

Democratic Party Patronage Row Flares Anew On Naming Attorney

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Democratic Party's row over patronage flared up anew this week with more party leaders taking sides.

Some 16 prominent Democrats joined in sending a telegram to Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger, saying she is hurting both herself and the party by her stand.

The battle broke out over President Kennedy's nomination of Sidney Lezak, Portland, for U.S. attorney in Oregon.

Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., who was Kennedy's campaign chairman in the Oregon primary election, aided in the processing of Lezak's nomination.

Published reports indicate Sen. Neuberger wants assurance of having more voice in future patronage in Oregon. She has not said she has any personal objection to Lezak for the attorney post.

The telegram sent Mrs. Neuberger Sunday bears the names of some legislative leaders.

Oregon's Democratic National Committee, C. Girard Davidson, is accused in the telegram of serving personal, rather than party interests, in the row.

Party sources said Davidson wants his law partner, Alan Hart, to get a vacancy that will be coming up in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals bench.

Davidson has complained publicly that he is being ignored on the question of patronage.

The telegram to Sen. Neuberger read:

"The publicity in Oregon's Republican press concerning the Lezak nomination is alarming. We are very much concerned about the consequences which this unfortunate situation will have for the Democratic Party. From your position as reported in the papers, we feel that you have accepted the influence and suggestions of Mr. Davidson.

"We believe that your actions and utterances in the affair have already hurt the Democratic Party and you in Oregon, and will continue to hurt it badly in the future. Our main concern should be the welfare of the Democratic Party and not personal interests of Mr. Davidson."

Harry Boivin, president of the Oregon Senate, was one of the signers. Among other legislative members signing included Sens. Al Fiegl, Walter J. Pearson, and Reps. Ed Whelan and W. O. Keisay.

Others were former Rep. Dan Dimick, Dan Bauer, Bill Vandenberg, Oscar Kendall, Ross Morgan, Mason Jones, Herbert Galton and Elaine Burnham.

Fiegl was an unsuccessful candidate for Davidson's national committee job last November.

The patronage row came out into the open in the scheduling of two important party functions, the three-day Western Democratic Party Conference at Timberline Lodge and the Jefferson-Jackson Day fundraising dinner for the party in Portland Saturday night.

Western Democratic Leaders Wind-Up Timberline Confab

TIMBERLINE LODGE, Ore. (AP)—Western States Democratic leaders wind up their three-day conference here today with more discussions of party problems.

John Bailey of Connecticut, the Democratic national chairman, reminded delegates to the Sunday session of the West's failure to deliver the votes in the 1960 presidential election. He reminded them that New Mexico, Nevada and Hawaii were the only states among the 13 represented at the meeting which President Kennedy carried.

Bailey went on to say: "I do not need to remind you how the West voted in 1960."

An afternoon session of the Western States Conference was devoted largely to discussion of patronage problems, but Bailey declined to get caught in it.

Neither he nor the national committee intend to get involved, he said, adding that patronage "is strictly a do-it-yourself program" to be handled by state organizations.

Washington State's Democratic chairman, Herbert Legg, led talks on patronage.

Oregon's principal patronage argument is whether Rep. Edith Green, who was President Kennedy's Oregon campaign manager, is handling it without consultation with state party officials.

National Committee C. Girard Davidson says Mrs. Green is ignoring the party. Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger hasn't said so, but has

been pictures as ready to block at least one appointment if party officials aren't consulted.

Mrs. Green was in a Washington, D. C., hospital for a gall bladder operation, and Mrs. Neuberger was delivering a speech in Chicago.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., substituted as a speaker Sunday morning for Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall, who had to return to Washington, D. C. after a Saturday night speech to a Jefferson-Jackson dinner in Portland.

Violent Explosions Rip Southern Tyrol

BOLZANO, Italy (AP)—Violent pre-dawn explosions ripped half a dozen communities of the disputed South Tyro Monday, spreading darkness and terror in the area. A later explosion killed a road worker.

Police said the road worker had found a dynamite charge and was about to report to police when it exploded. He was the first fatality of a long-smoldering dispute between Italy and Austria in which extremists demand that Italy grant autonomy to the large German-speaking population.

The blasts destroyed a number of steel and concrete towers supporting electric lines.

With repair crews forced to trudge for miles through mountain terrain to reach some of the wrecked towers, parts of the area may be without power for some time.

