Country Club Tourney Near

Ladies Day play this week was a putting tournament at the Roseburg Country Club.

Mrs. Mack Mabee was the winner in Class A; Mrs. William Mader in Class B; Mrs. Don Sanders in Class C; and Mrs. Jack Morris in Class D.

Because next Tuesday is the Fourth of July, there will be no Ladies Day play scheduled. The monthly business meeting and luncheon this month will be held July 11.

The Club Championship Tournament will start July 13 and run through Aug. 1. The qualifying round for this tourney must be played between July 4 and July 11, inclusive.

Since the qualifying round must be played with a woman member, the time allowed has been extended one day to include a regular Tuesday play for the benefit of those unable to play at any other time.

The schedule of play will be set up to allow play on July 12, a Thursday, and the first round must be completed on or before July 18. There will be a nine-hole and 18-hole tournament set up. No handicaps are used in this tourney to decide the club champion golfer for 1961.

There is no entry fee, and the tournament committee asks that every member of the Ladies Golfers Association will qualify and enter this tournament so that the champions in the various flights will represent all the golfers.

No Records Due In Open

SPRINGFIELD, N.J. (AP) — One thing appeared certain as the 16th Women's National Open Golf Championship went into its final two rounds today — there will be no scoring record.

Only a phenomenal sub-par scoring spree by one of the co-leaders at the halfway point would enable her to match the 287 record set by Mickey Wright of Dallas, at the Church Hill Valley Country Club at Pittsburgh in 1959. And the lower course at Baltusrol, where the current event is being played, is not conducive to sub-par golf.

Par Not Bettered
None of the 82 entrants has bettered par of 36-36-72 over the 6,372-yard lower course, and only two have matched it, Miss Wright and JoAnne Prentice of Birmingham, Ala., got their 72s to tie for the first-round lead. Ruth Jessen of Seattle carded a 73 in the second round Friday, and that was the best of the day.

It is a course which would seem to have been made for the long-driving Miss Wright, but the best she could do Friday was an 80 for 152, four strokes behind the co-leaders.

As Miss Wright faded Miss Prentice continued her steady golf, finishing with a 76 to add to her 72 of Friday for a 148 total and a tie for first place with Miss Jessen, the blonde sharpshooter with the spread-eagle putting stance.

Miss Jessen added her 73 to her first-round 75 to match Miss Prentice's total.

Betsy Rawls of Spartanburg, S.C., defending champion seeking her fifth open crown, still was very much in the picture as the field of 41 — the low 40 and ties of the first two rounds — started the gruelling two-round battle.

Her 74-76-150 was good for third place, one stroke ahead of two amateurs and a pro. The amateurs in the 151 bracket were Anne Richardson of Columbus, Ohio, with 75-76, and Mrs. Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ontario, with 74-77. Marilyn Smith of French Lick, Ind., is the pro with 77-74.

Louise Suggs of Atlanta, twice open champion, was in the 152 bracket with Miss Wright.

Car Race Canceled

ATLANTA (AP) — The United States Auto Club has cancelled the 250-mile championship car race scheduled for Atlanta International Raceway July 9 and a 250-mile NASCAR grand national race will be run in its place.

The race was called off because the USAC considers the track too dangerous. Decision to call off the Festival 250 came after Indianapolis driver Dick Rathmann drove around the track Friday and tire experts disclosed the asphalt had a temperature of just less than 140 degrees, which they considered too hot for safe racing.

McKinley Hits Net 'Quarters'

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Charles (Chuck) McKinley of St. Louis reached the quarter-finals of the All-England Tennis Championships today by defeating Warren Jacobs of Australia in straight sets, 8-6, 6-1, 7-5.

McKinley had been heavily favored to defeat the 23-year-old Australian, who is a student at Lamar Tech in Beaumont, Tex.

Earlier in the day one of the three remaining American girls in the women's singles was beaten. Mrs. Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia defeated Mimi Arnold of Redwood City, Calif., 7-5, 6-2 in a fourth round match.

Girls Advance

No American man played Friday, but three U.S. girls—Karen Hantze, Mimi Arnold and Justina Bricks—also advanced to the last 16 without musing their hair.

Karen scored an easy 6-3, 6-2 victory over Eva Duldig, an Australian schoolmarm. Mimi swept past Karen Herich of Germany, 6-2, 6-1, and Justina put out Britain's Rosemary Deloford, 6-1, 6-3.

The only American to bow out Friday was Pat Stewart, the model from Indianapolis, who lost to second-seeded Margaret Smith, the statuesque Australian champion, 6-3, 6-0.

Waltons Request Waterbird Haven

PORTLAND (AP) — Conservationists working to save a major waterfowl refuge in Oregon were supported in a resolution passed at the national Izaak Walton League of America convention, Judge Carl D. Etling, president of the league's Oregon division, said today.

A resolution approved at the meeting in Chicago urged Congress to save federal lands near Southern Oregon and Northern California. The area includes about 95,000 acres of waterfowl refuge.

Two Oregon men were chosen at the meeting for posts in the organization. Dr. Alfred J. Kreft, Portland, was re-elected a national vice president and Lühr Jensen, Jr., Hood River, was named director from Oregon.

Next year's national convention will be held in Portland.
