

Thursday Concert Marks Dedication Of Carillons

Roseburg residents Wednesday night were introduced to the Equitable Savings and Loan carillon when Thomas E. Roberts, noted carillonneur played a 30-minute concert. The music of the bells was beamed from the Equitable tower and was heard by a select group in the new offices at SE Jackson St. and Oak Ave., and was broadcast by radio.

The concert was a part of a ceremony in which the bells were dedicated to the people of Rose-

burg in a presentation to Mayor Peter B. Serafin, who responded on the part of the City Council and the public at large.

30 Entertained

Approximately 30 guests were entertained at dinner Wednesday night, after which the group attended the ceremony in which the Equitable carillon was dedicated.

Guests included city officers, heads of the city's banks and various financial institutions, and other friends of the company.

The Roseburg carillon, it was explained, is the 10th installation. The bells have become a "trademark" of the association.

The bells were designed and built by Schulerich Carillon Bells, Inc., of Sellersville, Pa. The inventor, hearing some of the noted carillons while in Europe, decided they could be reproduced electronically.

His "bells" consist of tiny, round bronze bars. When struck by electrically operated hammers, they produce a tone identical with the giant bells, some weighing as much as five tons. The tone is amplified as much as one million times, giving a vibrant sound identical with the cast bells of the old carillons.

Music Broadcast

A cluster of stentors (speakers), mounted on a tower atop the building, beam the music of the bells over an area of two or more miles.

During the Open House Thursday and Friday Prof. Roberts will play several concerts, including request numbers, each day.

Police Probe Mysterious Train Wreck

SALEM, Va. (AP)—A tight-lipped police chief continued investigation today of a mysterious car-train wreck in which a woman was seriously injured by a train operated by her husband.

George T. Eades, Salem police chief, said he may have a statement later today after talking with a witness.

The victim of the crash, Elizabeth Webb Howard, 39, of nearby Roanoke, still was unconscious and in serious condition in a hospital today.

Her husband, Ernest O. Howard, was taken to a second hospital Wednesday night, Eades said, in a state of shock.

The collision occurred about 4:12 p.m. Wednesday at a grade crossing of the Norfolk and Western Railway in this western Virginia town.

Mrs. Howard was thrown about 50 feet from the car by the crash. The auto was knocked 25 feet into a drainage ditch beside the railroad tracks.

It still was not clear today exactly how the accident occurred. Eades indicated that the wreck possibly "was not an accident."

"It certainly was unusual at any rate," the chief said.

Eades said that the engineer of the train, J. N. Dillon, told Howard that it appeared to him that the car was being backed off the tracks as the train—No. 51—approached.

There was much speculation today over the contents of a note found in Mrs. Howard's purse at the scene of the accident.

Eades declined to reveal the contents. He did say the note mentioned two names which he declined to disclose.

Innocent Plea Entered

James Eugene Wilson, 32, Riddle, pleaded innocent when arraigned today before Circuit Judge Charles Woodruff on a charge of first degree arson.

Wilson appeared before the judge on the district attorney's information, after waiving grand jury action. He is accused of burning the dwelling of R. H. Mast on the North Fork of Smith River June 23. Trial will be set down later.

State Police Report Minor Road Mishap

Oregon State Police today reported a minor accident on Highway 42 at the west end of Camas Valley at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Paul E. Davis, 25, 1076 Anderson St., Coos Bay, was driving a 1955 coupe west on Highway 42 near a sharp curve to the right, police said.

The report indicated that as he went into the curve an oncoming logging truck crowded him, forcing him to move to the extreme right of the road.

When he pulled back toward the center of the road, police said, he crossed the center line striking a 1949 sedan driven by Ray Foster Simpson, 36, of Redding, Calif., in the left front fender. He also hit a 1959 sedan driven by Audell I. Scott, 18, Rt. 4, Box 1170, Roseburg, in the left rear fender.

Scott was following Simpson heading east on the highway.

Passengers in the Davis vehicle were David W. Wease, Joell Wease and David E. Wease, 2, all of Lookingglass Rd., Winston, and Jerry Allen.

In the Simpson car, passengers were his children Randy Ray, 10, Dale Eugene, 7, and Cherri Raylene, 5, and Emma E. Simpson.

In the Scott vehicle, Eva Judith Scott was a passenger.

There were no injuries.

Accused Man Found Guilty Of Larceny

A trial jury Wednesday found Elmer Steen, 30, of North Bend guilty of a charge of larceny by bailer. The case was tried before Judge Charles S. Woodruff.

The judge, however, took the matter under advisement and will conduct a hearing on a motion by the defense for a directed verdict at 2 p.m. today.

Steen was accused in a grand jury indictment with converting a television set to his own use. The set allegedly was the property of Fred Bernau, who preferred charges.

Verdict Returned

The jury returned its verdict shortly after 6 p.m. Wednesday. In other circuit court actions, Claude Yarbrough, 36, of Myrtle Creek pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery before Judge Woodruff. The judge postponed imposition of sentence until Friday at 9:30 a.m.

