Sutherlin School Finances Excellent

Year-end reports of the Sutherlin School District indicated an excellent financial status, the Sutherlin School Board learned at a meeting this week, reports correspondent Barbara Liesinger.

Prepared by Art Loerts, clerk, the report indicated the sum of \$148,750 had been transferred to the construction fund for the new junior high school. An anticipated \$25,000 cash balance will be in the bank as the school year books are closed on June 30. A discussion of the school budget was at the Nonpartisan School for patrons of that organization Monday when the budget and finances were reviewed by the clerk.

The budget election has been set for Monday, June 26. Polling places will be the Nonpartisan School, the East School and the West School.

The board passed a resolution expressing appreciation to Frank Moss for his contribution to education in the community. Moss recently resigned from the staff after seven years as head of the mathematics and science departments. He also served this year on the City Council.