Seattle Boxer Shot By Police

SEATTLE (AP)—A professional boxer remained in critical condition in a hospital Monday with bullet wounds suffered in a gun battle with police that followed the fatal shooting of a Chinese dime store operator.

Police said Elmer Hardy, 30, a heavyweight who was a former sparring mate of title contender Sonny Liston, was shot in the head, arm and side Saturday night during an exchange that came minutes after Ark Ying Chin, 45, was fatally wounded in his small store.

Police were unable to establish a motive for the shooting but had learned that Chin and Hardy had entered Chin's store and without speaking pulled a gun and began firing. The clerk, Mrs. Joan P. Allen, 38, said she dodged down to get out of the line of fire, and the man fled.

Patrolman F. R. Jones and R. E. Stallman said they saw Hardy a few blocks away and stopped him for questioning because he answered a radioed description.

Hardy refused to halt, they said, and instead opened fire. The patrolmen returned the fire and Hardy dropped to the sidewalk.

Democrats Hear Udall's Pledge For Full, Wise Use Of Resources

PORTLAND (AP)—Some 550 Democrats heard Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall on his visit here pledge he administration's best efforts to achieve full, wise use of the West's natural resources.

Udall criticized what he said was lack of resource development under the Eisenhower administration and the granting of licenses for three private Hells Canyon dams rather than a single large dam.

"We must plan to use resources wisely," he said. "Because of the lack of development in the last eight years, this administration has to run hard just to catch up."

Udall expressed vigorous support of the bill by Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger, D-Ore., to create an Oregon Dunes seashore national park between Florence and Reedsport, saying:

"This area should become the prime playground of the country."

Udall praised Sen. Wayne L. Morse, D-Ore., who attended, as "one of the few lions left in Washington."

He said Morse and Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., have been strong leaders in the fight for federal aid to education.

Morse received a standing ovation when introduced. He said he is remaining neutral in the dispute over allocation of federal patronage between Mrs. Green and Senator Neuberger.

Morse said he will cooperate fully with members of the Oregon congressional delegation and ask them to consult with each other and Democratic party leaders on the patronage situation.

Morse said he has cleared 11 lawyers for the Oregon U. S. district attorney job. Sidney I. Lezak, a Portland attorney, has been nominated but Mrs. Neuberger has threatened to block him.

Eminent Composer To Appear At UO

Ingolf Dahl, eminent American composer, conductor, pianist and lecturer, and Erick Hawkins, New York dancer and choreographer of note, will open the University of Oregon's Summer Academy of Contemporary Arts on June 26.

The 1961 Academy, which is scheduled for two two-week sessions with two sessions running concurrently each period, is "dedicated to vital and significant work in music, dance, sculpture and television. The focus of each two-week session is on main trends and significant works since World War II, as interpreted by a practicing artist of acknowledged reputation."

For the music session, Ingolf Dahl will give a series of eight lectures, climaxing them with a concert on July 6. His lectures will cover the field of musical composition and criticism. Titles are "Quality Judgment in Contemporary Music," "Parallels Between Musical and Pictorial Expression," "The Position of Neoclassicism," "The American Panorama" (with performance of piano works by Ruggles, Copland, Shapero, and others), "The Pictorial Arts and Artists Around Stravinsky," "Pro domo," "Trends in Recent European Music," and a demonstration-discussion.

Young Cancer Victim's Only Wish Is Visit To Philadelphia's Zoo

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Johnnie Dougherty looks up from his bed at his mother, seeking encouragement. He keeps asking if

he's getting better and when mom is going to take him to the zoo to see the snakes and turtles.

Johnnie, 4, knows he's sick, but he doesn't know why.

His mother, a widow, turns her head to shake off the tears. She can't bear to tell the boy he has cancer. Doctors had to amputate his left leg last December. He recently lost the sight of his left eye. The worst is that doctors right now don't see much hope for Johnnie.

But Johnnie finds worlds of comfort in mom and in the cards and toys his neighbors and friends in suburban Ridley Township send him. He lives with his dream and only wish—to visit the Philadelphia zoo.

Time may be running out for Johnnie, the doctors say, so everyone is pulling and praying for him, especially that his only wish of visiting the zoo will be fulfilled.

The other day a local radio announcer asked the listening audience to join him in a prayer for Johnnie.

If all goes well, Tuesday will be Johnnie's day and his dream will become a reality.

