

Residents Give Green Light To Olalla Irrigation District

Some 75 central Douglas County rural residents turned out for a special meeting Thursday night and gave the green light to formation of an irrigation district for the Olalla Dam area by a two-to-one majority.

One area that had originally been proposed to be included in the benefiting district, Flournoy Valley, was tentatively dropped from the planning at the unanimous vote of the majority of landowners in the area. They voiced opposition to the project because they own large parcels of land and feel the cost would be prohibitive. The 75 who turned out for this meeting voted in a Land Owners Committee, which will in turn

draw up a petition asking the Douglas County Court to hold a public hearing and subsequent election on the desired formation of an irrigation district.

This petition will require the signatures of 50 residents of the benefiting district. At the actual election, the issue would have to be approved by 60 per cent of the landowners involved before the district could be formed.

Once that district was formed, all land within the boundaries would be considered part of the district and all residents would be taxed by the district in accordance with their total irrigable acres, regardless of whether or not they personally were in favor of the district.

The actual charges for water within the district will be made on a scale established by the three-member board of directors which will be elected at the same time the district election is held. Charges will be on a basis of irrigable acres and not total acres. The board of directors, acting on Bureau of Reclamation studies, will determine which acres are irrigable and which are not.

When the election does come up, each family with a tract of land containing not less than five acres will receive one vote per family.

The areas involved are the Lookingglass Valley, Tenmile, Brockway, Melrose, Happy Valley, Olalla, and Flournoy Valley. Prior to the dropping the 980-acre Flournoy Valley, tentative acreage in the district was figured at 12,130 acres.

The proposed Olalla Dam itself would be constructed on Olalla Creek some 20 miles from Roseburg. Estimated cost of the dam and irrigation system is 10 million. The district would have a repayment potential of about \$1 million and the federal government would charge the other \$9 million to Columbia River power projects.

If an irrigation district is formed, it would take about five more years before water would start running through the ditches to irrigate land in the district. The Bureau of Reclamation is slated to have its feasibility report on the project completed this December and will not be able to continue

with the project until it has an official district to deal with.

The irrigation district was voted in for this area instead of a water control district or a corporation because the laws for an irrigation district make all land within the boundaries part of the district while the other two leave the choice up to the people, who can join or not join as they wish once the district is formed.

Lookingglass resident Art Loeis who has chaired the drive for formation of a district recently said he felt this was the only type of district that could be formed, because the project would not be financially feasible without all of the land being included.

Other members of the landowners committee are J. G. Dickover, Tenmile, Harold Nichols, Brockway, Stanford Buell, Happy Valley, Oliver Fisk, Lookingglass, Herbert Northerly, Olalla, and Fred Engle, Flournoy Valley. A Melrose representative will be appointed in the near future.

Auto Union Tells Chrysler, No Concessions For Red Ink

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp., the only one of the Big Three automakers operating in the red this year, was put on notice by the United Auto Workers Union today it can expect no concessions in its new contract negotiations because of its current financial position.

The notification was given by Walter P. Reuther at a news conference today, minutes before the UAW president opened the union's bargaining on a new contract at Chrysler.

Rocket Failure Stops Dust Hunt

WALLOPS ISLAND, Va. (AP) — Rocket failure apparently cut off today an effort to make the best study yet of the space dust that constitutes a possible lethal threat to spacecraft.

A Scout rocket lifted off a sea-side launching pad here at 12:06 p.m. On its nose rode an instrument package designed to learn more about the tiny space bullets that might erode or even puncture a space vehicle as they strike it at speeds up to 45 miles a second.

But at 12:19 p.m. the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that the fourth stage of the booster failed to ignite.

A spokesman said "It looks bad."

All four stages of the rocket were to have been fired in about eight minutes after the launching. The 72-foot, 38,000-pound rocket was intended to put the 125-pound micrometeoroid satellite into an orbit ranging from 240 to 620 miles up.

Less formally, technicians dubbed the space traveler "beer can" after the shape of its impact recording device.

The intent is to learn more about the space dust — perhaps ultimate debris of exploded planets — that might erode or even puncture a space vehicle as the particles strike it at speeds up to 45 miles a second.

Scientists thought they might find big ones—even up to a tenth of an inch radius — with the equipment sent up today. Those recorded so far have been "real flyspecks" as one scientist wryly noted, on the order of four tenths of an inch.

Even those, however, are rated a possible menace.

The density of the particles in the outer reaches is indicated by estimates that thousands of tons filter through the atmosphere and settle on the earth daily.

Officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration estimated it would take nearly two hours to determine whether the dust hunter achieved orbit.

A boat belonging to Milton Sullivan, 309 SE Ella St., Roseburg, reported missing to the sheriff's office Wednesday, was recovered Thursday by sheriff's deputies.

"We feel that all interests can best be served by an agreement that will fully recognize the cost pressures which so heavily influence the production and sale of consumer products."

UAW President Walter P. Reuther, who led the union's bargaining team at Chrysler as he had in openings on successive days at General Motors and Ford, declared at Ford Thursday that new ground will have to be broken and new concepts developed in contract settlements this summer.

Explosion Reported

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. officials say a blast that could have been caused by a small atomic device or chemical explosives occurred last Jan. 31 in the Soviet Union, east of the Finnish border.

The size of the explosion was estimated as equivalent to between 50 and 100 tons of TNT. The first U.S. atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima had a blast equivalent of 20,000 tons of TNT.

Eichmann Again Refuses To Accept Responsibility For Slaying Of Jews

JERUSALEM, Israel (AP)—Adolf Eichmann said today he was the man called in when the Nazis needed transportation to ship Jews out of Holland and Denmark to the death camps. But the former SS officer refused once more to accept any further responsibility for the mass slaughter.

Defense counsel Robert Servatius explored the Dutch and Danish ordeal under Nazi occupation with Eichmann on the stand

for the ninth straight day and elicited a flood of explanations adding up to only one thing: Eichmann never conceived an order but only carried out his superiors' bidding.

Illustrative of this was Eichmann's repudiation of a document naming him as the man who "ordered" evacuation of a mental hospital in Holland so it could be turned over to SS military units.

"This could not be accurate at all," said the defendant, claiming that Arthur Seyss-Inquart, the Nazi governor of Holland, had full "legislative authority" and did not need to come to Eichmann's bureau in Berlin for such action.

"It was quite obvious they only needed a train," said Eichmann. "And that is how it was referred to my section."

The mentally ill Jews and even the staff of the hospital were shipped out to destruction.

Eichmann deprecated documents labeling a special mission to Denmark to transport Jews out in ships as the "Eichmann Sonderkommando."

He said there was a tendency to term any unit connected with his department IV-B-4—Jewish affairs — a "sonderkommando." Sonderkommando, or special unit, was the name given by the Nazis to the battalions sent to the East in 1941 and 1942 to liquidate two million Jews by gunfire and in mobile gas vans.

The Danish venture failed to materialize, mostly because the Danes by an almost unanimous resistance made Denmark the one giant failure of the Third Reich's effort to liquidate the Jews.

Eichmann admitted he went to Copenhagen on orders of his immediate superior, Gen. Heinrich Mueller, but contended the plan already had been "implemented" by an SS colonel on the scene by the time he got there.

LEOPOLDVILLE, the Congo (AP)—With flags flying, a big parade and a beauty contest, Leopoldville turned carefree today in celebrating the first anniversary of Congo independence.

Clouds of political uncertainty blew in from the problem province of Katanga, but Congolese in this white-washed capital seemed determined not to let these mar the fun.

Four days of celebration in the troubled infant nation got under way Thursday with a football game. Other highlights are a competition to select Miss Leopoldville of 1961 and a round of diplomatic receptions.

Gen. Joseph Mobutu, the army strongman of the central government, mobilized thousands of his troops for a march before President Joseph Kasavubu and foreign diplomats.

Moise Tshombe, Katanga President, at odds politically with the Leopoldville regime but of late an avowed admirer of Mobutu, sent a contingent of 75 gendarmes to take part in the parade.

Gets Service Pin

Paper Says Spy Trade Considered

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York World-Telegram and Sun said today that negotiations are under way to exchange convicted Soviet spy Col. Rudolf Abel for Francis Gary Powers, U2 spy plane pilot imprisoned in the Soviet Union.

The story said the deal is nearing completion.

The trade first was proposed a year ago by Oliver W. Powers, father of the American who was downed over Russia May 1, 1960, the newspaper said. Powers was sentenced to 30 years in prison.

Abel, described by the government as a top Soviet intelligence agent, was convicted of espionage conspiracy in U.S. District Court here Nov. 15, 1957. He is serving a 30-year sentence at the federal prison in Atlanta, Ga.

Justice and State Department officials in Washington were quoted as saying they knew nothing of the current negotiations, but that they did not deny the report that such talks were going on.
