Pro Grid Training To Start On Friday

NEW YORK (AP)—Professional football, now a six-month operation, resumes Friday when the first National Football League team, the new Minnesota Vikings, reports to its training base at Bemidji (Minn.) State College.

Commissioner Pete Rozelle gave the Vikings permission to get an early start on the job of sorting out the players from other clubs although the league rules specify a July 16 start.

The Dallas Cowboys also were given an earlier starting date because they have an early August exhibition game with the Vikings. The Cowboys will work out at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn.

Rozelle also granted the Philadelphia Eagles an earlier date because, as the defending champions, they must play the College All-Stars Aug. 4 in Chicago. The Eagles will open practice July 11 at Hershey, Pa.

Green Bay and St. Louis will start July 16, Baltimore, Chicago, Los Angeles, New York and Pittsburgh on July 17; Washington July 18; Cleveland July 23; Detroit July 25; and San Francisco July 26.

NEW YORK (AP) — Rotand Sheldon, rookie right-hander of the New York Yankees, got "even" with the Cleveland Indians because Detroit's Chico Fernandez stole home on him.

"I was so mad when Fernandez did that Tuesday, I asked (Manager) Ralph Houk if I could pitch the opener against the Indians," Sheldon said today as he tasted the sweetness of his first major league shutout, 6-0 over Cleveland Wednesday.

Tuesday, in the big doubleheader with Detroit, Sheldon came in as a relief pitcher in the ninth inning of the second game—eventually won by the Tigers 4-3 in 10 innings. Sheldon pitched only that one inning, but with two out, the bases loaded, Fernandez stole home for a 3-2 Tiger lead.

Bevos Up To Within 5½ Games Of Top In Pacific Coast League

The Portland Beavers continued their jinx over the Spokane Indians Wednesday night and gained their first shutout victory of the season 3-0.

Clint Stark, 19-year-old left-hander, pitched the victory, scattering seven hits. It was Portland's seventh straight win over Spokane this season.

Don Newcombe was the loser. He gave up only five hits, but four of them came in the fourth inning.

Phil Gagliano opened the Portland fourth with a single. Don Landrum followed with another. Outfielder Bob Burda then cracked triple to center field, scoring two runs. Gene Oliver drove him home with a single. Newcombe settled down then, but the damage was done.

That left Portland 5½ games behind the leading Seattle Rainiers.

Razor Wielded

Pitcher Carl Greene wielded the razor Wednesday night as Vancouver shaved a game off Seattle's lead in the tight Pacific Coast League title race.

Greene spaced seven Rainier hits, went two-for-four at the plate and scored two Vancouver runs in the Mounties' 3-2 win over the league-leaders in a series-opener at Seattle.

The win left the Rainiers 3½ games ahead of Tacoma's Giants, who edged the San Diego Padres 7-6 at Tacoma. The Mounties moved to within 4½ games of Seattle.

Salt Lake City southpaw Sam McDowell, an 18-year-old bonus boy, allowed Hawaii only four hits

as he pitched the Bees to an 8-2 decision over the Islanders at Honolulu. He had a one-hit shutout until the eighth. He struck out nine while walking seven.

The spurring Mounties, who have won 12 of their last 15 outings, opened the scoring in the third inning when Greene doubled, advanced on an error and raced home on Billy Consolo's fly to deep right. In the seventh, Greene doubled again after Seattle starter Ted Wills had walked Rick Herscher, and Herscher scored. Greene brought in the final tally on Consolo's single.

Catcher John Orsino's bases-loaded homer in the five-run sixth inning was the winning blow as Tacoma clipped the Padres. Dusty Rhodes opened the inning with a triple. Two walks loaded the bases and another pass by reliever Don Williams forced in a run. Orsino's grand-slammer followed.

Salem Finally Wins A Game

Yakima bounced in front with three runs in the first inning, but Jerry Gilbert's three-run homer in the bottom of the frame put the Braves back into contention. A double by Dan Staniec and Hap Richie's single broke a 4-4 tie in the eighth and gave Yakima the winning margin.

The boys are Gerald Buys and Bryan Powers, Portland; Leo Reid, Springfield; and David Wood, Stayton. All runners, they are the first Oregonians to qualify for the U. S. Deaf Olympics squad which is competing for the ninth time.
