Louis (no relation) was arrested when he sat down at a table in the for-whites-only restaurant. The third rider,

Ralph Washington, 25, of the Webster Grove community near St. Louis, was standing at the door of the white men's restroom when arrested.

First Claim Made
The first claim of open integration in Jackson was made Wednesday night by Charles Jones, dean of Campbell (Negro) College. He said seven Negro students Tuesday used whites-only seating and white drinking fountains at the city zoo.

In two separate statements Wednesday Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, indirectly rebuked the Freedom Riders.

Wilkins told newsmen in the afternoon that unconstitutional laws could not be overturned by going to jail.

At a NAACP meeting Wednesday night Wilkins spelled out differences with other Negro organizations.

Shock Troops Necessary
"We know that shock troops are necessary," he said. "We know that testing and challenging are necessary, but affirmative action by judicial, legislative and executive means is indispensable. This is still a nation of law."

Earlier in Chicago, the Rev. Richard Gleason, 24, white Baptist minister, denied published reports he intended to quit the Freedom Riders or that he said the movement was dominated by Communists and atheists.

The Rev. Mr. Gleason was arrested in Jackson last week. He was convicted on breach of peace charges and paid a fine of \$197. At that time he said he was through with Freedom Riders.

Yoncalla Council Seeks Added Water

Yoncalla City Council has voted to hire an engineer to aid the city in determining costs and possible methods of piping water from Adams Creek into the present city water system.

The council during its meeting Tuesday night discussed the probability of such action would involve piping water over a hill.

During the session, the council decided against selling any of its timber on Red Hill near the city watershed.

Mrs. George Edes, News-Review correspondent, said the council voted to buy 1,100 feet of 6-inch pipe and fittings to replace wooden water pipes on Charles St. in West Park.

The council also voted to have the city streets oiled this year on June 19-20. All bills were ordered paid. Mayor Felix Latham presided.

State Trooper's Wife Slays Infant Daughter

WEST MILFORD, N.J. (AP)—The wife of a state trooper killed her year-old daughter and then fired bullets into her son and herself Wednesday night with her husband's revolver.

Elsie Livingston, 27, wife of Trooper Alfred Livingston Jr., admitted the shootings. State Police Detective L. John Fitzsimmons said, but she gave no reason.

Mrs. Livingston and her son, Alfred III, 6, were in serious condition at Chilton Memorial Hospital in Pompton Plains. They both were shot twice in the chest. Killed instantly was Nancy Lou.

Dog Control Field Men Scan County This Week

Douglas County Dog Control Officer Bob Hall today announced dog control field men will be scanning the county this week for unlicensed dogs.

He said owners of dogs which are not licensed are subject to \$10 fines. He went on to say, "Our field men will have dog licenses with them for owner's of dogs to purchase. They are \$2 for males and \$3 for females. A penalty of \$2 will also be assessed since the deadline for licensing has passed."

Field men will also pick up all stray animals and animals not wanted by their owners.

Police Question Two On Possible Larceny

City police investigated a possible larceny from a dwelling in the neighborhood of the 800 block on W. Wharton Dr., Wednesday night.

Called shortly before 10 p.m., investigating officers discovered two young men held by residents. The two suspects were seen prowling around a trailer house.

The two were questioned and later released when nothing was found to have been taken from the property.

PORTLAND (AP) — Dr. Herbert Jensen of Iowa State University was back Wednesday before the state Board of Higher Education, which is looking for some one to succeed Dr. A. L. Strand as president of Oregon State College.

Chancellor John R. Richards said there was no negotiating at the meeting with Dr. Jensen — the second in four months.

The board will meet on the campus at Corvallis next week, and Dr. Richards said discussions probably will be held then with the selection committee.

He added that so far the committee has not expressed preference for any of the educators being considered.

Dr. Jensen is a botany professor and provost at Iowa State. He and Mrs. Jensen visited the campus Tuesday.

Jackie Boards Yacht

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Jacqueline Kennedy boarded the yacht North Wind today for a trip to Epidaurus, where she will visit an ancient Greek open air theater. The U.S. President's vacationing wife lunched aboard before the yacht departed on the sail to Epidaurus, which is on Peloponnesus.
