

Mark, Boivin Talk Special Session

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark O. Hatfield and Senate President Harry Boivin Thursday discussed calling a special session of the legislature to set up the time for a vote on statewide daylight saving time.

Boivin said he had contacted a majority of the senators and they had expressed a willingness to advance the vote from the November, 1962, general election to the May primary.

The referendum measure, approved by the legislature, would put the question on the November ballot and this would mean another summer, next year, of confusion in Oregon.

The confusion results because

the legislature authorized daylight saving time for the five-county Portland area. A number of communities in other counties then voluntarily adopted it.

Boivin said previously that nobody in state government had anticipated the rash of voluntary switches to daylight time which is resulting in varying times throughout the state.

Boivin said that he did not know how the members of the House would react to this proposal.

Previously House Speaker Robert Duncan, D-Medford, said that he was opposed to a special session on time.

Duncan said he voted against the bill permitting Multnomah and the four adjacent counties to go on the fast time and could see no reason for the special session.

In a statement Thursday night, Boivin said: "The governor discussed with me the sentiment in the Senate relative to a special session on the subject of daylight saving time."

"A majority of the Senate has been contacted so far and expressed a willingness to meet for the sole purpose of changing the date of the election so that the matter would be determined by vote of the people before next summer."

Boivin said that the special session could be handled cheaply and in a matter of a few days as far as the Senate is concerned.

He said only one committee would need to be formed and the Senate could operate with a skeleton staff and without any secretaries.

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State Police Buy 16 Unmarked Cars

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon State Police have bought 16 new unmarked cars "to make drivers be a little more cautious," Supt. H. G. Maisson said Thursday.

Half of the new cars will be tan-colored, while the other half will be silver.

"The department has had 16 unmarked cars, but they have been easily spotted because they were blue like the other state police cars."

Maisson said that the department has 200 cars for traffic patrol. All but the 16 are plainly marked.

He said that the new cars would be located throughout the state, with one at each principal station. "We hope this will encourage safer driving by fear of detection," he said. "Our purpose is not just to arrest more people."

The department has 12 radar sets. It recently bought eight replacement sets of a newer and more efficient model.

Pope Requests Dike Against Bad Films

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII called today for a "dike against decadent and insidious" motion picture films.

The 79-year-old supreme ruler of the Roman Catholic Church described such films as "a great danger for society, for individuals, and especially for youth."

He made his plea in a letter to Archbishop Martin John O'Connor, rector of the pontifical North American College and president of the Pontifical Commission for Cinema, Radio and Television.

The letter marked the 25th anniversary of an encyclical issued by Pope Pius XI warning against immoral films and to encourage production of wholesome motion pictures.

Pope John urged Archbishop O'Connor, formerly of Scranton, Pa., to "use every possible means" to "strengthen the forces of all who are pledged to 'give a positive Christian value to films and to build a dike against decadent and insidious films.'"

Local Women's Club To Furnish Multipurpose Clubroom At YMCA

With a gift of \$420 from the Roseburg Woman's Club, taken from the club's savings, another clubroom at the YMCA will be completed.

The "Y" now has three multipurpose clubrooms, two now complete and one nearly so. Beta Sigma Phi City Council was responsible for furnishing one, the Woman's Club another. The third, a memorial room, still needs some equipment.

The clubrooms, 15-by-20 in size, can be used for game rooms, crafts, etc., and each is equipped with a table, 20 chairs, a bulletin board and drapes.

The "Y" kitchen still needs furnishing, with a budget allowance of \$2,002. Other projects to be completed are the building of a sun deck and black topping the parking area.

Wayne Schulz, secretary-manager of the YMCA, states that to complete the "Y," a total of \$9,800 is the approximate amount needed. The original sum necessary for building, engineering and furnishing was \$27,000. Total receipts were \$237,800. Actually, \$38,200 is still needed, but \$28,400 is yet outstanding in unpaid pledges, which leaves the \$9,800 figure.

A community project, civic and fraternal organizations as well as junior high and high school students

have contributed to the building and furnishing of the Y. On July 19, the Rotary Club is sponsoring a circus, the proceeds going to the YMCA.

The "Y" membership as of June 30 was 2,350. Of these 838 are boys under 18, 652 girls under 18, and the remainder adults.

Senate Ag Group Okays Grain Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Agriculture Committee gave tentative approval Thursday to an emergency one-year wheat program calling for a cutback in planting and production on the next crop.

Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D-La., said the stop-gap program would require wheat farmers to reduce present allotments or planting at least 10 per cent.

They would thus qualify for price supports plus a payment in cash or kind in the idle land equal to 40 per cent of past production.

Wheat growers could cut planting another 30 per cent and receive payments on this equal to 50 per cent of past production.

The Senate proposal is similar to one previously approved by the House Agriculture Committee except that the House plan proposed payments of 50 and 60 per cent on the unused wheat lands.

The aim of the proposals is to hold the next crop to estimated domestic and export needs. The government now owns a huge stock of surplus wheat acquired under price support programs.

Ellender said the senate group voted to delay this year's referendum of growers on any new wheat plan from July 25 to August 25.

He said the wheat plan would be one section of an omnibus farm bill on which the Senate committee would continue closed-door action.