Yarbrough previously was charged with assault with a deadly weapon and accused of threatening Ernest Penny with a gun on April 21. This charge was dismissed and the lesser charge substituted in a district attorney's information.

Judge Woodruff Wednesday placed Robert Eugene Cain, 18, of Eastside on five years probation, on a plea of guilty to the district attorney's information to receiving and concealing stolen money.

DA Seen

Cain was released from the Oregon Correctional Institution to which he had been sentenced on another charge. As terms of his release he was to present himself voluntarily to the district attorney's office here, for disposition of the second case. This he did on June 25. The judge has postponed imposition of sentence until Wednesday, when probation was granted.

Dennis M. Bangs, 18, Sutherlin, appeared in the District Court of Judge Gerald R. Hayes in answer to a charge of larceny from an auto. His case was continued until today to give him an opportunity to see an attorney. He is accused of taking a tire from the car of Reuben M. and Alice M. Stanton on July 2.

Caroline Rescued From Pool By Fully-Clothed Socialite

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Evening Star said today a young matron jumped fully clothed into a swimming pool last Thursday to pull out Caroline Kennedy about to sink in water over her head.

The story by Betty Beale named Mrs. William Saltonstall, daughter-in-law of Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., as the rescuer of the President's three-year-old daughter.

As for Caroline, the story said "her only reaction was one of surprise. She did express some wonderment that Mrs. Saltonstall should be in the pool with all her clothes on."

Asked about the episode as reported by the Star, White House press secretary Pierre Salinger said:

"It's true, but I don't have any of the details yet."

Mrs. Saltonstall, when called by an Associated Press reporter, said, "I was the one who jumped in." She declined to discuss the matter further.

The Star story related: "Three-year-old Caroline, along with a group of her friends, was attending the third birthday party of Ivan Steers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Newton I. Steers Jr. Mr. Steers is the former Tina Auchincloss, daughter of Hugh D. Auchincloss who is Mrs. John F. Kennedy's stepfather."

"The party was held on the spacious grounds of the Steers residence at 6601 River Road, Bethesda, Md."

"Six or seven mothers and their small children were present at the gathering that also included

two or three nurses and their charges."

Relief Nurse

"The President's daughter had been accompanied to the party by a Secret Service man who was on duty at the entrance to the grounds and by a relief nurse who takes Caroline out when her regular nurse, Miss Maud Shaw, is looking after her infant brother, John Jr."

"Mrs. Saltonstall had only time to prepare her children for the pool when she suddenly heard one of the mothers say, 'Is she all right?'"

"She looked over toward the pool and saw Caroline in the middle of the pool alone, holding onto a board raft. But even as she looked the raft flipped away from Caroline's hand and she started to go down. The water was four feet deep there, over her head."

"Without any thought of her own condition, Mrs. Saltonstall, whose third child is expected in two and a half months, ran to the pool and jumped in before the other parents and nurses had fully taken in the situation."

"Unknown to the other adults, Caroline's nurse had gone into the house to change into her bathing suit."

"By the time Mrs. Saltonstall got to Caroline the little girl had gone under. However, when she pulled her up the youngster seemed unaware of what had happened. Her only reaction was one of surprise. Pair Of Youths Are Held On Petty Larceny Charge

Roseburg police officer Don Webberly Wednesday night made an apprehension in a recurring case city police have been working on for several months. Two 17-year-olds were taken into custody for petty larceny resulting from the alleged theft of money from a mechanical change dispenser.

The youths were picked up at 11:25 p.m. after Webberly and merchant patrolman Lloyd Leonard observed them manipulating the change machine at the South

Stephens Wash and Dry. They had a total of more than \$20 in quarters in their possession when Webberly searched them.

Special Money Used

A specially-prepared half dollar was found inside the machine when it was opened by the owners shortly after the youths were taken into custody.

Police said there was no apparent connection with Wednesday night's incident and similar incidents which have occurred in the city during the past months, other than that the system used to bill the machines was basically the same.

One of the youths was a county resident, and the other was from California. They were lodged in the Douglas County Jail under the juvenile code protective custody provisions by the city police.

Webberly spotted the youths in the self-service laundry building shortly after 11 p.m. and pulled his patrol car around behind the building. At about the same time, Leonard spotted them and parked up a side street where he could observe them.

Webberly said he was able to watch the youths through a window and saw one of them manipulating the machine while the other put the quarters in his pocket. He said the youths made a verbal admission of the offense.

Laundry owners Le Carr and Don Glanz arrived at the building and checked out the machine, finding the prepared half dollar in the machine and that portion of the changer empty.

Both were high in praise of the city police officer and the merchant patrolman and said they should be commended for this apprehension.

Stevens has filled the pulpit at the Glendale church several times.

District Attorney Says Record Belies Warburton's Statements

Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson said Wednesday night his office's record belies recent statements by City Manager John Warburton that the DA's office is inept.

In a 10-minute speech of defense on television, Thompson said: "I do not believe that courts or grand juries are above criticism, but I think it is a dangerous thing to criticize the administration of justice until the critic is familiar with what is going on. I submit that our record is the best of any district attorney's office in the state of Oregon."