The doctor will come in and check Johnnie and if the boy has the strength he'll make the trip in the Milmont Fire Company ambulance. Volunteers will wheel him around in his wheel chair. Businessmen in the community are footing the bill. Zoo officials have arranged for a special tour for Johnnie.

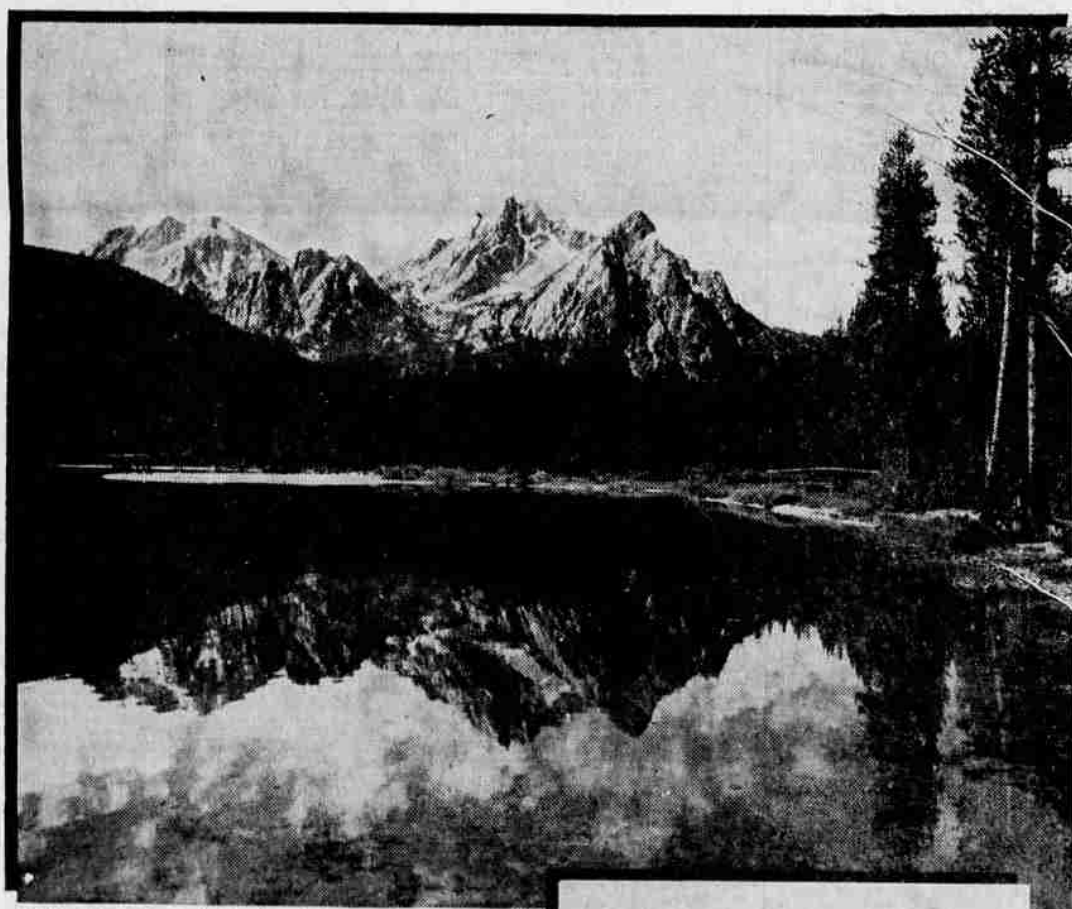

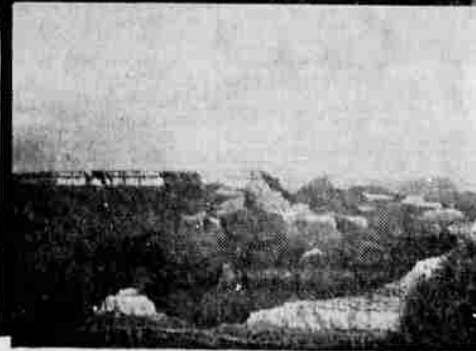

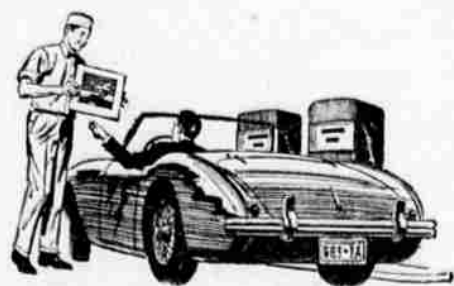
