

# Economic Recovery Continues To Roll, And More Improvement Expected Later

NEW YORK (AP)—The economic recovery rolled on during last week and expectations of more rapid improvement later in the year mounted.

The gross national product (GNP)—total of all goods and services—may be setting a record in the current quarter ending June 30.

Walter W. Heller, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, said the GNP for the quarter might reach an annual rate of nearly \$50 billion. It was a little under \$50 billion in the previous quarter.

Heller said that by the final quarter the rate may be \$53 billion.

**New Orders Increase**  
The National Association of Purchasing Agents reported that new orders, production and employment kept on increasing in May.

Producers of machine tools, construction equipment and other manufacturing machinery equipment predicted a good gain in sales by the fourth quarter. This was despite indications that investment for new plants and equipment is not speeding up.

The National Retail Merchants Association surveyed its membership of 11,500 department, specialty and variety stores and found high optimism about prospects for the second half of the year. The majority of merchants look for a four per cent gain in sales and a five per cent increase in profits.

The First National City Bank of New York commented that the industrial performance in the last two months has "erased any lingering doubts that the economy is in a very encouraging rebound from recession lows." Dr. Marcus Nadler, economic consultant to the Hanover Bank of New York, said he expects a "moderate recovery" but that "no major boom is in the making."

**Anxiety Aroused**  
The momentum of recovery has aroused anxiety in the Kennedy administration that it will bring a revival of inflation.

Heller said direct price or wage control is not under consideration, barring a wartime situation.

Presidential assistant Walt Whitman Rostow asserted: "As we go into the next wage negotiations, the question is whether we will negotiate our way into inflation or whether we can exercise discipline without wage and price controls."

With labor contract negotiations nearing in the automobile industry, General Motors, Ford and Chrysler omitted the usual annual raises June 1 for 138,000 salaried employees not covered by union contracts.

Automobile production moved up during the week to an estimated 128,000 passenger cars. This was only 8.7 per cent below the comparable 1960 week, one of the year's slimmest margins.

The industry was particularly happy about sales in May. The 337,825 cars sold was the biggest monthly total of the year. This brought dealers' new car stocks down to about 900,000, lowest since last October.

Harold C. Lumb, vice president of Republic Steel Corp., predicted steel production will increase steadily and should approach record heights in the next year.

The Memorial Day holiday halted the 11-week rise in steel output but the decline was only 1.2 per cent below the previous week.

**Stainless Pipe Reduced**  
Prices of stainless steel and oil-country pipe were reduced. The industry publication, Iron Age, considered it a dampening effect on the likelihood of any general price rise in the near future.

Moving against another segment of the electrical equipment industry, the government's Anti-trust Division obtained price-fixing indictments against six companies which produce transmission equipment.

The firms are Oliver Electrical Manufacturing Co., Battle Creek, Mich.; Utilities Service Co., Allentown, Pa.; McGraw-Edison Co., Elgin, Ill.; Joslyn Manufacturing & Supply Co., Chicago; A.B. Chance Co., Centralia, Mo.; and Hubbard & Co., Chicago.

## Duncan May Seek Governor's Post

SALEM (AP)—Rep. Robert Duncan, D-Medford, speaker of the House the last two sessions, recently strengthened belief that he is thinking about running for governor.

He expressed belief that a strong Democratic nominee could defeat Republican Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, who has said he will seek reelection.

Duncan said he will not again be a candidate for the Legislature. He said some people have been urging him to run for Congress against Rep. Edwin Durno, a Medford Republican, but that many of these are persons who do not want him to seek the governorship.

Other possible Democratic candidates being mentioned are Sens. Walter Pearson and Alfred Corbett, both of Portland, and Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton.

Duncan added that what he might do is chuck politics and devote full time to his law practice.

Of the 1962 election Duncan said, "I think the Democrats can hold the House and increase their lead" but "we have to have a strong candidate for governor and other prime candidates."

Duncan stopped here to clean up his speaker's office files en route to a Democratic party dinner in Portland.
