Both undefeated teams in Area Four Legion play fell Tuesday as Roseburg dropped the second game of a doubleheader to North Eugene, while Drain edged Springfield in a 2-1 thriller.

The Lockwood Motors team of Roseburg held onto first place in the league standings, despite the split. The local nine took the first outing at North Eugene by a 5-1 score, then lost the second game by a 6-5 count as the Dunham Mo-

tors squad staged a four run rally in the bottom of the fifth. Springfield's first setback came at the hands of the Drain nine in a 2-1 outing, with Dwight Pontius and Ran Cool sharing the pitching chores. The two teams battled to a scoreless tie in nine innings in the nightcap. The second game was called at midnight, and will be finished later in the season when Drain travels to Springfield.

South Eugene dropped Myrtle Creek by 7-0 and 3-0 scores to move into second place. Roseburg leads the league with a 7-1 record, while South Eugene is 6-2. Springfield has a 4-1 mark in league action, and Drain has a 5-2 record.

Hobbs Chucks Near Perfect Ball For Win; Foote, Lake, Hobbs All Figure In Loss

 Tom Hobbs was in brilliant form Tuesday as he pitched the Lockwood Motors Legion team of Roseburg to its 11th straight victory in the opener at North Eugene.

Hobbs gave up three hits, two of which came in the seventh inning, as he recorded the 5-1 win. However, Roseburg's winning streak was brought to a screaming halt in the second game as the Durham Motors Red Sox rallied for four runs in the fifth inning to win 6-5.

Roseburg now has a 7-1 league

record in Area Four play, and is 13-2 for the season. The local nine has a full game lead over second place South Eugene, while leading Springfield and Drain by one and a half games. North Eugene is in fifth place with a 5-3 record.

Turning in one of his finest performances of the season, Hobbs had a perfect game going until the fourth inning when he issued a free pass. In the fifth the Red Sox touched Hobbs for a walk and a single, with Ed Allison collecting the first base. The next runner reached base in the final frame when North Eugene put together two singles and a walk to score its only run.

While Hobbs was effective on the mound, the slugger star of the game was Doug Coplin. Coplin scored two runs, collected the first of his mighty pokes to put the Lockwood Motors team out in front.

In the fourth inning the winners added another run as Jim Jarvis led off with a walk, advanced on two ground outs and scored on a North Eugene error. Another tally was put on the scoreboard in the fifth as Larry Burr walked, raced to third on Beamer's solid single and scored on a fielder's choice.

The final run for Roseburg came on Coplin's second homer of the game as lead off hitter in the seventh inning.

 The local nine narrowed the gap to one with a single run on a double by Glen Fortune and an error in the third inning. In the fourth Roseburg scored two more runs to take the lead for the first time. Gordon Avery started the uprising with a walk and Larry Burr singled. Chuck Hiney drew a free pass to load the bases, and with two away a North Eugene miscue allowed the lead two runners to cross the plate.

Roseburg added to its lead in the fifth with two more runs, and looked like a cinch for its eighth straight league win. St. Louis Finally Cuts Joey Jay's Win Streak

 Joey Jay's magic finally ran out, but the Cincinnati Reds still have a 1 1/2-game lead in the three-way tussle for first place in the National League pennant race.

Pal Joey, the young right-hander who had won eight in a row for the Reds, was beaten 6-3 by St. Louis in the second game of a two-night doubleheader at Cincinnati Tuesday night. It was Jay's first defeat since April 29, and it came on the heels of a 4-3, 11-inning Cincinnati victory in the opener that gave the Reds a six-game winning streak.

Still Hold Lead
 Despite the split, the Reds retained their first-place margin as Los Angeles replaced San Francisco in second place. Milwaukee spilled the Giant's 2-1 behind the four-hit pitching of Warren Spahn, who now is just four shy of his 300th

career victory. The Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs 3-0 in an afternoon game as Sandy Koufax won his 10th with a two-hitter.

Pittsburgh rapped last - place Philadelphia 6-2 in the other NL game.

In the American League, Detroit beat Washington 5-4 and kept a 1 1/2-game lead. The New York Yankees took over second place with a 6-2 victory at Kansas City after Cleveland slipped to third with a 5-3 defeat by the Chicago White Sox. Boston belted the Los Angeles Angels 11-8 and Minnesota beat Baltimore 5-4.

The Cardinals, hanging on to fifth place by mere percentage points over Milwaukee, tagged Jay (8-4) for eight of their 12 hits in the nightcap. Charlie James drove in two runs, bringing in the clincher with a double in a two-run sixth

inning. Right-hander Bob Gibson (3-3) won his third in a row for the Cards, blanking the Reds on two hits until the ninth and finishing with a five-hitter.

Cincinnati blew a 2-0 lead in the opener when Carl Sawatski hit a three-run pinch homer off Jay

Hook in the seventh inning. But the Reds bounced back and tied it in the ninth on a pinch single by Jerry Lynch, then beat reliever Bob Miller (1-1) when he forced home a run with a bases-loaded walk in the 11th. Jim Brosnan (3-2) was the winner in relief — his sixth in a row over the Cards since May 1956.

Injured Law Hurting Pirate Effectiveness

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Manager Danny Murtaugh of the Pittsburgh Pirates said today that as soon as sore-shouldered right-hander Vern Law gets well enough to pitch "we'll make our presence known."

"Naturally, Law has a tremendous effect when he's able to pitch," Murtaugh said of last year's 20-game winner who helped the Pirates take the National League pennant.

Meanwhile, it appeared that Harvey Haddix and Bobby Shantz may have to carry the pitching load for the world champion Pirates, who are in fourth place, 5 1/2 games from the top. Last year at this time they were four games in first.

"Haddix has been pretty good most of the year," Murtaugh said of the little left-hander Tuesday night after he beat Philadelphia 6-2 for his fifth victory against two losses.

The Pirates hitting seems to be as adequate as last year, with Don Hoak leading the NL with a .347 average and Roberto Clemente and Dick Stuart up high.

But the loss of Law, who hasn't been in regular rotation and who can't work a full game, and Bob Friend's recent slump, have hurt the Pirates.

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America's Tennis Hopes Rest On Young Players

LONDON (AP) — Stocky Chuck McKinley and teen-ager Karen Hantze, two of America's rising young tennis stars, will lead the U.S. challenge at the Wimbledon championships next week.

That was officially decided Tuesday when McKinley, 20-year-old from St. Louis, and Miss Hantze, 18-year-old from Chula Vista, Calif., were the only American's seeded for the English tennis classic. Both were placed eighth in their respective divisions.

McKinley, fourth-ranked in the United States, will be trying for the men's title that has eluded American tennis aces since Tony Trabert copped the big prize in 1953.

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
