

Dale Cannon Is New Elementary Principal At Sutherlin School

In keeping with its policy of promotion within the district, the Sutherlin School Board has announced the appointment of Dale Cannon as principal of West Elementary School. Cannon will fill the post recently vacated by the appointment of Raymond A. Mullen as school superintendent, according to Barbara Liesinger, News-Review correspondent.

Cannon attended Portland State University, the University of Hawaii, University of Oregon and Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, where he earned a Bachelor degree in science and Masters degree in administration. He was a member there of the Men's Honorary, Art Fraternity and was student body president, and managed the Student Union on campus. He served three years with the Navy during the second World War.

Culver Instructor
Before coming to Sutherlin in 1958 as a sixth grade teacher Cannon taught for five years at Culver, Ore., serving there as teaching principal and Junior High School coach.

He is a life member of the OEA and past president of the Deschutes County OEA chapter. He also is

past president of the Sutherlin Teacher's Association and is a member of the National Education Association and the Oregon Principals' Association, and alumni

representative of Oregon College of Education. Cannon was born in Nebraska and received his elementary education in Wyoming before moving to Oregon. He is married and has three children.

No Records Kept On Jewish Victims Trial Court Told

JERUSALEM, Israel (AP)—A woman survivor of the Auschwitz death camp testified today at the Adolf Eichmann trial that persons gassed or shot were not recorded—or their files were destroyed—so that camp registry books showed only disease as a cause of death.

"According to the files, nobody was killed in Auschwitz," not one," said Raya Kagan, who worked in the camp as a clerk and now is an official in the Israeli foreign ministry.

The Lithuanian-born woman told the trial court she was sent to Auschwitz as a young girl from France, where she had been studying. She said in Auschwitz she was chosen "haphazardly" as a clerk because she could speak German. She said she and a few other Jewish women worked in the camp administration office which registered the deaths and the live prisoners of Auschwitz. Mrs. Kagan said there were forms even for punishment of inmates, listing how many whiplashes were given to a prisoner or how much time he spent in a tiny arrest cell in which he could only stand.

"We received certificates of death," she continued, "and in a short time it became clear to us that this was a camouflage. We had to record in the forms all sorts of diseases as cause of death such as pneumonia, general weakness, syphilis and so on."

She said the files also recorded "the number of gold teeth, artificial teeth, anything of value." Miss Kagan said she did not recall a single case of a Jew being fed from Auschwitz by the Nazis.

Pine Blister Rust Treatment Slated

Final preparations are under way for mass antibiotic treatment of 250,000 acres of white pine and sugar pine in southwestern Oregon threatened with a tree-killing fungus disease—white pine blister rust.

Forest Service "woods doctors," headed by Ben Howard of the Pacific Northwest regional headquarters (Region Six) in Portland, are conducting pilot scale tests on sugar pine in the Rogue River and Siskiyou National Forests to develop application procedures for treating the trees with a fungus-killing antibiotic, Acti-dione.

This new control for white pine blister rust, which is destroying the four-billion-dollar white pine timber resources in 28 states, was developed by Forest Service researchers in Region One, Spokane. This year more than 90,000 acres of white pine forests are being treated with Acti-dione in a ground and aerial spraying program which eventually will cover some 3,000,000 acres of white pine in northwestern Washington, Idaho, Montana and other states in Region One.

Results of the work with the antibiotic in Region One, where some 8,400,000 trees were sprayed by ground crews last year, show that Acti-dione not only restores diseased trees to normal health, it also imparts immunity to the disease for several years.

Tell-tale symptom of blister rust on white pine and sugar pine is a large canker on the trunk. When this canker girdles the tree, as it almost inevitably does, the tree dies. Virtually every crop tree is infected in some southwestern Oregon stands of sugar pine, according to Forest Service officials.

Hunt Method Used
Up to now, the only control program has been to hunt down and destroy all wild currant and gooseberry bushes, which serve as "alternate hosts" to blister rust. These bushes are essential to the production of the blister rust fungus spores.

Control by eradication of the currant and gooseberry bushes, known as ribes, is both physically and economically impossible in areas where white pine and sugar pine occur in scattered stands. The Acti-dione treatment will make it possible to protect pine against blister rust in such areas at a cost that can be afforded, according to Thomas W. Childs, disease control chief in the Pacific Northwest Forest Experiment Station at Portland.

Acti-dione is applied to the trees in a solution of stove oil. Work now under way in this area is to adapt application procedures developed in Region One to southwestern Oregon conditions.

Electric Machine Keeps Heart Going

PORTLAND (AP)—An electric machine that can massage the heart from outside the body, eliminating the former need for surgery before such a function, has been developed at the University of Oregon Medical School.

Doctors said the machine can keep a patient alive if applied after heart stoppage to allow emergency treatment of the condition that caused it.

It has been used on three such patients. In each case the condition proved fatal but the machine kept their hearts pulsing at the rate of 60 beats a minute long after natural heart action had ended.

The machine was perfected by Dr. Charles T. Dotter, a professor and chairman of the school's radiology department; Dr. Kurt H. Straube, radiology instructor; and Douglas C. Strain, president of Electro Scientific Industries, Portland.

In the process an electric motor pushes a cam-driven rubber plunger, which compresses the chest of the patient and squeezes the heart. The plunger's pressure causes the heart to jump.

Canyonville Sets Simmons Memorial

He is 32, married, with four children, and received his degree from the North Dakota State Teachers' college at Minot, N.D. He has had one year's experience at Meeteetse, Wyo., and is also a veteran of the U.S. army.

"I have every confidence Sutherlin schools will continue to function well and with an improved quality of education," Mullen stated this week.

A native Oregonian, Mullen was raised on a farm in Jackson County. He is married and the father of a son and daughter, both students at Sutherlin Junior High School.
